Statistics published in this report cover only those establishments which manufacture principally artificial and real silk fabrics, yarns, embroidery thread, etc. Statistics for specific products are, therefore, not to be regarded as the total production in Canada as some of these products are also found as secondary products in the "cotton yarn and cloth" and "cotton thread" industries.

ARTIFICIAL AND REAL SILK INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1937.

The silk industry in Canada is divided into two distinct branches -- real silk and artificial silk -- but, owing to the fact that the manufacture of the latter is largely concentrated in a few establishments, it is necessary to combine these statistics in order to avoid disclosing individual information. It is also necessary to show production on rather broad lines, and some individual items cannot be shown at all but have to be grouped with others, or under "all other products", if the disclosure of individual figures is to be avoided.

The outstanding feature of the textile situation in Canada during the depression years was the spectacular expansion of the silk industry at a time when practically all other industries were experiencing a diminishing demand for their products. Other industries had to struggle hard to regain the 1929 level of production but this industry, with no recession to overcome, showed annual advances until 1936, in which year a slight decline as compared with the previous year occurred. An upward trend, however, was again evident in 1937 and in that year this industry stood above the 1929 level by 21 per cent in capital investment, 134 per cent in the number of employees, 138 per cent in salary and wage payments, 72 per cent in the cost of materials used and 93 per cent in the gross value of production.

In 1937 the gross value of production was \$27,871,292, an increase over the 1936 value of \$940,471 or 3.5 per cent. The amount of the capital investment was \$34,135,176, a decrease of \$812,467 or 2.3 per cent. Employment was furnished to 10,246 persons, which was an increase of 57 persons or less than one per cent. while the \$9,099,437 paid out in salaries and wages represented an increase of \$222,064 or 2.5 per cent. The cost of raw and other materials used, amounting to \$10,453,196, decreased by \$279,175 or 2.6 per cent.

In 1937 reports were received from twenty-nine establishments, a decrease of six from the number reporting the previous year. The provinces of Ontario and Quebec accounted for all the manufacturing activities in the silk industry.

The principal items of production in 1937 were fabrics of real silk, artificial silk and real and artificial silk mixed, their combined production amounting to 36,036,313 yards worth \$15,649,531, or about 56 per cent of the total products made by the industry. A decrease in the importance of these fabrics as related to the total production may be noted from the fact that the corresponding figures for 1936 were 36,326,911 yards valued at \$15,995,020, or approximately 60 per cent of the whole. The 1937 production of real silk fabrics was 4,010,684 yards valued at \$2,100,023 or an average price of fifty-two cents per yard. This was a decrease of 2,041,046 yards as compared with the previous year. The output of artificial silk fabrics, however, showed an increase over 1936, the 1937 production amounting to 28,848,322 yards worth \$11,952,657, or an average price of forty-one cents per yard, whereas the production in 1936 was 26,963,190 yards with a value of \$11,162,833. Real and artificial silk mixtures declined to some extent both in

volume and average price per yard. In 1937 the output was 3,177,307 yards with a value of \$1,596,851, or an average price of 50 cents per yard, and in 1936, 3,311,991 yards valued at \$1,779,453, or an average price of 54 cents per yard. The production of real and artificial silk yarns, threads, embroidery, etc., for sale amounted to 10,884,808 pounds worth \$7,254,259 in 1937, as against an output of 8,760,034 pounds valued at \$6,012,924 in 1936.

Among the materials used in this industry, yarns of all kinds amounted to 5,603,881 pounds worth \$4,179,804 in 1937. Similar consumption in 1936 totalled 5,723,272 pounds worth \$4,385,027. Artificial silk yarn alone accounted for 4,040,965 pounds valued at \$2,635,255 in 1937 and 4,309,785 pounds with a value of \$2,834,916 in 1936. Raw silk was consumed to the extent of 579,880 pounds worth \$1,069,391 in 1937 and 859,103 pounds with a value of \$1,581,571 in 1936. Chemicals of all kinds and dyes used were valued at \$2,880,653 in 1937 and \$2,580,707 in 1936. These and other items are shown in detail in table 4 of this report.

By referring to table 6 it may be observed that six establishments accounted for 75 per cent of the gross value of production, 73 per cent of the employment given and 82 per cent of the capital invested.

The average number of wage-earners employed in 1937 was 9,224 persons, 56 more than in 1936. Of these 5,579 were males and 3,645 females. April, with 9,369 wage-earners reported, was the month of maximum employment, while June with 8,963 was the minimum.

In 1937 imports of real and artificial silk and their manufactures totalled \$12,095,328, an increase of \$2,766,645 as compared with 1936. Imports of real silk were valued at \$8,020,319 and of artificial silk at \$4,075,009, with increases over the previous year of \$1,240,245 and \$1,526,400 respectively.

The exports of real and artificial silk and their manufactures showed an increase in 1937 in which year the value was \$4,870,847, as compared to \$3,818,158 in 1936. The value of real silk and its manufactures exported amounted to \$3,170,700 in 1937 as compared to \$2,979,881 in 1936, while artificial silk and its manufactures were valued at \$1,700,147 in 1937 and \$838,277 in 1936. Silk stockings and socks are the main products exported. In 1937 the exports of these totalled 487,234 dozen pair valued at \$2,962,201 this being an increase of 55,651 dozen pair in the volume and \$241,851 in the value.
