THE COTTON AND JUTE BAG INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1935.

Reports were received from twenty four establishments in 1935, whose principal output consisted of cotton and jute bags.

The statistics for the year 1935 show slightly decreased activities for the industry. The gross value of production fell from \$8,622,644 in 1934 to \$8,404,107 in 1935, a decrease of \$218,537, or over 2.5 per cent, while the capital invested decreased by \$131,553 or 2.5 per cent. The number of employees increased from 922 in 1934 to 924 in 1935 while the total salaries and wages paid fell from \$879,098 to \$872,127, a decrease of \$6,971 or .8 per cent. The cost of the materials used by this industry also decreased by \$86,337 or 1.3 per cent over that paid in the previous year.

The location of this industry by provinces is: Prince Edward Island 1, Quebec 9, Ontario 8, Manitoba 5 and British Columbia 1. In order to avoid disclosing the operations of the establishments in Prince Edward Island and British Columbia, statistics have been combined with those of Quebec and Manitoba, respectively.

The output of cotton and jute bags accounts for practically the whole production in this industry. In 1935 this value was \$8,249,743 or 98.2 per cent of the total value of production. The corresponding figures for 1934 were \$8,422,855 or 97.6 per cent of the total. Although the value of production decreased some 2.5 per cent, the physical volume, however, was 1.8 per cent greater.

The materials used consisted principally of jute and cotton fabrics, and their consumption in 1935 was 97,285,558 yards valued at \$6,170,418 or 94 per cent of the total. In 1934 the amount was 93,380,381 yards costing \$6,275,200 or 94.4 per cent of the total.

By referring to table 6 it will be observed that in the case of production ten establishments had an output valued at \$6,564,470 or 78 per cent of the total. Sixteen establishments supplied \$5,130,239 of the capital invested or 98,2 per cent of the total and fifteen establishments furnished employment to 845 employees, representing 91,4 per cent of the total number employed.

The average number of wage earners showed a decrease of 3 in 1935, the month of highest employment being November with 896 persons furnished employment, while February, with 723 persons was the month of minimum employment. In 1934 the corresponding months were October, high with 834 and January, low with 750.

Imports and exports are relatively unimportant in this industry. The value of the imports in 1935 was \$1.33,410, against a 1934 valuation of \$129,971. Exports in 1935 were valued at \$1.96,470 and in 1934, \$89,239,




