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NOTE - The statistics published in this report
include only the statistics of those manufacturing ostablishments which have as thelr principal products, cotton articles or articles with cotton as the chief component material. Statisties relating to specific products are, therefore, not to be regarded as comprehensive, for similar products are also to be found as secondary ones in other industries.


## SECTION I <br> THE COTTON TEXTILE INDUSTRIES IN CANADA, 1939.

This industry is divided into six sections; (1) general review of the industey as a whole, (2) cotton yarn and cloth, (3) cotton thread, (4) cotton and mool waste, (5) cotton batting and wadding and (6) cotton goods, n.e.s. The last named industry comprises all manufuctures, the chief component of which is cotion and wiich cannot be properly classified under any of the other sections.

Revorts ::ere received fron 110 establishments in 1039 , being, one more than in the preceding year. The provincial distribution of these establishments is shown in Table 1 for 1933 and 1939.

A consideruble advance was mude by the cotton textile industries durine 1933 although it may be noted that the cotton yarn and cloth industry in particular was chiefiy reaponsible for the enlarged activity. The gross value of production of the combined cotton industries wis *31, 20,698 , which represented an increase of $\$ 14,024,516$ or 20.9 per cent as compared $: i$ ith the previous year. Capital invested increased by $\$ 20,343,530$ or 29,9 per cent to $\$ 30,621,130$. The total number of employees, 22,340 was an increase of 1,896 persons or 3.3 per cent and the amount paid out in salaries and wages, $\$ 19,120,445$ was greater by $\$ 2,345,597$ or 14,0 per cent than the 1938 disbursement, for that purpose. Materials used cost $\$ 41,397,000$, an increase of $\$ 6,143,046$ or 17.5 per cent.

In order to shon the production in this industry in adequate detail and at the same time avoid disclosing the operations of individual establishments, it has been found nocessary to group the output of the five individual industries, and this has been cone in Table 4. The same rocedure has been applied to matarials, which are shom in Table 5. However, my detailed lists of products und materials in the cotton yarn and cloth industry Jan be set up and this has been done in Section 2.

Fabrics, chiefiy of cotton und cotton mixtures, comprised the priacipal output of this industry. Treir value in 1333 was $\$ 47,450,133$, as corpared with a valustion of $\$ 39,053,262$ in 1938 , und they remresented about 60 per cent of the totill value of the output in the yeurs named. The all cotton fabrics produced had a value of $\$ 36,172,641$ in 1939 and $\$ 29,978,010$ in 1933 . Grey cotton fabric mias produced to the extent of $51,195,640$ pounds or $171,135,717$ yards valued at $\$ 15,047,312$ in 1333 as against $40,635,613$ pounds or $141,430,196$ yards worth $\$ 12,883,210$ in 1938 .

Yurns spun for sale in 1333 had a valuation of $\$ 10,835,048$ compred with $\$ 3,158,717$ in 1953. Cotton thread produced was valued at $\$ 3,456,753$ in 1933 and §5, 418,388 in 1938. Other important, itens were: tire fabrics, blankets, towels, etc. In Table 4 will be found the valuation of trese and all other items which could be shown, toscther with the quantity wherever possible.

The principal material used in this inaustry is raw cotton, and in 1933 its consumption wis $153,670,095$ pounds, with a laid down cost of $\$ 16,501,004$ or an
average price of 10.7 cents per pount. In 1933 the çuantity used mas $127,524,543$ pounds costing $\$ 1 \%, 771,372$ or an average of 10.3 cents per pound. Yarns of all kinds used cost $65,954,217$ in 1939 and $\$ 5,133,149$ in 1938 , cotton yarn being the dominant item. Yums of silk, real sund artificial, are also used to a considerable exbent. The expenditure for all kinds of fabrics totalled ${ }^{5} 9,166,324$ in 1939 and $03,009,333$ in 1733 , with cotton fabrics representing the greater part of the value. Fabries of silk, real and artificial, linen, canvas, etc. were responsible for the bulance. Dyes, blouches and chemicals cost $\$ 2,750,45$ in 1039 and $\$ 2,360,810$ in 1938.

The total cajital invested in the combined cotton textile industry in 1339 was $\$ 00,021,130$, in increase of $\$ 20,343,500$ over the previous year. Fixed capital, $\$ 58,180,797$, showed an increase of $\$ 14,399,860$, the remaincer leins accounted for by a rise of $\$ 6,443,740$ in working capital, due partly to a higher inventory value of milterials on herd, stocks in process, etc. but more largely to a greater total of cash, trading and operating accounts, etc. reported.

Imports of cotiton ard its manufactures totalled $\$ 35,050,726$ in $7.3 \% 9$, an inerease of $\xi 7,565,932$ as compered with 1938. Rat cotion imported during ly 193 umounted to $169,53,557$ pounds valued at $\$ 18,425,28 ?$ as against, $164,760,525$ pounds worth $\$ 12,872,808$ in 1938. Imports of fabries of verious kinds and nurerous other items are Eiven in Table 8. Exports of cotton and its manufactures are comparatively unimportent, the total value in l9*9 being e4,503,503 and in 19\%8, e3, 161,341 . The principal iten:s of export include cotion fabrics, rags, cuck, ciothing and underveur, and information concerning these will be found in mable 9.

## SECTION 2. - THE COTTON YARN AND CLOTH INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1939.

In 1939 reports were received from thirty-six establishments whose principal output consisted of woven cotton fabrics and cotton yarns, this being one less than the number reporting in 1938.

A considerable advance occurred in the activities of the cotton yarn and cloth industry during the year 1933, the gross value of production, $\$ 70,385,460$, being an increase of $\$ 13,329,845$ or 83.4 per cent. Employment was given to 19,723 persons, l,674 or 9.3 per cent more than in the previous year, and salaries and wages paid, $\$ 16,733,206$, were greater by $\$ 2,093,389$ or 14.3 per cent. Materials used cost $\$ 35,527,356$, an increase of $\$ 5,625,010$ or 18.8 per cent. Capital invested totalled $\$ 81,272,668$, which was an enlargement of $\$ 20,409,702$ or 33.5 per cent. Although working capital was greater than in the previous year, fixed capital, representing the present value of land, buildings, fixtures, etc., was alone responsible for an increase of $\$ 14,609,583$ or 36.7 per cent as compared With similar figures for 1939.

The provincial distribution of the thirty-seven establishments reporting in 1939 was: Quebec, fourteen; Ontario, eighteen; New Brunswick, three; and Nova Scotia, one.

Fabrics of all kinds accounted for $\$ 46,483,256$ or 66 per cent of the total value of production. Grey cotton fabrics were produced to the extent of $51,195,640$ pounds or $171,135,717$ yards, valued at $\$ 15,647,312$. In connection with fabrics it may be noted that all continuous filament artificial silk and spun rayon fabrics were produced with a selling value at the factory of $\$ 4,451,140$. Yarns spun for sale were valued at $\$ 10,801,152$, grey cotton yarn alone accounting for $\$ 7,786,710$ of this amount.

The principal material used in this industry is raw cotton and $153,218,287$ pounds costing $\$ 16,460,114$ were consumed in 1939. Cotton yarn used totalled 8,862,042 pounds valued at $\$ 2,363,139$ and continuous filament artificial silk yarns, 2,815,197 pounds worth $\$ 1,677,277$. of the grey cotton fabrics reported as produced in the industry, 22,045,098 pounds or 31,579,690 yards valued at $\$ 6,790,273$ went to other mills for further processing into printed and dyed cotton fabric, etc, and re-appear as materials used.

For further details of production or materials used see Tables 12 and 14 .

By referring to Table 15 it may be observed that 19 of the 36 establishments reporting had each a value of production in excess of $\$ 1,000,000$. These establishments accounted for 88 per cent of the gross value of production, 87 per cent of the employment given, 86 per cent of the salaries and wages paid and 87 per cent of the capital invested.

## SECTION 3. - THE COTTON THREAD INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1939.

In 1939 reports were received from six establishments whose chief output consisted of cotton thread. Four of these were located in Quebec and two in Ontario. These six plants reported a capital investment of $\$ 3,183,356$ and manufactured goods with a selling value at the factory of $\$ 3,557,905$. Employment was furnished to 760 persons who received $\$ 748,842$ in salaries and wages. Materials used cost \$1,550,530.

The cotton thread industry showed only minor variations during 1939. The gross value of production rose to the extent of $\$ 36,609$ or I.C per cent and $\$ 35,251$ or 2.3 per cent more was expended on materials. Employment was increased by 12 persons, or 1.6 per cent, and $\$ 23,287$ or 3.2 per cent more was paid out in salaries and wages. Capital invested declined by $\$ 81,204$ or 2.5 per cent.

Threads of cotton, silk and artificial silk are the main items of production in this industry. In 1939 these were valued at $\$ 3,527,351$, compared with \$3,493,990 in 1938 .

Yarns of cotton, silk and artificial silk are the principal materials used. In 1939, 2,109,397 pounds worth $\$ 1,190,567$ were consuned, and in 1938 the consumption was $2,179,685$ pounds costing $\$ 1,397,915$.

SECTION 4. - THE COTTON AND WOOL PIASTE INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1939.
The eighteen establishments reporting operations in the cotton and wool waste industry during 1939 recorded a gross value of production of $\$ 1,832,950$, Which represented an increase of $\$ 49,089$ or 2.8 per cent as compared with the previous year. Employment increased by 39 to a total of 366 persons and the amount disbursed in salaries and wages, $\$ 355,414$, showed an increase of $\$ 17,526$. The cost of materials used rose to $\$ 1,237,373$, this figure being $\$ 161,819$ or 15. C per cent akove the cost in 1938. Capital increased by $\$ 459,030$ or $\leqslant 3.3$ per cent to a total investment of $\$ 1,520,189$.

Washed and sterilized rags and wipers was the principal single item of output in this industry and in 1939 these were produced to the extent of $7,673,334$ pounds valued at $\$ 902,195$ as compared with $88,193,647$ pounds valued at $\$ 8 \% 1,461$ in 1938. Waste of cotton, wool, jute, etc., totalled 12,955, 719 pounds worth $\$ 631,387$ in 1939 and $11,690,746$ pounds valued at $\$ 696,920$ in 1938.

Under the heading materials used the consumption of waste of all kinds in 1939 was $14,428,735$ pounds, costing $\$ 499,283$, compared with $10,678,453$ pounds, worth $\$ 430,919$ in 1938. Wipers totalling 7,297,263 pounds worth $\$ 174,203$ were used in 1939 as against 7,585,228 pounds costing $\$ 426,207$ in 1938. Other materials used included mop yarns, rags and cliphings, cheesecloth and wooden handles.

SECTION 5. - THE COTTON BATTING AND WADDING INDUSMRY IN CANADA, 1939.

The four establishments reporting their operations in the batting and wadding industry in 1933 had a gross value of production of $\$ 937,061$, a decrease of $\$ 79,993$ or 7.9 per cent as compared with the previous year. Employment was provided for 161 persons, 13 persons or 8.3 per cent more than in 1938, and the combined salaries and wages paid, $\$ 227,691$, were greater by $\$ 27,941$ or 14.0 per cent. The cost of all materials used was lower by $\$ 36,043$ or 6.4 per cent. The amount of capital invested, $\$ 1,472,707$, represented an increase of $\$ 93,700$ or 6.3 per cent.

No single item of production can be shown in this industry without disclosing the operations of individual establishments. The production has, therefore, been grouped with other like articles wherever possible, and is shown in Table 4. The same procedure was applied to materials used, which are show in Tuble 5.

October was the month of highest emplnyment with 185 wage-oarners reported, while July represented the low with 120 wage-earners.

SECTION 6. - THE COTTON TEXTILES, N.E.S., IVDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1939.

In this section of the cotton textile industries are grouped all establishments using basic raw materials of which cotton is the chief component, and which cannot properly be classified in other sections.

The gross value of production reported by the 46 establishments classified under cotton textiles, n.e.s. in 1939 was $\$ 4,516,322$, an increase of $\$ 688,966$ or 18.0 per cent as compared with 1938. The cost of materials used rose by $\$ 357,009$ or 16.4 per cent to a total of $\$ 2,530,828$. Employment was given to 1,330 persons, 158 persons or 13.5 per cent more than in 1933 , and the payroll was larger by $\$ 152,954$ or 16.6 per cent, the total so disbursed in 1939 being $\$ 1,075,292$. Capital invested amounted to $\$ 3,172,260$, a decrease of $\$ 37,638$ or 1.2 per cent.

Twenty-four of the forty-six establishments reporting were located in Quebec, nineteen in Ontario and three in Manitioba. The total number reporting was one more than in the previous year.

While the articles produced in this industry are many and diversified, very few of them can be shown without divulging information concerning the operations of less than three establishments. The principal items were tapes and webbing, elastic and non-elastic, $\$ 785,175$; tailors' supplies, $\$ 852,322$; comforters, all kinds, $\$ 407,892$; curtains and curtain materials, $\$ 459,366$ and pillows and cushions, all kinds, \$157,165. Other items manufactured were: aprons, gaiters and spats, garters and suspenders, mattress, table and furniture covers, garment and shopping bags, powder puffs, muff beds, girdles, cheesecloth, etc.

Some of the principal materials used were: fabrics, cotton and other, $\$ 1,436,537$; yarns, cotton and other, $\$ 434,518$; thread, rubber and other, $\$ 143,700$. Other materials were: cotton waste, wool, wadding, shoddy and batts, kapok, tapes, bindings, fringes, etc., elastic, feathers and down, chemicals and compounds, etc.

The month of highest employment of mage-earners in 1939 was November when 1,375 wage-earners were reported. July, with 1,013 was the lowest.
