THE NARROW FABRICS INDUSTRY

1952

Commencing with 1952, the value of factory shipments f.o.b. plant has been collected in place of gross value of production for the narrow fabrics industry. This is in line with a decision taken by the Bureau to convert from a gross value of production to a gross value of shipments approach in its annual survey of manufacturing. The changeover is expected to provide increased ease in reporting for the majority of plants while at the same time producing more reliable, more meaningful statistics in many cases.

The value of shipments was substituted for value of production in all industries where inventory change was insignificant and where, therefore, factory shipments approximate production. In the narrow fabrics industry the finished goods inventory at plant at end of 1952 was practically the same as at end of 1951, the change being a mere \$1,000 (estimated). The value of factory shipments did, therefore, differ very little from value of production for the year under review and is reasonably comparable with value of production figures for previous years.

The factory shipments made by the narrow fabrics industry in 1952 had a value f.o.b. plant of \$16,715,760 which amount is slightly less than the \$16,907,298 gross value of production reported in 1951. Employment was provided for 2,035 persons, 8 per cent below 1951, while salaries and wages paid fell by about 3 per cent from \$4,753,850 to \$4,629,909 over the two years. The cost of materials used at \$7,960,677 was down slightly from the \$8,081,312 reported a year earlier.

Reports were received from 52 establishments in 1952, 6 more than in 1951. The industry is confined to Ontario and Quebec with the two provinces having 22 and 30 establishments respectively. Quebec occupied the dominant position with shipments amounting to \$11,420,919 or 68 per cent of total and with employees numbering 1,357 or 67 per cent of all persons employed by the industry.

Five establishments, each reporting shipments in excess of \$1,000,000, together accounted for a value of goods shipped amounting to \$9,109,995 or 54 per cent of the industry total. They provided employment for 1,024 persons which is about 50 per cent of all persons employed.

Webbing which was shipped to the value of \$4,206,111 in 1952 proved to be the most important single commodity. Other leading commodities were ribbons with shipments valued at \$2,719,859 and tapes with shipments worth \$1,637,262. Other items of production include bindings, braids, cords, fringes, lace, laces, tassels and trimmings.

Of the materials used, yarn accounted for about 80 per cent of the total cost. Cotton yarn is used much more extensively than any other type of yarn. The consumption of cotton yarn in 1952 was 3,391,908 pounds costing \$3,390,337 compared with 2,992,282 pounds costing \$3,406,353 in 1951. The consumption of continuous filament rayon which amounted to 1,132,707 pounds worth \$966,705 was practically unchanged while the utilization of spun rayon yarn increased slightly from 368,703 pounds worth \$363,061 in 1951 to 413,850 pounds worth \$445,327 in 1952. Nylon yarn consumption was also up, from 207,553 pounds at a cost of \$584,476 in 1951 to 250,579 pounds costing \$680,991 in the year under review.
