

DYEING AND FINISHING OF TEXTILE GOODS IN CANADA, 1942

In 1942 reports were received from forty-two establishments engaged in the dyeing and finishing of textile goods. These include only those establishments whose occupation is primarily the dyeing and finishing of such goods, and do not include textile manufacturers who operate a dyeing and finishing plant or department in connection with their own manufacturing operations. The capital invested in these forty-two establishments in 1942 amounted to \$7,618,643. Employment was furnished to 1,693 persons who were paid the sum of \$2,274,715 in salaries and wages. The gross value of the work performed amounted to \$8,096,566 and the value added by work performed totalled \$4,830,037.

This industry is confined to the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia. Ontario with eighteen establishments, employed 823 persons, while Quebec, with twenty-two establishments, and Nova Scotia, with two together employed 870. Ontario employed over 63 per cent of the capital and almost 49 percent of the total number of employees.

This industry operated at a considerably higher level in 1942. Compared with the previous year there was an increase of \$859,248 or nearly 12 per cent in the value of work performed, with an increase of \$1,233,181 or 34 per cent in the value added by work performed. Reflected in the increased output was the increase of 106 in the number of persons employed and \$354,809 in the amount of salaries and wages paid. The capital invested was also \$1,047,959 higher.

The gross value of the work performed in 1942 amounted to \$8,096,566 of which \$4,107,958 or approximately 50 per cent, was represented by the dyeing and finishing of textile fabrics. The dyeing and finishing of yarns amounted to \$2,407,472 or 30 per cent, while the printing and painting of fabric and all other work totalled \$1,581,136. The various items are shown in detail in table 3.

As indicated in table 8, there is little or no seasonal variation in employment in this industry. The great majority of the wage-earners are male, and numbered 1,117 or 80 per cent of the total in 1942 while the female wage-earners totalled 274. The average annual wages was \$1,098 compared to \$967 in 1941 while the average salary rose from \$2,356 in that year to \$2,474 in 1942.
