DYEING AND FINISHING OF TEXTILE GOODS IN CANADA, 1945

In 1945 reports were received from forty establishments engaged in the dyeing and finishing of textile goods. These include only those establishments whose occupation is primarily the dyeing and finishing of such goods, and do not include textile manufacturers who operate a dyeing and finishing plant or department in connection with their own manufacturing operations. Employment was furnished to 1,922 persons who were paid the sum of \$2,923,684 in salaries and wages. The gross value of the work performed amounted to \$8,331,308 and the value added by manufacture totalled \$6,196,990.

The industry is confined to the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Ontario with sixteen establishments employed 933 persons, while Quebec with twenty-four establishments reported 989 persons. Quebec with over 51 per cent of the employees and about 50 per cent of the value of production is the most important centre of the industry.

This industry operated at a substantially higher level of production during 1945 which is reflected in an increase of 255 in the number of persons employed and \$407,672 in the salaries and wages paid. There was also an increase of \$1,379,961 or 19.8 per cent in the value of work performed.

The gross value of the work performed in 1945 amounted to \$8,331,308 of which \$5,483,574 or approximately 66 per cent, was represented by the dyeing and finishing of textile fabrics. The dyeing and finishing of yarns amounted to \$936,—786 or 11 per cent, while the printing and painting of fabrics and all other work totalled \$1,910,948. The various items are shown in detail in table 3.

As indicated in table 8, there is little or no seasonal variation in employment in this industry. The great majority of the wage-earners are male, and numbered 1,133, or 70 per cent of the total wage earners in 1945 while the female wage-earners totalled 472. The average annual wage was \$1,249 compared to \$1,251 in 1944 while the average salary rose from \$2,716 in that year to \$2,745 in 1945.

The decline in the value of materials used and the value of work performed is due to a change in the method of compilation. The value of materials purchased on own account was eliminated from both the value of materials used as well as the products made, the amount received for processing such materials only being considered as the value of products made.
