

THE WOOLLEN TEXTILE INDUSTRIES IN CANADA, 1937.

GENERAL REVIEW OF THE GROUP AS A WHOLE

This industry is divided into five sections, (1) general review of the group as a whole, (2) woollen cloth, (3) woollen yarn, (4) carpets, mats and rugs, and (5) woollen goods, n.e.s., which comprises all manufactured articles, the chief component of which is wool, and which cannot be properly classified under sections 2, 3 and 4.

The number of establishments reporting their operations during 1937 was 142, a decrease of four from the previous year. The provincial distribution of these establishments is shown by industries in table 1.

There was an expansion in this group of industries during the year 1937. Capital investment rose from \$43,533,427 to \$45,069,133, an increase of \$1,535,706. An additional 306 persons were employed and there was a further expenditure of \$905,332 on account of salaries and wages. The outlay for materials used was larger to the extent of \$5,066,191. The gross value of production rose from \$42,390,265 in 1936 to \$48,120,855 in 1937, an increase of \$5,730,590

The most important items of production in these industries in 1937 were: "woven fabrics, all wool, woollen", and "yarns, worsted". Of the former, 9,156,160 yards were produced with a selling value of \$9,936,689. The output of worsted yarns for sale was 7,143,207 pounds with a value at the factory of \$7,386,421. "Woven fabrics, all wool, worsted" were next in order with 3,397,544 yards worth \$5,436,048. Fourth place was occupied by "paper makers" felts" of which 3,238,435 pounds were produced with a selling value of \$3,477,033.

The principal material used was "tops of wool" of which 9,447,444 pounds were consumed at a cost of \$5,686,417. Next in order of importance was "imported wool, greasy" which was utilized to the extent of 8,371,251 pounds costing \$2,850,883. "Yarn, worsted" used totalled 2,706,261 pounds valued at \$2,520,922, followed by "yarns woollen" with a consumption of 4,239,993 pounds valued at \$1,954,879.

The average number of wage earners employed throughout the year 1937 showed an increase, there being a total net gain of 206 persons. The maximum number recorded was 11,359 in the month of February, whilst the minimum was 10,533 in the month of July.

SECTION II. - THE WOOLLEN CLOTH INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1937.

In this section reports were received from fifty-seven establishments in 1937, a decrease of three from the previous year, and these establishments were located as follows: Prince Edward Island, one; Nova Scotia, one; New Brunswick, one; Quebec, eighteen; Ontario, thirty-two; Manitoba, one; and British columbia, three.

The gross value of production in the woollen cloth industry increased by \$2,116,194 or approximately 10 per cent during 1937. Employment showed a gain of 46 persons and there was an inflation in the payroll amounting to \$177,275. The additional expenditure for materials was \$2,271,502 and capital investment showed an increase of \$117,139.

The principal output of this section of the woollen textile industry during 1937 consisted of "woven suitings, dress goods, overcoatings and cloaking". Of these "all wool, woollen" accounted for 8,420,175 yards with a selling value of \$9,352,937, whilst "all wool worsted" followed next in order of importance with 3,384,289 yards valued at \$5,420,473. "Velours, plushes, mohairs, etc." occupied third place.

In order of importance, based on their cost value, the principal materials used were as follows: "imported wool, greasy, pulled or sliped and scoured" 10,853,256 pounds worth \$4,383,308, "worsted yarns" 2,049,716 pounds costing \$2,110,113 and "tops of wool" 2,471,138 pounds at a cost of \$1,644,761.

SECTION 3. - THE WOOLLEN YARN INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1937.

In this section of the woollen textile industry in 1937 reports were received from thirty-four establishments, being the same as the number in operation during 1936.

Of these thirty-four establishments, twenty-one were located in the Province of Ontario, four in Quebec, three in Nova Scotia and six in New Brunswick.

The gross value of production rose from \$10,100,629 in 1936 to \$10,620,241 in 1937, an increase of \$519,612. The total capital investment showed a decrease amounting to \$48,036. The total number of employees recorded a loss of 13, but there was an enlargement of the payroll amounting to \$294,377. The outlay on account of materials used involved an additional \$666,353.

The two principal items of production in this industry are worsted and woollen yarns. During the period covered by this report 6,543,200 pounds of worsted yarns were produced with a selling value of \$6,952,264. The output of woollen yarns amounted to 4,760,079 pounds valued at \$1,646,587. For details of production, see table 4.

Tops of wool is the principal material used in this industry and in the year 1937 the amount consumed was 6,976,306 pounds at a cost of \$4,041,656. Yarns to the extent of 1,413,468 pounds costing \$530,135 were used, whilst raw wool, both domestic and imported, was also used, the quantity being 1,326,276 pounds at a cost of \$477,213. The cost of all other materials, including dyestuffs and chemicals, and packing and shipping materials, amounted to \$1,541,792.

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SECTION 4. - THE CARPET, MAT AND RUG INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1937.

Twenty-one establishments reported operations during the year 1937, a decrease of five from the number reporting the previous year.

Despite the decrease in the number of establishments reporting gains occurred in all other items of principal statistics. The total payroll was larger to the extent of \$173,971, the cost of materials used involved an additional expenditure of \$849,048 and the gross value of production was greater by \$1,232,251. The capital investment expanded to the extent of \$399,973 and there were 149 more employees.

The provincial distribution of the twenty-one establishments was as follows: Ontario, sixteen; Nova Scotia, one; New Brunswick, two; Manitoba, one; and British Columbia, one.

It is impossible to show more than a few items of production in this industry without disclosing the output of individual establishments, and the same condition prevails with regard to materials.

Carpets and floor coverings are the principal articles produced, and they are listed in detail in table 4.

The most important materials used comprised yarns of worsted, wool, coir, cotton, jute, hemp, linen, artificial silk and others, consumption of which in 1937 amounted to a value of \$2,317,107. Other fabrics and materials, too numerous to specify, cost \$163,781, whilst the amount expended for dyestuffs and and chemicals was \$150,956.

SECTION 5, THE MISCELLANEOUS WOOLLEN GOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1937.

This section of the woollen textile industry includes all manufactured articles, the chief component material of which is wool, and which cannot properly be classified under the other sections. The principal articles manufactured in 1937 were blankets, slumber throws, felt foods, shoddy, mungo and wool extract, pulled wool, pickled skins and rags and wipers.

There were thirty establishments in operation during 1937, four more than in the preceding year. The gross value of production was \$8,408,543, an increase of \$1,862,533. The capital investment, \$8,671,651, was greater to the extent of \$1,066,630. There was a gain of 124 in the number of employees, and \$259,709 in the amount paid in salaries and wages. An additional \$1,279,288 was expended on materials used.

The distribution of the thirty establishments, by provinces, was as follows: Ontario, twenty-four; Nova Scotia, one; Quebec, four; and British Columbia, one.

In this section of the woollen textile industry only a few items of production can be shown without disclosing the output of individual establishments. The principal item was "felt goods, all kinds" with a selling value of \$4,488,616. Blankets and other woven goods and fabrics amounted to \$1,465,680. Shoddy, mungo and wool extract was accountable for 9,878,775 pounds with a selling value of \$1,389,505. Wool pulled, batts, flocks and rolls, rags and wipers together were produced to the extent of 6,947,481 pounds worth \$780,057, whilst miscellaneous goods accounted for the remaining \$284,685. For details of production, see table 4.

The principal material used was "raw wool, domestic and imported" of which 4,880,338 pounds were consumed at a cost of \$1,656,384. A total of 379,450 sheep skins were used with a cost value amounting to \$445,521 and rags, clippings, etc., 16,740,812 pounds worth \$1,309,844. All materials used in the woollen textile group are given in detail in table 5 of this report.




