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## ARTIPICIAL AMD REAL SILK INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1933

The silk indurtry in Canada is divided into two distinct braacies - real silk and artificial silk - but, owiag to the fact that the manufacture of the latter is largaly concontrated in a far ostablishments, it is necessary to combine these statistics in order to avoid disclosing individual information. It is also necessary to show production on ratier broad limes, and some individual items cannot be shown at all but have to be grouped with others, or under "all other products", if the disclosure of individual figures is to be avoided.

In 1939 roports were received from twonty-six ostablishments, two less than in 1938. Ninetaen of these establishments were located in Quebec, and seven in Ontario.

While the spsctacular advance of the artificial and real silk industry during the depreesion yeare did not continue beyond 1335, the fluctuations occurring since tiat time have loft the industry atill goll above the 1323 lovel. The declines reported in 1938 which wers of considerable proportione, were not entirely mads up in 1939, although increases occursed in the latter year as compared with the former. The gross value of production in 1939, whicil amounted to $\$ 25,440,527$, represented an incrase of $\$ 1,568,535$ or 6.6 per cent, and the cost of matorials used, $\$ 3,872,472$, was greater by $\$ 990,315$ or 11.1 per cont. Paploymont did not follow the upward moverant, the 8,221 persons reported baing 701 or 7.9 per cont fewer than in the previous year, although the amount paid out in salaries and wages, $\$ 7,972,404$, was mailer by only $\$ 175,437$ or 2.2 per cent. Total capital invastai, $\$ 32,343,433$, showed an increase of $\$ 563,230$ or 1.8 per cont.

The production of woven fabrics of continuous filament artificial silk and of mixtures containing artificial silk and real silk or cotton increased from $32,503,804$ yards valued at $\$ 13,713,026$ in 1938 to $38,378,208$ yards with a value of $\$ 15,722,268$ in 1933. All silk woven fabrics decreased from $4,166,663$ yards morth $\$ 1,854,366$ in 1938 to $1,184,119$ yarde valued at $\$ 740,937$ in 1939 . For a further braakdom of the above, and for such other items as may be shom, see table 3.

Continuous filament artificial yarn was the leading matorial ueed,4,656,797 pounde worth $\$ 2,935,014$ being consurned in 1339. Chemicals and dyestuffs wore an important item, the cost of these boing roported as $\$ 2,530,601$. Refarence should be had to table 4 for such details as can be published.

Considering wage-earnerg only, it may be noted that the average monthly employment of males was 4,747 and of females 2,634. June with 6,410 was the month of lowest eraployment and January with 8,132 was the inighest. In $=$ month of normal employment males worked an averaze of 49.3 hours per weok and their avorage wonkly farainge were $\$ 20.47$. For femalas tha correspondine averages were 45.7 hours and $\$ 13.21$.

Imports of real and artisicial silk and their manufactures totalled $\$ 14,135,620$ in 1333. Exports were valued at $\$ 5,100,135$, the main item being socke and stockings, wholly or in part of silk, of which 505, 117 dozen pairs valued at $\$ 3,038,343$ more sent out of Canada.
