#### DYEING AND FINISHING OF TEXTILE GOODS IN CANADA, 1944

In 1944 reports were received from forty establishments engaged in the dyeing and finishing of textile goods. These include only those establishments whose occupation is primarily the dyeing and finishing of such goods, and do not include textile manufacturers who operate a dyeing and finishing plant or department in connection with their own manufacturing operations. Employment was furnished to 1667 persons who were paid the sum of \$2,516,012 in salaries and wages. The gross value of the work performed amounted to \$6,951,347 and the value added by manufacture totalled \$5,137,881.

The industry is confined to the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Ontario with sixteen establishments employed 770 persons, while Quebec with twenty-four establishments reported 897 persons. Quebec with about 53 per cent of the employees and 54 per cent of the value of production is the most important centre of the industry.

This industry operated at about the same level as in the previous year. The heavy decline in the value of materials used and in the value of work performed is not due to a drop in the physical volume of production, but to a change in method of compilation. The value of materials purchased on own account was eliminated from both the value of materials used as well as the products made, the amount received for processing such materials only being considered as the value of products made. Conditions in the industry during 1944 is more accurately reflected by the small increase of 11 in the number of persons employed with an increase of \$69,252 in the salaries and wages paid.

The gross value of the work performed in 1944 amounted to \$6,951,347, of which \$4,354,304 or approximately 63 per cent, was represented by the dyeing and finishing of textile fabrics. The dyeing and finishing of yarns amounted to \$659, 031 or 10 per cent, while the printing and painting of fabrics and all other work totalled \$1,938,012. The various items are shown in detail in table 3.

As indicated in table 8, there is little or no seasonal variation in employment in this industry. The great majority of the wage-earners are male, and numbered 1027 or 75 per cent of the total wage earners in 1944 while the female wage-earners totalled 346. The average annual wage was \$1,251 compared to \$1,188 in 1943 while the average salary rose from \$2,651 in that year to \$2,716 in 1944.
