THE SILK INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1930

The silk industry in Canada is divided into two distinct branches, real silk and artificial silk. However, due to the fact that there are but two plants in the latter section the figures for both branches of the industry must therefore be combined so as not to disclose the operations of individual establishments. In 1930 there were 25 plants in operation, all of them located in the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. The plants in Quebec numbered 15 with only 1 plant producing artificial silk yarns, the bigger part of which was used by the same firm for weaving artificial silk fabrics. In Ontario there were 10 plants, one of which manufactured only artificial silk yarns which were sold to hosiery and knit goods mills as well as producers of silk fabrics. The principal manufactured articles of this industry are broad silks, silk yarns and thread, sewing, embroidery and floss silk as well as hosiery, ribbons, braids and bindings.

The year 1930 saw new production records established in the silk industry. During the year one establishment was closed, one was absorbed by another and four new ones were put in operation, bringing the total number to 25, a net gain of two plants over the previous year. These 25 plants represent a capital investment of \$30,506,060 in land, buildings, equipment, inventories and other assets; they gave employment to 5,393 persons who received \$4,718,590 in salaries and wages and produced goods valued at \$17,808,598 while the amount spent for materials totalled \$7,633,329, leaving the value added by manufacture at \$10,175,269.

The remarkable progress made by this industry since 1917 is summarized in table 2. During this period the number of establishments increased 178 per cent, capital invested 1,272 per cent, employees 554 per cent, salaries and wages 1,102 per cent, materials used 812 per cent and gross value of products 651 per cent.

Both exports and imports of real and artificial silk and their products showed considerable decreases in 1930 as compared with 1929. The exports amounted to \$351,112 in 1930 as against \$383,494 in 1929, a decrease of \$32,382. The largest markets in 1930 for these products were in South Africa and the British West Indies.

Imports showed a decrease of \$7,486,159 in 1930. Importations of real silk amounted to \$21,000,571 and artificial silk to \$13,780,922, a total of \$34,781,493 as against total importations of \$42,267,652 in 1929. The principal countries of import for real silk and its products were, United Kingdom, United States, France, Netherlands, Switzerland and Japan. The principal articles imported included raw and unmanufactured silk, yarns, thread, etc., silk piece goods and woven fabrics, velvets, plushes, etc., silk clothing and wearing apparel.

In the artificial silk section, yarns, threads, warps, piece goods, socks and stockings, clothing and wearing apparel constituted the chief items of importation.

Size of Establishments

In view of the tendency towards concentration in industrial enterprises a series of tables has been prepared presenting in a threefold way the size of establishments in the Silk industry measured by (a) capital investment, (b) gross value of production and (c) employment. These tables when compared for a term of years indicate the movement of capital, production and employment within the industry.

Several changes took place in the industry in 1930. The average capital investment decreased from \$1,229,507 in 1929 to \$1,220,242 in 1930. In gross value of products, the average per establishment shows an increase from \$629,395 in 1929 to \$712,344 in 1930, while the average number of employees per plant also rose from 190 in 1929 to 216 in 1930. These tables also indicate the degree of large scale production which obtains in this industry. Five of the largest mills for example, had an output valued at \$11,626,962 or 65.3 per cent of the total.

PRODUCTION

The output of silk and silk goods in Canada amounted to \$17,808,598 in 1930 an increase of \$3,332,518 or 23 per cent as compared with the previous year. Piece goods of real silk valued at \$6,308,859 was the chief item of production while the output of piece goods of artificial silk and artificial silk mixtures with a value of \$5,214,314 was next in importance. Silk and artificial silk yarns and thread valued at \$3,853,359 was another item of production. Under the heading of "all other products" are included, ribbons, braids and bindings, hosiery, shoe laces and corset laces. In reporting production in this industry it has been found necessary to make broader classifications so as not to disclose the output of individual plants.

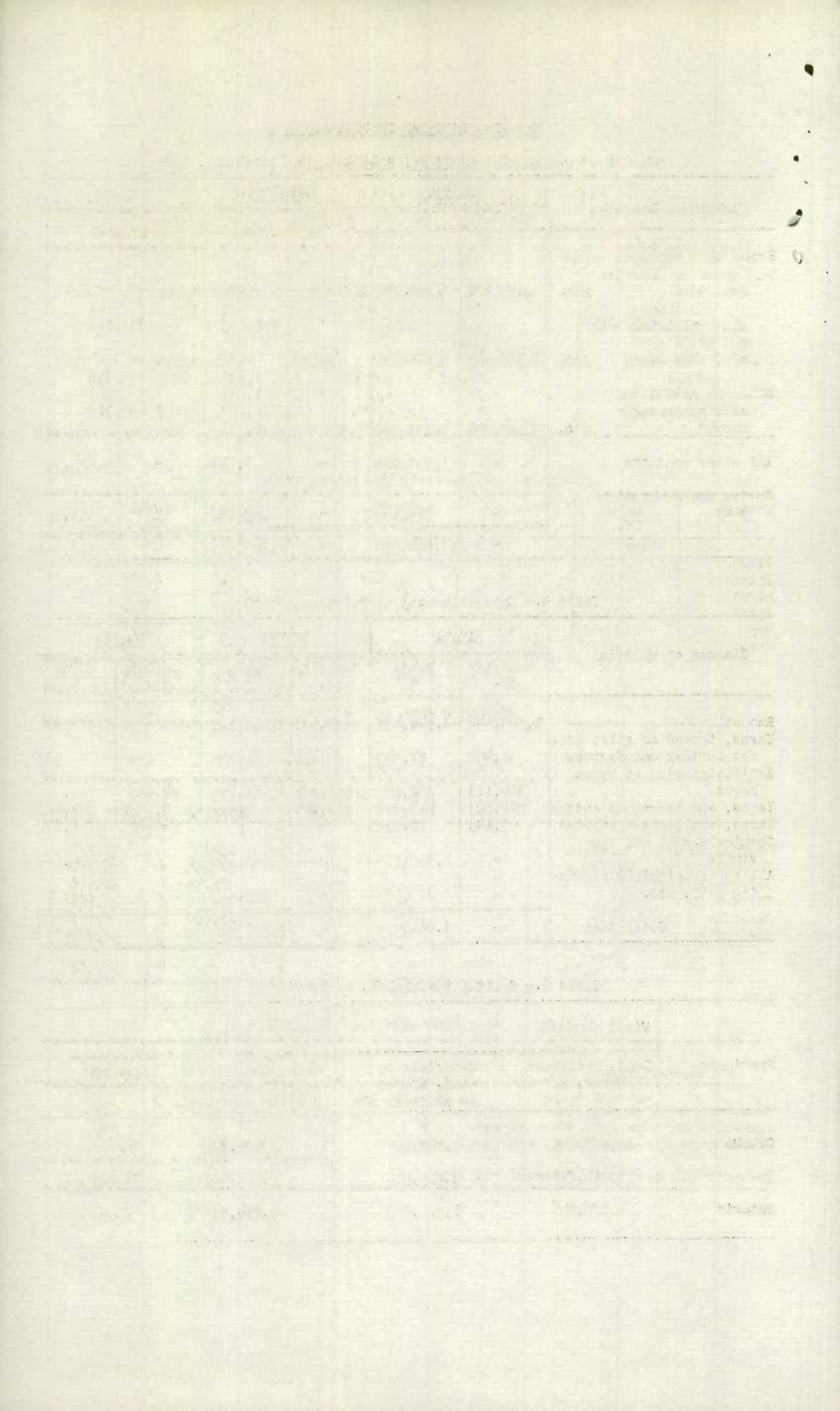
