# THE COTTON AND JUTE BAG INDUSTRY 1952

Commencing with 1952, the value of factory shipments f.o.b. plant has been collected in place of gross value of production for the cotton and jute bag industry. This is in line with a decision taken by the Bureau to convert from a gross value of production to a gross value of shipments approach in its annual survey of manufacturing. The change-over is expected to provide increased ease in reporting for the majority of plants while at the same time producing more reliable, more meaningful statistics in many cases.

The value of shipments was substituted for value of production in all industries where inventory change was insignificant and where, therefore, factory shipments approximate production. The change in finished goods inventory in the cotton and jute bag industry during 1952 was only an estimated \$224,000. The value of factory shipments did, therefore, differ relatively little from value of production for the year under review and is reasonably comparable with value of production figures for previous years.

The cotton and jute bag industry in 1952 reported factory shipments valued at \$30,196,073 f.o.b. plant which compares with the \$33,729,194 gross value of production reported in 1951. In terms of value of output, therefore, the industry operated at a considerably lower level. In terms of volume of production, however, there was a slight increase with the index based on 1949 rising from 100.7 in 1951 to 102.5 in 1952. This situation reflects the production of a substantially larger number of jute bags at a considerably lower average unit price. The average price per bag which fell from 36 cents in 1951 to 24.5 cents in 1952 resulted from the reduction in the price of jute cloth over the same period from an average of 23.7 cents a yard to an average of 16.6 cents a yard.

The cost of materials consumed fell from \$33,916,959 in 1951 to \$26,955,208, the 21 per cent drop resulting for the most part from the drop in the price of jute fabric. Employment was provided for 1199 persons, 113 less than the previous year, while salary and wage payments increased from \$2,483,760 to \$2,527,248 over the two years.

Shipments of jute bags in 1952 amounted to 5,547,172 dozen compared with the 4,225,605 dozen produced in 1951. Part of the increase in jute bag output was made at the expense of cotton bags whose number decreased from 4,154,319 dozen in 1951 to 3,479,074 dozen in 1952. The value of bags repaired fell from \$4,951,375 to \$2,584,659 during the same period.

The consumption of jute fabric amounted to 87,985,190 yards costing \$14,569,163 in 1952 compared with 67,606,245 yards costing \$15,998,177 in the previous year. Cotton cloth consumption fell from 45,916,850 yards costing \$12,561,771 in the earlier year to 36,566,439 yards costing \$8,514,792 in the latter.

The cotton and jute bag industry in 1952 consisted of 34 establishments of which 14 were in Quebec, 9 in Ontario, 4 in Manitoba, 3 in Alberta, 2 in British Columbia, 1 in Saskatchewan and 1 in Prince Edward Island. It is concentrated in the provinces of Ontario and Quebec which together accounted for 59 per cent of total shipments in the year under review.
