

THE COTTON AND JUTE BAG INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1938.

In 1938 reports were received from twenty seven establishments whose principal output consisted of cotton and jute bags.

In comparison with 1937, a general decrease in all items comprising the principal statistics occurred during 1938. There were 2 less establishments in operation; the capital investment showed a decline of \$1.015.471 whilst in employment, the number of persons fell from 944 to 873 with a corresponding decline in the payroll amounting to \$38.593. Expenditure for materials was \$129.097 less and the gross value of production decreased to the extent of \$935.442.

The location of this industry by provinces is as follows: Prince Edward Island 1, Quebec 8, Ontario 12. Manitoba 4, Saskatchewan 1 and British Columbia 1.

The output of the items cotton and jute bags accounts for practically the whole production in the industry. In 1938 this value was \$7.942.496 or 96 per cent of the total value of production.

The materials used consist principally of jute and cotton fabrics and their consumption in 1938 was 112 789 345 yards valued at \$5,944 069 or 92 per cent of the total cost.

By referring to table 3 it will be observed that in the case of production, eight establishments had an output valued at \$5,131,724 or 62 per cent of the total. Eighteen establishments supplied \$5,186,925 of the capital in vested, or 98 per cent, and eighteen establishments furnished employment to 812 persons, or 93 per cent of the total number given employment.

In 1938 the month of highest employment of wage earners was October with 821 persons so employed while April with 696 persons was the month of minimum employment. Female wage earners represented roughly 62 per cent of the total.

Imports and exports are relatively unimportant in this industry. The value of the imports in 1938 was \$142,744 against a 1937 valuation of \$181,402. Exports in 1938 were valued at \$57,303 and in 1937 at \$76,243.
