## SECTION I

## THE COTTON TEXTILE INDUSTRIE: IN CANADA, 1943

This industry is divided into six sections; (1) general review of the industry as a whole, (2) cotton yarn and cloth, (3) cotton thread, (4) cotton and wool waste, (5) cotton batting and wadding and (6) miscellaneous cotton goods. The last named industry comprises all manufactures, the chief oomponent of which is cotton and whioh ernnot be properly classified under any of the other sections.

Peak war.etime production in the cotton industries as a whole was reached in 1942. In that year total yarn production amounted to $215,293,653$ pounds, an increase of over fifty per cent as compared with 1939, but, due to the demand for coarse yarns for military fabrics, eto there was actually a slight decline in the production of fine yarns. Weaving facilities were also necessarily diverted largely to heavy fabrios, and this, together with the fine yarn situation, the insufficient amount of yarns available to hosiery and knit goods manufacturers, and the fact that requirements of heavy fabrics for civilian work clothing, etc.". ould not be met, intensified the problems of industrial and civilian supply. Domestic production was therefore supplemented to the greatest extent possible by increased imports. The partial inability of domestic producers to meet the very heavy demands of the war years was aggravated by the labour situation, and this reflected in both the decline in production apparent in 1943 as compared with 1942 and in the lower employment figures.

Reports were received from 157 establishments in 1943; being 2 more than in the preceding year. The provincial distribution of these establishments is shown in Table 1 for 1942 and 1943.

During 1943 the cotton textile industries produced goods with a selling value at the factory of $\$ 149,919,820_{\text {, }}$ which was a decrease of $\$ 14,528,678$ or almost 9 per cent as compared with the previous year. Employment was given to 27,076 persons, being a decline of 2,318 over the preceding year, also the amount paid out in salaries and wages. $\$ 32,330,930$, was smaller by $\$ 873,574$ or over 2 per cent. Naterials used cost $\$ 94,670,799$, an increase of $\$ 115,903$. Capital invested totalled $\$ 97,166,383$ 。

In order to show the production in this industry in adequate detail and at the same time avoid disclosing the operations of individual establishments, it has been found necessary to group the output of the five individual industries, and this has been done in Table 4. The same procedure has been applied to materials, which are shown in Table 5。 However, fairiy detailed lists of products and materials in the cotton yarn and cloth industry can be set up and this has been done in Section 2.

All fabrics produced other than for use in the manufacture of tires, had a value of $\$ 86$ n 222,787 in 1943 as against $\$ 98,424,318$ in 1942 Grey cotton fabric was the main item and in 1943 a total of $70,007,630$ pounds or $189,409,198$ yards were produced with a selling value at the factory of $\$ 33,371,433$. The 1942 production was $82,282,131$ pounds or $230,958,260$ yards worth $\$ 35,307,480$. In connection with this particular item, it should be noted that a very considerable yardage goes to

other inills for further processing，the amount so disposed of in 1943 totalling 103，535， 519 yards．

Yarns spun for sale in 1943 had a valination of $18,131,048$ compared with $\$ 10,357,115$ in 1942。 Tire fabries produced were valued at $\$ 9,997,956$ in 1943 and $\$ 9,003,536$ in 1942 ．For the same two years cotton thread was produced to the value of $\$ 6,275,987$ and $\$ 6,085,226$ respectively．Other important items weres blankets， towels，etc．In Table 4 will be found the valuation of these and all other items which could be shown，together with the quantity wherever possible．

The principal material used in this industry is raw cotton，and in 1943 its consunption was $198,750,563$ pounds，with a laid down cost of $\$ 46,254,240$ or an average price of 23.3 cants per pound．In 1942 the quantity used was 22：，353，243 pounds costing $\$ 39,595,811$ or an average of 17,2 cents per pound．Yarns of all kinds used cost $\$ 8,510,390$ in 1943 and $\$ 8,797,073$ in 1942 ，cotton yarn being the dominant item．The expenditure for all kinds of fabrics totalled $\$ 24,446,425$ in 2943 and $\$ 28,788,036$ in 1942 with cotton fabrics representing the greater part of the value．Dyes，bleaches and chemicals cost $\$ 3,877,361$ in 1943 and $\$ 4,647,425$ in 1942 。

SECTION 2。 $\lfloor T H E$ COTTON YARN AND CLOTH INDUSTRY IN CANADA， 1943.
In 1943 reports were received from forty establishments whose principal output consisted of woven cutton fabrics and cotton yarns．The gross value of production in the cotton yarn and cloth industry totalled $\$ 126,879,874$ ，which was a decrease of $\$ 15,019,646$ or 10,5 per cent。Employment was given to 23,526 persons， 2,270 or 8,8 per cent less than in the previous year，and salaries and wages paid， $\$ 28,146,211_{9}$ were lower by $\$ 1_{s} 158,216$ or 4 per cent．Materials used cost $\$ 80,663,290$ an increase of $\$ 33,292$ or 04 per cent．Capital invested totalled $\$ 85,060,925$ ， which was a decrease of $\$ 6,337,564$ or 7 per cent．

The provincial distribution of the forty establishments reporting in 1943 was；Quebec，sixteen；Ontario，twenty－one；New Brunswick，two；and Nova Scotia，one．

Fabrics of all kinds accounted for $\$ 86,222,787$ or 68 per cent of the total value of production．Grey cotton fabrics were produced to the extent of $70,0,0,630$ pounds or $189,409,198$ yards，valued at $\$ 33,371,433$ ．It may also be of interest to note that fabrics of continuous filament artificial silk were produced to the extent of $8,501,111$ yards valued at $\$ 2,347,502$ ．Production of fabrics of spun ray on，or mixtures of spun rayon totalled 11，010，235 yards with a value of $\$ 2,928,652$ ．Yarns spun for sale were valued at $\$ 18,037,015$.

The principal material used in this industry is raw cotton and 196，262，667 pounds costing $\$ 46,089,613$ were consumed in 1943 ．Cotton yarn used totalled $10,908,337$ pounds valued at $\$ 4,175,728$ ．Of the grey cotton fabrics reported as pro－ duced in the industry， $30,509,485$ pounds or $102,535,619$ yards valued at $\$ 14,091,368$ went to other milis for further processing into printed and dyed cotton fabric，etc． and remappear as materials used。

## THE COTTON TEXTILE INDUSTRILS IN CANADA, 1943

SECTION 3. - THE COTTON THREAD INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1943
In 1943 reports were received from seven establishments whose chief output consisted of cotton thread. Five of these were located in Quebec and two in Ontario. These seven plants reported a capital investment of $\$ 4,284,795$ and manufactured goods with a solling value at the factory of $\$ 6,332,525$. Employment was furnished to 970 persons who received $\$ 1,129,598$ in salaries and wages. Materials used cost $\$ 3,345,189$.

During 1943 the gross value of production in the cotton thread industry rose to the extent of $\$ 150,347$ or 2.4 per cent and $\$ 172,805$ or 5.4 per cent more was expended on materials. Employment was incressed by 37 persons, or 3.9 per cent, and $\$ 29,916 \mathrm{cr} 2.7$ per cent more was paid out in salaries and waces. Capital investat thereased to $\$ 210,047$ or 4.7 per cent.

Throads of cotton, silk and artificial silk are the main items of production in this industry. In 1943 these were valued at $\$ 6,311,891$ compared with $\$ 6,158,858$ in 1942 .

Yarns of cotton, sil: and artificial silk are the principal materials used. In 1943, $3,418,953$ pounds worth $\$ 2,815,754$ were consumed, and in 1942 the consumption was $3,426,115$ pounds costing $\$ 2,662,670$.

## SECTION 4. - THE COTTON AND WOOL WASTE INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1943.

The twenty-five establishments reporting operations in the cotton and wool waste industry during 1943 recorded a gross value of production of $\$ 5,168,303$ which represented an increase of $\$ 252,759$ or 5 per cent as compared with the previous year. Employment decreased by 1 to a total of 453 persons but the amount disbursed in salaries and wages, $\$ 670,604$ showed an increese of $\$ 76,117$. The cost of materials used rose to $\$ 3,770,209$, this figure being $\$ 106,105$ or 2.8 per cent above the cost in 1942. Capital decreased by 757,489 or 2.6 per cent to a total investment of $\$ 1,867,763$.

Washed and sterilized rags and wipers was the principal single item of output in this industry and in 1943 these were produced to the extent of $11,619,844$ pounds valued at $\$ 1,806,343$ as compared with $12,720,476$ pounds valued at $\$ 2,008,827$ in 1942. Waste of cotton, wool, jute, etce totalled 19, 01.5,830 pounds worth $\$ 2,272, \$ 98$ in 1943 and 17,954,734 pounds valued at \$2, 301,716 in 1942 .

Under the heading: materials used, the consumption of wasto of all kinds in 1943 was $20,386,125$ pounds, costing $\$ 1,785,132$ compared with $18,830,125$ pounds, worth $\$ 1,682,610$ in 1942. Wipers totalling $14,086,159$ pounds worth $\$ 1,452,493$ were used in 1943 as against $12,319,547$ pounds costing $\$ 1,251,374$ in 1942. Other materials used included mop yarns, rags and clippings, cheesecloth, etc.

## SECTION 5. - THE COTTON BATTING AND WADDING INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1943.

The four establishments reporting their operations in the batting and wadding industry in 1943 had a gross value of production of $\$ 2,852,489$, an increase of $\$ 184,149$ or 6.9 per cent as compared with the provious year. Bmployment was provided for 309 persons, 24 persons or 8 per cent more than in 1942, and the combined salaries and wages paid, $\$ 499,795$, were greater by $\$ 66,064$ or 15.2 per cent. The cost of all materials used rose by $\$ 248,103$ or 17.2 per cent. The amount of capital invested, $\$ 1,477,355$, represented a decrease of $\$ 144,199$ or 8.9 per cent.

No single item of production can be shown in this industry without disclosing the operations of individual establishments. The production, has, therefore, been grouped with other like articles wherever possible, and is shown in Table 4. The same procedure was applied to materials used, which are shown in Table 5.

May was the month of highest employment with 293 wage-earners reported, while August represented the low with 191 wage-earners.

## SECTION 6. - MISCELLANEOUS COTTON GOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA. 1943.

In this section of the cotton textile industries are grouped all establishments using basio raw materials of which cotton is the chief component, and which cannot properly be classified in other sections.

The gross value of production reported by the 81 establishments classified under miscellaneous cotton goods in 1943 was $\$ 8,586,629$ a decrease of $\$ 96,287$ or 1 per cent as compared with 1942. The cost of materials used fell by $\$ 444,402$ or 7.8 per cent to a total of $85,204,156$. Employment was given to 1, 818 persons, 108 persons or 5.6 per cent less than in 1942 but the payroll increased by $\$ 112,545$ or 6.3 per cent, the total so djsbursed in 1943 being $\$ 1,884,722$. Capital invested amounted to $\$ 4,481,545$ a decrease of $\$ 51,720$ or 1.1 per cent.

Forty-nine of the eighty-one establishments reporting were located in Quebec, twenty-nine in Ontario, two in Manitoba and one in British Columbia. The total number reporting was six more than in the previous year.

While the articles produced in this industry are many and diversified, very few of them can be shown without divulging information concerning the operation of less than three establishments. The principal items were tailors' supplias, $\$ 2,151,879$ bedspreads, all kinds. $\$ 1,163,731$ comforters, all kinds, $\$ 649,795$ ourtains and curtain materials. \$1,467.946 and pillows and cushions, all kinds, $\$ 243,097$. Other items manufactured weres aprons, gaiters and spats, garters and suspenders, mattress, table and furniture covers, garment and shopping bags, powder puffs, muff beds, processing of cheesecloth, etc.

The principal material used was fabrics ${ }_{n}$ cotton and other, $\$ 4,120,912$. Other materials were, cotton and other yarns, thread, cotton waste, wool, wadding, shoddy and batts, kapok, tapes, bindings, fringes, etc., elastic, feathers and dow, chemicals and compounds, etc.

The month of highest employnent of wagewearners in 1943 was May when 293 wage-earners were reported. August with 191 was the lowest.
