### DYFING AND FINISHING OF TEXTILE GOODS IN CANADA, 1943

In 1943 reports were received from forty establishments engaged in the dyeing and finishing of textile goods. These include only those establishments whose occupation is primarily the dyeing and finishing of such goods, and do not include textile manufacturers who operate a dyeing and finishing plant or department in connection with their own manufacturing operations. The capital invested in these forty establishments in 1943 amounted to \$7,897,269. Employment was furnished to 1,656 persons who were paid the sum of \$2,446,760 in salaries and wages. The gross value of the work performed amounted to \$9,008,917 and the value added by work performed totalled \$5,509,861.

This industry is confined to the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia. Ontario with sixteen establishments, employed 767 persons, while Quebec, with twenty-three establishments, and Nova Scotia, with one together employed 889. Ontario employed over 63 per cent of the capital and over 46 per cent of the total number of employees.

This industry operated at a considerably higher level in 1943. Compared with the previous year there was an increase of \$912,351 or nearly 13 per cent in the value of work performed, with an increase of \$679,824 or 14 per cent in the value added by work performed. However there was a slight decrease of 37 in the number of persons employed but the amount of salaries and wages paid was \$172,045 more. The 'capital invested was also \$278,626 higher.

The gross value of the work performed in 1943 amounted to \$9,008,917 of which \$4,579,314 or approximately 50 per cent, was represented by the dyeing and finishing of textile fabrics. The dyeing and finishing of yarns amounted to \$2,430,084 or 27 per cent, while the printing and painting of fabrics and all other work totalled \$1,999,519. The various items are shown in detail in table 3.

As indicated in table 8, there is little or no seasonal variation in employment in this industry. The great majority of the wage-earners are male, and numbered 1,003 or 75 per cent of the total in 1943 while the female wage-earners totalled 326. The average annual wages was \$1,188 compared to \$1,098 in 1942 while the average salary rose from \$2,474 in that year to \$2,651 in 1943.
