THE COTTON AND JUTE BAG INDUSTRY

1957

The level of operations in this industry declined quite sharply in 1957 from 1956 as indicated in the statistics of this report. In the year under review, a total of \$26,839,960 worth of goods was shipped from the factories of Canadian manufacturers of cotton and jute bags. This compares with \$29,108,048 in 1956 and represents a decrease of 7.8 per cent. The number of employees fell to 1,104 in 1957 from 1,162 in 1956, a decrease of 5.0 per cent; on the other hand, salary and wage payments rose by 4.2 per cent to \$3,009,234 from \$2,887,484. The cost of materials used in manufacture fell from \$23,705,742 in 1956 to \$21,416,328 in 1957, a drop of 9.7 per cent.

Shipments of jute bags at 7,004,550 dozen worth \$14.117,703 were greater in number but less in value when compared with the 6,815,991 dozen worth \$14,207,677 shipped in 1956. Cotton jute bag shipments decreased both in number and in value from 3.818.526 dozen worth \$10.050,568 in 1956 to 2,886,728 dozen worth \$7,430,364 in the current year. The value of bags repaired decreased from \$2,022,028 in 1956 to \$1,823,759 in 1957.

The consumption of jute fabric decreased slightly from 119.231,360 yards costing \$11.601.174 in 1956 to 110.327.171 yards costing \$11.165.428 in the year under review. The use of cotton fabric, amounting to 29,113,357 yards at a cost of \$6,314.608, decreased sharply from the 38,733,184 yards costing \$8,521,801 consumed in 1956.

Full details of products shipped and of materials consumed are to be found in Tables 3 and 4 of this report.

The cotton and jute bag industry in 1957 was comprised of 34 establishments, two less than a year earlier. Fourteen of these were to be found in Quebec, 11 in Ontario, 3 in Manitoba, 2 in Alberta, 2 in British Columbia, 1 in Prince Edward Island and 1 in Saskatchewan. Quebec and Ontario dominated the industry, accounting for well over 50 per cent of both employment and of factory shipments.

Eleven establishments, each having factory shipments with a value in excess of \$1,000,000, accounted for 54 per cent of the industry's employment and for 63 per cent of its shipments. Employment in the industry was steady throughout the year, ranging for production workers from a low of 836 in July to a high of 966 in January. Capital, repair and maintenance expenditures totalled \$284,000 in 1957, only slightly under the 1956 total but considerably below the average annual ammounts expended between 1946 and 1955.

Beginning with 1954, information on the value of year-end inventory holdings at plant and plant warehouses has been collected as part of the annual Census of Industry. This data was formerly collected by a separate survey. The summarized results for the cotton and jute bag industry, for the year under review, will be found in Table 2.

Exports and imports of cotton and jute bags are small in relation to the total Canadian market for these commodities. For details of imports and exports, see Tables 6 and 7.
