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NOTE: The statistics published in this report include only the statistics of such manufacturing establishwents whose principal products are woollen articles or articles with wool as their chief component material. Statistics for specific products are, therofore, not to be regarded as the total for Canada as similar products are also to be found as secondary ones in other industries.


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# THE WOOLLEN TEXTILE INDUSTRIES IN CANADA, 1938. 

## GENERAL REVIEW OF THE GROUP AS A WHOLE

This industry is divided into five sections, (1) general review of the group as a whole, (2) woollen cloth, (3) woollen yarn, (4) carpets, mats and rugs, and (5) woollen goods, n.e.s., which comprises all manufactured articles, the chief component of which is wool, and which cannot be properly classified under sections 2 , 3 and 4.

The number of establishmente reporting their operations during 1938 was 137, a decrease of five from the previous year. The provincial distribution of these establishments is show by industries in Table 1.

There was a considerable decline in the activities of the moollen textile group of industries during 1938. The gross value of production, which amounted to $\$ 34,825,424$, represented a decrease of $\$ 13,295,431$ or 28 per cent as compared with the previous year. Employment was given to 10,825 persons, 1,452 or 12 per cent fewer than in 1937, and the amount disbursed in salaries and wages, $\$ 9,336,497$, was a decrease of $\$ 1,652,302$ or 15 per cent. The cost of materials used dropped $\$ 8,680,016$ or 31 per cent, the amount so expended in 1938 being $\$ 19,284,595$. The total capital investment showed a comparatively slight decline of $\$ 1,563,385$ or 3 per cent.

The most important item of production in the woollen textile industries in 1938 was woven suitings, dress goods, overcoatings and cloaking (wool or containing wool) and of these there were produced 11,999,876 yards with a selling value at the factory of $\$ 13,157,164$. Carpets, mats, rugs and other floor coverings manufactured had a value of $\$ 3,577,612$. The value of all kinds of felt produced was $\$ 3,301,579$. For further details of these and other items of production see table 4.

The principal material used was raw wool, of which $14,503,758$ pounds valued at $\$ 4,358,36$ were consumed. Tops, noils, waste and wool stock were also materials of considerable importance. Forsted yarn used totalled 2,046,928 pounds valued at $\$ 1,898,111$ and woollen yarn, $2,962,557$ pounds with a value of $\$ 1,445,643$. See table 6 for further details of materials used.

Imports of wool, woollen goods, carpets, etc. totalled $\$ 25,486,197$ in 1938 as compared with $\$ 35,942,253$ in 1937 , a decrease of $\$ 10,456,056$. Exports, which were valued at $\$ 1,697,930$ in 1938 and $\$ 2,668,611$ in 1937 , also showed a decrease of $\$ 970,681$.

## SECTION II. - THE WOOLLEN CLOTH INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1938.

In the woollen cloth industry reports were received fron fifty-nine establishments, in 1938, an increase of two over the previous year, and these establishments were located as follows: Prince Edward Island, one; Nova Scotia, one; New Brunswick, one; Quebec, seventeen; Ontario, thirty-four; Manitoba, two, and British Columbia, three.

The gross value of production in the woollen cloth industry decreased by $\$ 6,673,666$ or approximately 28 per cent during 1938. Capital invested decreased by $\$ 590,322$ or 3 per cent. Employment showed a decrease of 874 persons or 13 per cent and a corresponding decrease of $\$ 727,772$ or 13 per cent occurred in the amount paid out in salaries and wages. Expenditure for materials used dropped $\$ 4,426,635$ or 32 per cent.

The greater part of the output during 1938 was accounted for by woven suitings, dress goods, overcoatings and cloaking (wool, or containing wool). of these "all wool, woollen" accounted for 7,006,060 yards valued at $\$ 7,287,505$ and "all wool, worsted" for $2,542,690$ yards with a value of $\$ 3,946,810$. For further details of products see table 14.

Wool was the leading material used, the consumption in 1938 of all greasy, pulled or sliped and scoured wool amounting to $9,611,225$ pounds worth $\$ 2,809,524$. Worsted yarns were used to the extent of $1,662,955$ pounds valued at $\$ 1,606,267$. Tops of wool consumed totalled $2,089,117$ pounds with a value of $\$ 1,144,195$. SECTION 3. - THE WOOLLEN YARN INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1938.
In this section of the woollen textile industry reports were received from thirty-one establishnents in 1938, or three less than in the previous year. of these establishments, three mere located in Nova Scotia, six in New Brunswick, three in Quebec and nineteen in Ontario.

The gross value of production in the woollen yarn industry declined from $\$ 10,620,241$ in 1937 to $\$ 8,433,481$ in 1938, a decrease of $\$ 2,186,760$ or 21 per cent. The total capital investment showed a decrease amounting to $\$ 172,629$ or 2 per cent. Employment decreased by 341 persons or 11 per cent and $\$ 472,935$ or 19 per cent less was paid out in salarics and wages. The outlay for materials was less by $\$ 1,578,810$ or 24 per cent.

Yarns represented the major items of production, and the largest single iten under the heading "Materials used" was tops of wool. Tables for products and materials used are not set up for this industry, and reference must be had to Tables 4 and 6 for such information as may be published.

## SECTION 4. - THE CARPFT, KAI AND FUG INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1938.

Eighteen establishments reported operations in the carpet, mat and rug industry during 1938, a decrease of three from the number reporting the previous year.

In comon with other sections of the woollen textile group of industries, the carpet, mat and rug industry showed decreases in all major items of principal statistics in 1938. As compared with 1937 the gross value of production represented a decrease of $\$ 1,629,549$ or 30 per cent, and $\$ 867,023$ less was expended on materials used. Capital invested declined by $\$ 400,069$. Fmployment was given to 118 fewer persons and a contraction of $\$ 203,297$ occurred in the payroll.

The provincial distribution of the eighteen establishments reporting was as follows: Ontario, fourteen; New Brunswick, two; Nova Scotia, one; and Manitoba, one.

Carpets, mate and rugs comprise almost the entire value of production of the industry. Details may be found in Table 4.

The most important materials used were yarns of worsted, wool, coir, cotton, jute, hemp, linen, artificial silk, etc., total consumption of which in 1938 represented an expenditure of $\$ 1,531,424$. Other fabrics and materials, too numeroug to specify, cost $\$ 113,534$, whilst the amount expended for dyestuffs, chemicals, etc. was \$119,863.

## SECTION 5. - THE MISCELANEOUS WOOLEN GOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1938.

The miscellaneous woollen goods industry includes all manufactured articles, the chief component material of which is wool, and which cannot proporly be classified under other sections of the woollen textile industry. The principal articles manufactured in 1938 were blankets, slumber throwe, felt goods, shoddy, mungo and wool extract, pulled wool, pickled skins and rags and wipers.

There were twenty-nine establishments reporting operations in 1938, a decrease of one as compared with the previous year. The gross value of the production of these establishments was $\$ 5,603,087$, a decrease of $\$ 2,805,456$ or 33 per cent. Capital invested showed a decline of $\$ 400,365$. Employment was given to 119 fewer persons and $\$ 248,298$ less was paid out in salaries and wages. There was a drop in the cost of materials used amounting to $\$ 1,807,548$.

The distribution of the twenty-nine establishments, by provinces, was as follows: Ontario, twenty-two; Nova Scotia, one; Quebec, five, and British Columbia, one.

In the miscellaneous woollen goods industry only a few items of production can be shown without disclosing the output of individual establishments. The principal item was "felt goods, all kinds", which had a selling value of $\$ 2,887,676$. Blankets and other woven goods and fabrics amounted to $\$ 1,246,368$, shoddy, mungo and wool extract to $7,036,231$ pounds valued at $\$ 797,098$, the combined production of pulled wool, batts, flocks and rolls and rags and wipers to $5,214,390$ pounds worth $\$ 506,569$. Miscellaneous goods accounted for the remaining $\$ 165,377$. For details of production in the woollen textile industry as a whole, see Table 4.

The principal material used was "raw wool, domestic and imported", of which $3,784,494$ pounds worth $\$ 1,206,616$ were consumed in 1938. Rags, clippings, etc. used totalled $10,532,871$ pounds valued at $\$ 670,372$. Sheop skins, numbering 333,673 and valued at $\$ 244,641$ were another important item. All materials used in the woollen textile group are given in Table 6 of this report.
