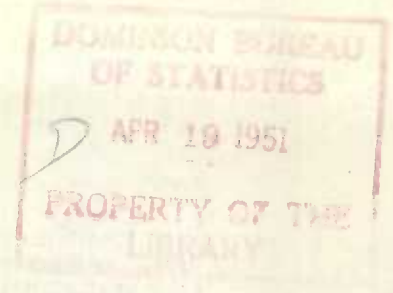

SYNTHETIC TEXTILES AND SILK INDUSTRY

1949

During the year 1949 synthetic textiles continued their regular post-war production increase as plants were expanded and new uses found to consume higher levels of output. This increase has been achieved in the face of rising imports and falling export markets. During the middle of the year the industry was troubled by difficulties that beset textiles generally, namely the slump in the textile markets in the United States and the increased competition incidental to the devaluation of the pound. However these changes did not prevent the increased output because the industry was able to make necessary adjustments. The result has been a shift involving less emphasis on the apparel fields with more attention given to industrial customers for such products as automobile tires and home furnishings. Much of the credit for increasing consumer acceptance of synthetics belongs to the achievements of research in improving manufacturing and dyeing techniques and in the development of new combinations of various fibres with a new range of qualities and practical applications.

In 1949 the industry consisted of 48 establishments, of which 36 were in Quebec, 11 in Ontario and 1 in New Brunswick. Production reached the record level of \$124,125,414, an increase of \$16,983,584 or 16 per cent over the previous year. Employment was up by 4.3 per cent, from 16,097 in 1948 to 16,828 in 1949, and the payroll increased by \$5,382,728 reaching \$36,121,584 in 1949. The cost of materials used, \$45,217,912, exceeded the cost in 1948 by \$4,039,541 or 10 per cent.

Woven fabrics increased from 94,692,282 yards in 1948 to 108,735,406 yards worth \$81,615,244 in 1949 and accounted for 65.8 per cent of the gross value of production. Fabrics of continuous filament rayon yarn amounted to 72,368,794 yards valued at \$50,277,044, a substantial increase over 1948 when production of the same item was reported as 62,305,508 yards with a value of \$44,530,642. Fabrics of continuous filament nylon yarn showed an even more pronounced increase from 935,234 yards worth \$823,994 in 1948 to 1,938,757 yards in 1949 valued at \$1,681,602. Fabrics of spun rayon showed an increase from 14,006,650 yards worth \$8,927,912 in 1948 to 17,405,514 yards worth \$12,718,596 in 1949. Fabrics of spun rayon mixtures, however, showed a decline from \$9,151,818 yards valued at \$7,075,522 in 1948 to 6,587,878 yards valued at \$6,984,577 in 1949.

Purchased yarn was reported by the industry in 1949 in the following quantities: continuous filament viscose, acetate and bemberg 14,875,139 pounds worth \$13,772,214; spun rayon (including spun rayon mixtures), 4,170,063 pounds worth \$3,124,130; nylon, 488,512 pounds worth \$1,539,572; and cotton 2,022,121 pounds worth \$1,621,118. Purchases of rayon staple fibre were reported to the extent of 8,959,674 pounds having a value of \$3,229,509 in 1949 compared with 7,562,036 pounds worth \$2,817,854 the previous year. The extended use of chemicals in the conversion of wood pulp etc. accounted for \$5,244,341 worth of chemicals and dyestuffs in 1949 compared with \$3,984,540 the previous year.

In 1949 the imports of silk and synthetic fibres, yarns and fabrics totalled in value \$31,807,760 compared with \$30,270,213 the previous year. Most of the component groups of imports which were itemized in the trade returns were approximately the same as in the previous year. Rayon staple fibre imports increased from 9,408,472 pounds valued at \$3,285,106 in 1948 to 10,059,641 pounds worth \$3,420,821 in 1949. Exports of both synthetic yarn and fabrics fell drastically in 1949. Exports of synthetic thread and yarn fell from \$2,162,459 in 1948 to \$844,445 in 1949. Exports of fabrics of synthetic yarn only stood at \$647,364 in 1949 after having reached \$3,299,553 in 1948.
