

THE COTTON AND JUTE BAG INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1942.

In 1942 reports were received from thirty establishments whose principal cutput consisted of cotton and jute bags.

The cotton and jute bag industry in 1942 operated at a slightly higher level than in the previous year. The value of production, amounting to \$20,749,873, was \$2,920,072 higher. The number of persons employed increased by 245 and the salaries and wages paid by \$276,342, while the value added by manufacture rose by \$432,359. In spite of only a small increase in the physical volume of production, the gross selling value at the factory of the products made increased by about 16 per cent. The increase in the value of production was mainly due to the higher costs for raw materials which advanced by \$2,482,372. The production of jute bags declined by 1,468,108 dozen, while cotton bags were 48,470 dozen higher. In addition to the bags manufactured by the industry from materials supplied by the establishments reporting, about 1,700,000 dozen cotton and silk powder bags were also made on commission, from materials supplied by the customer. There was also an increase of \$383,609 in the charges for repairing bags.

The production of cotton and jute bags, valued at \$18,777,878 in 1942 comprised about 90 per cent of the cutput of the industry. The repairing of bags amounting to \$984,661 and custom work amounting to \$435,717 were the other main items of production. For details of products made see table 4.

The location of this industry by provinces is as follows: Prince Edward Island 1, Quebec 9, Ontario 13, Manitoba 4, Saskatchewan 1, Alberta 1 and British Columbia 1.

The materials used consist principally of jute and cotton fabrics and their consumption in 1942 was 124,721,483 yards valued at \$15,231,583 or 92 per cent of the total cost.

By referring to table 3 it will be observed that the nine largest establishments reported a production of \$14,059,022 or 68 per cent of the total cutput. They also employed 6,784,654 or 71 per cent of the total capital and 636 or 48 per cent of the number of employees engaged in the industry.

In 1942 the month of highest employment of wage-earners was October with 1,340 persons so employed, while November and December with 1,011 persons were the months of minimum employment. Female wage-earners represented approximately 76 per cent of the total.
