THE COTTON AND JUTE BAG INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1934.

Reports were received from twenty-four establishments in 1934 whose principal output consisted of cotton and jute bags. This represented an increase of three over the number reporting in the previous year.

The statistics for the year 1934 show slightly increased activities for the industry. The gross value of production rose from \$7,481,842 in 1933 to \$8,622,644 in 1934, an increase of \$1,114,802 or over 15 per cent, while the capital invested was increased by \$116,690 or 2.2 per cent. The number of employees increased from 902 in 1933 to 922 in 1934, while the total salaries and wages paid rose from \$830,073 to \$879,098, an increase of \$49,025 or over 5 per cent. The cost of the materials used by this industry also increased by \$879,394 or 13 per cent over that paid in the previous year and the value added by manufacture shows a gain of \$261,408 or 15 per cent over that in 1933. The substantial gains mentioned above are, however, not due entirely to increased business activity. They are primarily due to the inclusion in 1934 of an establishment previously omitted. This was unavoidable as the particular firm in question was classified in another industrial grouping, the production of bags being of but minor importance. The variations in the principal statistics are shown by provinces in the following table for 1934 in comparison with 1933.

The location of this industry by provinces is: Quebec nine, Ontario nine, Manitoba five and British Columbia one. In order to avoid disclosing the operations of the establishment in British Columbia its figures have been merged with those of Manitoba. The percentage distribution of the principal statistics is shown in the following table, by provinces, for 1933 and 1934.

The output of cotton and jute bags accounts for practically the whole production in this industry. In 1934 this value was \$8,423,855 or 97.6 per cent of the total value of production. The corresponding figures for 1933 were \$7,308,818 or 97.7 per cent of the total.

The materials used consisted principally of jute and cotton fabrics, and their consumption in 1934 was 93,380,381 yards valued at \$6,275,200 or 95.8 per cent of the total. In 1933 the amount was 89,995,968 yards costing \$5,347,044 or 92.8 per cent of the total.

By referring to table 6 it will be observed that in the case of production ten establishments had an output valued at \$6,900,509 or 80 per cent of the total. Fifteen establishments supplied \$5,232,565 of the capital invested or 97.7 per cent of the total and fourteen establishments furnished employment to 832 employees, representing 90.2 per cent of the total number employed.

The number of wage-earners showed an increase of twenty in 1934, the month of highest employment being October with 834 persons furnished employment, while January with 750 persons was the month of minimum employment. In 1933 the corresponding months were November high with 814 and January and February low with 723.

Imports and exports are relatively unimportant in this industry. The value of the imports in 1934 was \$129,971 against a 1933 valuation of \$100,131. Exports in 1934 were valued at \$89,239 and in 1933 \$84,120.


