## THE COTTON TEXTILE INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1931.

This industry is dirided into five separate sections (1) Cotton Yarn and Cloth, (2) Cotton Thread, (3) Cottion and Wool Waste, (4) cotton Batting and Wadding and (5), Cotton Gonds, N. E, S, comprising all manufactures, the chief component of which is cotton, and which sannot properly be classified under any of the other sections.

In 1931, repnrts were received from ninety-three establishments, an increase of sixteen over the previolds year. Forty six of these were located in Ontario, thirtynine in Quebec, four in New Brunswick and one aach in Nowa Snotia, Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia.

The gross value of production in the cotton textile group arounted to $\$ 50,986,932$ in 1931 , a der rease of $\$ 7,600,434$ or 130 per cent from the 1930 value. The capital investment was $\$ 82,783,112$, a decrease of $\$ 5,406,595$ or 6,2 per cent. 17,577 persons were furnished emplnyment, 1,013 or $5: 5$ per cent less than in 1930, while the salary and wage bill amounted to $\$ 13,987,990$, a decrease of $\$ 573,959$ or 3.9 per cent. The cost of raw and other materials used was $\$ 26,210,708$ which showed a decrease from the previous year of $\$ 5,877,492$ or 20.8 per cent, The value added by manufacture amounting to $\$ 24,776224$ showed a decline of $\$ 722,942$ or 2,9 per cent. The variations in the whole group are shown in t,able 3.

In order to show the 1931 production in sufficient detail, it was found necessary to group tngether the ntput of the five industries, and the result is shom in table 4. The production of all sotiton fabrics was valued at $\$ 25,676,969$ in 1931 and comprised over fifty two per cent of the entire output... The production of grey cotton had a value of $\$ 10,502,799$, hut it mest be taken int consideration that part of this cotton was sold to other mills as material, where by further processing it was turned into dyed or printed cotton. Fabries of cotton and mixtures, including cheesecloth, acrounted for $\$ 3,598,215$. These various fabrics ara shom by the pound, lineal yard and value in table 4 Tire fabrias was another item of importance and in 1931 $10,614,484$ pounds walued at $\$ 3,407,800$ mere produced. Grey and other yarns spun for sale were $16,320,2: 76$ pounds worth $\$ 4,679,18 ?$. Cotton thread produced had a value of $\$ 3,206,216$. Blankets was another item of importance and their value was $\$ 1,247,578$.

The total cost of all. raw and other materials used was $\$ 26,210,708$ and $92,420,951$ pounds of raw cotton costing $\$ 11,286,785$ accounted for over 43 per cent of this total. $59,1.35,718$ yards of grey cotton valued at $\$ 5,583,548$ was the next largest i.tem, followed by yarns of notton, artificial silk, etc., $6,984,35$ ? pounds costing $\$ 3,357,442$. Dyes and colours were valued at $\$ 1,025,076$ and waste, rags, wipers, etc.. were also largely used.

> WAGES AND EMPLOYMENT IN THE COTTON TEXTILE INDUSTRY. JULY - DECEVBER, 1931.

The data relating to wages and empl nyment summarized in the accompanying table have been secured hy the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in co operation with the cotton textile industry in Canada. All figures areted are arerages relating to the last six

months in 1931. Weekly wages shown, relate to full time working hours, and take no account of part-time or overtime. Average weekly full time wages paid to the various classes of labour in the cotton textile industry ranged from \$11.00 for doffers to $\$ 25.69$ for loom fixers. The average full time wage for all employees amounted to $\$ 15,65$ per week of 53.9 hours. Plants operated for the most part upon a 50 or 55 hour week schedule. By reducing weekly figures to an hourly basis it was found that workers were paid an average of 29,0 cents per hour, while hourly earnings for the various occupations ranged from 20.5 cents for doffers to 48.1 cents for loom fixers.

It should be pointed out that while these figures form a partial basis upon which to make comparisons of labour costs, consideration should also be given in such comparisons to amounts contributed by industry towards such charges as workmen's compensation, unemployment insurance, etc. Proportions of production costs paid to labour differ widely from industry to industry and from country to country, but are seldom more than 40 per cent of total outlay.

Wages and Employment in the Cotton Textile Industry During the Last, Half of 1931.

Import,s and exports of cotton and it,s manufactures showed decided declines
in 1931. All imports were valued at $\$ 27,710,631$ in that year compared with a value of $\$ 42,949,24$ ? in 1930 . Exports in 1.931 were valued at $\$ 1,057,488$ compared with $\$ 1,712,576$ in the previous year. Detailed statistics of the various articles fmorted and exported, hy $p$ incipal countries, are contained in tables 6 and 7.

Gotton sewing thread, yarn and crochet, knitting, daming and embroidery yarn, in hanks, imported by manufacturers for manufacturing or spooling cotton sewing thread and crochet, knitting darning and embroidery cottons exclusively in their own factories -


In connection with imports of raw, partly manufactured and fully manufactured materials during the year 1931, while the total value showed a decline of $\$ 15,238,616$, or over 35 per cent from 1930, it was due largely to the drop in the cost of raw materials. For instance there were imported In $1930,100,314,317$ pounds of raw cotton at a cost of $\$ 14,216,310$, or slightly over fourteen cents per pound delivered at the factory. In 1931, $94,922,051$ pounds cost $\$ 8,666,696$, or a little more than nine cents per pound delivered at the factory. In $1930,8,266,462$ pounds of cotton linters cost $\$ 367,698$, while in $1931,8,524,866$ pounds cost only $\$ 271,119$. Rags, waste and garnetted material declined only l49,249 cwt. in 1931, but the value dropped by $\$ 987,720$.

It is not possible to make a comparison of volume in cotton fabrics between the two years, as this was reported in yards in 1930 and pounds in 1931.

## SECTION I.

## COTTON YAFN AND CLOTH.

In 1931 reports were received from thirty-four establishments whose principal manufactured products were cotton yarn and cloth, this being an increase of one over the number reporting the previous year.

In that year these establishments had a gross value of production of $\$ 43,136,423$, a capital investment of $\$ 74,023,179$, consumed raw and other materials to the value of $\$ 22,231,449$ while the value added by manufacture was $\$ 20,904,974$. Emplnyment was fumished to 15,802 persons who were paid $\$ 12,362,032$ in salaries and wages.

In comparison with 1930 there were the following variations. Production, a decline of $\$ 5,556,455$ or 11.4 per cent, Capital investment, a decline of $\$ 4,519,625$ or 5,8 per cent. The number of employees dropped 1,197 or slightly over 7 per cent, and the amount of salaries and wages decreased $\$ 642,761$ or almost 5 per cent. The cost of materials used showed a decline of $\$ 5,744,125$ or 20.5 per cent, while the value added by manufacture had a small increase over 1930 amounting to $\$ 1.87,670$. These variations are shown in detail in table 2.

The production of all cotton fabrics ranked first in importance in both 1931 and 1930. In 1931 there were $64,770,075$ pounds, equal to $239,290,419$ yards, valued at $\$ 26,676,969$ produced. Of this $31,912,830$ pounds, or $108,038,717$ yards, valued at $\$ 10,502,799$ consisted of grey cotton and $7,284,918$ pounds, or $29,328,965$ yards, with a walue of $\$ 3,778,305$ was bleached cotton. The production of cheese cloth was 1,079,968 yards valued at $\$ 62,806$. The amount of printed and coloured cotton produced was $25,572,327$ pounds or $101,922,737$ yards worth $\$ 12,395,865$. Some of the more important items in the latter category were broadcloth with $3,387,689$ pounds or $16,624,363$ yards worth $\$ 2,617,923$, ducks and drill and denim $10,348,408$ pounds or $20,869,800$ yards valued at $\$ 3,733,315$, flannelette and other napped fabrics $5,348,387$ pounds or $19,431,793$ yards valued at $\$ 2,508,412$, and shirtings $1,316,565$ pounds or $4,555,091$ ygrds worth $\$ ? 32,552$.

In 1930 the production of all cotton fabrics including cheese cloth was $235,127,166$ yards valued at $\$ 31,873,740$ and it will be observed that while there was a decrease in the value, in 1931, of $\$ 5,133,965$, there was an increase of $5,243,221$ yards in the volume. In 1930 there were produced $92,968,688$ yards of grey cotton galued at $\$ 9,996,447,66,638,785$ yards of bleached cotton worth $\$ 8,157,920$ and printed and coloured cotton accounted for $74,605,787$ yards worth $\$ 13,652,830$, of the balance.

Of grey cotton yarms for sale, there were produced in 1931 12,912,928 pounds valued at $\$ 3,591,053$, compared with $17,500,694$ pounds valued at $\$ 6,316,350$ in 1930 .

Tire fabrics was another important item of production, and in 1931 $10,614,484$ pounds of these fabrics valued at, $\$ 3,407,800$ were produced, comparing with a production of $10,798,216$ pounds worth $\$ 4,045,284$ in 1930 . In this connection it wi-l be noted that the volume was practically the same in the two years while value de lined by $\$ 637,484$ in 1931.

> COTTON YARN AND CLOTH.

The principal raw material used in this industry is, of course, raw cotton. In 1931 there were consumed $90,61,6,041$ pounds costing $\$ 11,164,444$ which was slightly over one-half the entire cost of all materials used. In 1930 96,982,551 pounds of raw cotton costing $\$ 1.5,988,223$ were used. Other important materials in 1931 were cotton yams $3,880,299$ pounds costing $\$ 1,144,225$, cottion waste $5,731,449$ pounds costing $\$ 368,241$, dyes and colnurs $\$ 1,012,322$ and chemicals $\$ 344,132$. Packing and shipping materials cost. \$254,399.

Tables 4 and 5 onvering detailed statistios of all products and materials of the Cotton Textile Group of Industries will be found on pages 4 to 7 inclusive.

By raterring to tahle 4 , it. will be noted that in 1931, sixteen establishments accounted for $\$ 35,775,779$ or almost. 83 per cent of the gross value of production, twenty three establishments supplied $\$ 69,535,554$ or nearly 94 per cent of the totiel amount of capilal investment, and twenty two establishments furnished employment to 14,68 ? persons or almnst. 93 per oent of the total number given employment.

Employment remained fairly steady in this indust,ry in 1931. The month of highest employment was May with $1 \mathrm{f}, 085$ wage earners, and September. with 13,818 was the lowest one Corresponding figures for 1930 were April with 17,578 and September with $15,23 ?$

The principal fuel consumed was bitrminous coal. 113,762 tons costing $\$ 639,82$ ? were used in 1.931 compared $w$ th a consumption of 111,959 tons costing $\$ 644,472$ in 1930 In 1931 the cost of electricity purchased for power was $\$ 906,180$ as against a cost of $\$ 960,853$ in 1930 .

Of the thirty four estahlishments reporting in 1931, fifteen were located in Quebec, fourteen in Ontaric, four in New Brunswick and one in Nova Scotia. The fifteen plants in Quebec produced $\$ 30,749,771$ or 71.3 per cent of the gross value of production, supplied $\$ 50,229,924$ ar 67.9 per cent of the capital investment, fumished employment. to 10,294 employees, or 652 per cent of the total number employed. The salary and wage hill was $\$ 8,071.269$, or 65.3 per cent of the total, the cost of all materials used hy these estahlishments was \$17,014,601, or 76.5 per cent, and the value added by manufacture was $\$ 1.3,735,170$, or 65.7 per cent of the total value.

SECTION II.
COTTON THREAD.

In 1931 reports were received from five establishments whose chief item of production was cotton thread. These plants reported a gross value of production of $\$ 3,308,520$, a capithl investment of $\$ 4,036,204$ and 650 employees, salaried and otherwise who were paid $\$ 612,938$ in salaries and wages. The cost of materials used was $\$ 1,299,332$ and the value added by manufacture amounted to $\$ 2,009,188$.

Three of these plants were located in Queber, and the other two in Ontario, they represented a decrease of two in the number reporting in 1930.

The gross value of production also decreased in 1931 by $\$ 508,348$ or 13.3 per cent, capital investment by $\$ 177,871$, or 4.2 per cent, the number of ernsloyees by 46 and salaries and wages by $\$ 25,977$. The cost, of materials used was lower by $\$ 278,329$, or $17 ?$ per nent and the value added by manufacture declined $\$ 230,019$, or 10.3 per sent.

The principal and practically the nnly production in this industry in 1931 consisted of threads of cotton, silk and art,ificial silk to the value of $\$ 3,277,278$. Similar production in 1.930 was valued at $\$ 3,786,923$ A detailed table of production, table 4, for the Cotton Textile Group will be found on pages 4 to 6 .

The principal materials used in the Cotton Thread Industry are yarns of cotton, silk and artificial silk, dyes, colours and chemicals and spools and spool wood. It is not possible to furnish detailed statistics of these items without disclosing the operations of less than three establishments, but in some cases they are included in table 5 on pages 6 and 7 covering materials used by the Cotton Textile Group.

SECTION III.
COTMON AND MOOL WASTE.

It is not possible to compare manufacturing operations in the cotton and Hool Waste Industry for the years 1930 and 1931 as several establishments, whose operations were included in the report on Cotton Textiles, N.E.S., in 1930 have been transferred to, and are included in the Gotton and Wool Waste report for 1931. While the tables contain figures for 1930 as well as for 1931, they are merely inserted for reference purpnses, and no attempt has been made to make a comparison between the two years.

Keports were received from fourteen establishment,s in 193], who reported a gross value of production of $\$ 1,285,1.20$, capjital j.nvestment of $\$ 813,063$, an employment list of 204 persons and a salary and wage bill of $\$ 194,693$. The cost of materials used was $\$ 898,609$ while the value added by manufacture amounted to $\$ 386,511$.

The principal manufactured product. in this industry in 1931 was waste of cotton and of wool of which $5,270,679$ pnunds valued at, $\$ 555,349$ was produced. In the same year, $8,37.2,47 ?$ pounds of wipers and rags, valued at $\$ 460,685$ were also produced. Other chief items were cotton and jute waste, batts and batting, cotton mops and cheese cloth. The chief materials included waste of all kinds, wipers, yarns, rags, clippings, mill ends, sweepings and cheese cloth.

It is impossible to puhlish detailed statistics covering the products and materials of this industry, for by doing sc, operations of individual establishments would be disclosed. In some cases the figures are included in tables 4 and 5 on pages 4 to ? inclusive.

SECTION IV。
COTTON BATTING AND WADDING.

Owing to the fact that a re alignment was made in the Batting and Fiadding Indust,ry through which certain manufactures included in this industry in 1.930 were transferred to others in 1931, it is impossible to make an equitable comparison of the two years. For the purpnse of reference, however, statistics covering both 1930 and 1931 are included in the tables comprising this report.

In 1931 reports were received from six establishment,s, four in Ontarin and two in Quebec, which reported a gross value of production of $\$ 721,782$, a capital invest,nent. of $\$ 1,366,925$, an employment list of 1.25 persons who were paid $\$ 156,719$ in salaries and wages, a consumption of raw and other materials to the value of $\$ 402,152$, and the value added by their manufacture of $\$ 319,630$.

The chief items of production in 1931 were automobile batts and pads, cotton felt, jute and jute batting and absorhent gauze. It is impossible to furnish detailed stratistics of these products for by so dning, the output of individual plants would be divulged. They are included to some extent in table 4 on pages 4 to 6 showing the total produntion of the Cotton Textile Group of industries.

Some of the more important materials include raw cotton, linters, waste cotton, surgical gauzes, cheese cloth, felt and chemicals. The same restrictions apply to materials as to products, and table 5 on pages 6 and $?$ covers the principal materials used in the Cotton Textile Group.

## SECTION Ve

COTON TEXTILES.N.E.S

This section cf the Cotton Texthie Group oomprises aill egtablishments using basic raw materials of which cctton is the rhief component and which cannot properly be classified in the other sections. The production covers a great variety of articles, the principal ones in 1.931 being comforters of cotton, down and wool, curtains and curtain material, bedspreads, pillows and cushions, quilted goods, muners, scarves and drapes, nouch and mattress onvers, tailoris supplies, such as canvas fronts, pads, etc, mhber thread and elastic, and aprons, gaiters and spats. A detailed table of production has not been puhlished, for in numerous instances it would disclose the nutput of less than three establishments. Table 4 on pages 4 to 6 covering the total production of the five sentions of the Cotton Textile Group includes also the production of the cotton N.E.S. Group for 1931 amounting to *2,535,087.

Report, were received from thirty-four establishments classified in this section in 1931. It, would appear that this is an increase of twelve over the number reporting in 1930, but such is not the case. Eight of the tivelve were transferred from other sections of the Cotton Textile Group, while four reported their operations for the first time. Inder these circumstances a comparison of operations for the two years would mean very little, and while the detailed tables include figures for 1930, they are inserted for reference purposes only and no attempt is made to reconcile the results of the two years.

Of the thirty-.four establishments, eighteen were Iocated in Ontario, fourteen in Quebec and one each in iuanitoba and Alberta. By referring to table 1 it will be observed that the larger proportion of production, capital, etc., is pravided by the province of Quebec. The gross value of production was $\$ 2,535,087$, capital investment was $\$ 1,943,741$ and employment. was furnished to 796 persons who were paid \$661, 608 in salaries and wages. The cost of raw and other materials used was $\$ 1,379,166$ while the value added by manufactimere amountied t.0 $\$ 1,155,921$.

Some of the principal materials used in this industry consist of fabrics of cotton, silk, artificial silk and canvas, Waste, kapok and felt, Cotton and artificial silk yams and thread, Iace, embroidery, tapes, bindings, etc., wadding, shoddy and batts and rubber thread and el.astic.

It is impossible to publish a detailed table of materials used, and they are included with those of the other four sections in table 5 on pages 6 and 7 covering all materials used in the Cotton Textile Grnup.
