THE ANNING, TENT AND SAIL INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1957.

In 1937 reports were received from seventy-one establishments whose principal products were awnings, tents, sails, waterproof covers. These establishments produced goods to the velue of $\$ 2,194,861$, they gave employment to 629 persons, paid out in salaries and wages the sum of $\$ 568,211$ and expended $\$ 1,155,729$ for materials. Capital invested amounted to $\$ 1,988,744$

The awning, tent and sall industry made considerable advances during 1937. Compared with the previous year, the gross value of production increased by $\$ 393,071$ or 21.8 per cent, 77 more persons were given employment, an increase of 13.9 per cent, and salaries and wages paid increased by $\$ 85,244$ or 17.7 per cent. Expenditure for materials was greater by $\$ 156,302$ or 15.6 per cent. Norking capital, comprising the inventory value of materials on hand, stocks in process, finished products, etc. and cash, trading and operating accounts, etc., increased by approximately 9 per cent, but this gain was largely offset by a decline in fixed capital, representing the present value of land, buildingsy fixtures, etc., with a resulting small increase in total capital of $\$ 62,426$ or 3,2 per cent.

Ontario, with 38 establishments, accounted for 43 per cent of the total capital, 47 per cent of the employees and 47 per cent of the gross value of production. The 11 Quebec establishments reported 26 per cent of the capital invested, 24 per cent of the employment given and 25 per cent of the gross value of the output. The remainder of the establishments were located as follows: Nova Scotia 3, New Brunswick 2, Manitoba 4, Suskatchewan 2, Alberta 4 and British Columbia 7.

The principal item of production was "awnings, all kinds", the output of which numbered 36,112 valued at 8458,225 . "Tents, all kinds", with a value of § $\$ 18,606$ came next in order of importance. "Covers, all kinds" were valued at $\$ 320,575$, "bags" at $\$ 150,778$ and "sleeping bags" at $\$ 115,491$. Other items of production are shown in table $\mathbf{3}_{\text {。 }}$.

The chief material, duck, was used to the extent of $1,286,108$ yards valued at $\$ 348,735$ 。 Awning stripe, 395,641 yards valued at $\$ 129,195$, was the second most important material. For further details see table 4 .

June, with 587 persons reported, and January, with 343 , represented respectively the months of maximum and minimum employment of wage-earners.
