THE COTTON AND JUTE BAG INDUSTRY

1954

In 1954 the cotton and jute bag industry reported factory shipments having a value of \$26,517,109. This was a 4.7 per cent increase over the \$25,321,927 of the previous year. The gain in the industry's value of factory shipments was accompanied by a 2.3 per cent rise in the cost of materials used. The bureau's volume of production index, based on 1949, reflected a slight upward trend with the index at 104.8 in 1954 as against 102.5 in 1953. A small drop occurred in the number of people employed. Virtually no change took place in the average price of 18 cents for jute bags and 23 cents for cotton bags over the two years.

Employment was provided for 1,136 persons in 1954, a decrease of 60 from the 1,196 of the previous year, while salary and wage payments declined from \$2,677,515 in 1953 to \$2,629,619 in the year under review. The cost of materials used rose from \$21,611,488 in 1953 to \$22,114,334 in 1954.

Shipments of jute bags in 1954 amounted to 6,040,590 dozen compared with 5,658,484 dozen in 1953. Deliveries of cotton bags were down slightly, the figures for 1953 and 1954 being 3,770,946 dozen and 3,620,438 dozen respectively. The value of bags repaired rose from \$1,061,141 in 1953 to \$1,525,598 in 1954.

In 1954 the industry consumed 92,512,727 yards of jute cloth compared with 88,035,766 in 1953. The consumption of cotton fabric declined from 42,167,563 yards in 1953 to 40,316,655 yards in the year under review. Further details of factory shipments and materials consumed are given in Tables 3 and 4 of this report.

The cotton and jute bag industry in 1954 consisted of 37 establishments of which 15 were located in Quebec, 11 in Ontario, 5 in Manitoba, 2 in Alberta, 2 in British Columbia, 1 in Saskatchewan and 1 in Prince Edward Island. While total shipments in the industry were spread over seven provinces, over half of these were concentrated in Quebec and Ontario.

The industry was dominated by eleven large firms each having factory shipments of more than one million dollars and this group accounted for 50 per cent of the industry's employment and 59 per cent of its shipments. The stability of employment may be measured by the variation in production workers from 876 in March to 1,003 in September. Total capital, repair and maintenance expenditures amounted to \$300,000, down 50 per cent from the \$610,000 reported a year earlier.

Beginning with 1954, information on the value of year endinventory holdings at plant and plant warehouses is being collected as part of the annual Census of Industry. This data was formerly collected by a separate survey. The summarized results for the cotton and jute bag industry, for the year under review, will be found in Table 2.

Exports and imports of cotton and jute bags are very small in relation to the total Canadian market for these commodities. See Tables 6 and 7 for details of imports and exports.


