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THE HOOLLEN TEXTTLE TNDUSTRJES IN CANADA, 1939.
GENERAL RETIEN OF THE GROUP AS A WHOLS
This industry is divided into five sections, (1) general roview of the group as a whole, (2) woollen cloth, (3) woollen yarm, (4) carpets, nats and rugs, and (5) woollen goods, $n \circ \theta, s_{n}$, which comprises all manufactured articles, the cilief component of which is wool, and which cannot be properly classified under sections 2, 3 and 4.

The nunber of egtablishments reporting their operations duxing 1939 was 144, an increase of seven from the previous yea. The provincial distribution of these establishnentis is show by industries in Table 10

Thero was an jmportant increase in the activities of the woollen textile group of industries during 1939s and the ground lost during 1938 was recovered to a considerable extent. However, when considering statistics for the group as a whole, it should be noted that the collection of more complete atatistics on pulled wool under the woollen goods, neos. industry in 1939 extended the advance for the group beyond tie point which re:口ulted from greater activity. The gross value of production, which amounted to $\$ 43,872,064$, represented an apparent increase of $\$ 9,046,640$ or 28,0 per cent, wherens tie actual increase, after making allowance for pulled wool production not proviously included in the group, was approximately 24 per cent, Employment was given to 11,360 persons, 535 or 4.9 per cent more than in 1938, and the disbursenent in the form of salaries and wages, $\$ 10,506,720$, showed an increase of $\$ 1,170,223$ or 12.5 per cent., The cost of materials used rose $\$ 3885,200$ or 19,9 per cent, a total nf $\$ 19,284,595$ being so expended. Capital invested, $\$ 47,404,218$, was greater by $\$ 3,898,470$ or 9,0 per cent, the increasa being chiefly evidenced in the figrees xeported for cash, trading and operating accounts, etc,, under the heading working capital.

The most important item of production in the woollen textile industries in 1939 was woven suitings, dress goods, overcoatings and cloaking (wool or containing wool) and of these there were produced $14,226,128$ yards with a selling value of $\$ 16,677,175$ as against $11,999,876$ yards valued at $\$ 13,157,164$ in 1938. Carpots, mats, rugs and other floor coverings were valued at $\$ 4,207,704$ in 1939 and $\$ 3,577,612$ in 1938. The value of all kinds of felt produced in 1939 was $\$ 4,153,524$ as compared with $\$ 3,301,579$ in 2938. For further details of these and other items of production soe Table 4.

The principal material used was ram wool, of which $19,777,228$ pounds valued at $\$ 5,488,361$ were consumed in 1939 and $14,503,758$ pounds with a value of $\$ 4,358,369$ in 1938. Wool tops used totalled $9,697,080$ pounds worth $\$ 4,706,380$ in 1939 and $8,084,635$ pounds valued at $\$ 4,237,558$ in 1938。 See Table 6 for details of materials used.

Imponte of wool. woollen goods, carpets, etc. anounted to $\$ 26,501,372$ in 1939 as compared with $\$ 25,486,197$ in 1938 . Exports were valued at $\$ 1,904,163$ in 1939 and $\$ 1,637,930$ in 1938.

## SECTION II. - THE WOOLLEN CLOTH IHDUSTRY IN CAHADA, 1939.

In the woollen cloth industry reports were received irom sixty-three establishments, in 1939, an increase of four over the previous year, and these establishments were located as follows: Prince Edward Island, one; Nova Scotia, one; New Brunswick, one; Quebec, eighteen; Ontario, thirty-six; Manitoba, two; Alberta, one; and British Columbia, three.

The gross value of production in the woollen cloth industry increased by $\$ 4,825,630$ or approximately 28 per cent during 1939. Capital invested incrensed by $\$ 2,433,660$ or 12 per cent. mploynent showed an increase of 362 persons or 6 per cent and an increase of $\$ 644,431$ or 13 per cent occurred in the amount paid out in salaries and wages. Expenditure for materials used rose $\$ 2,398,606$ or 25 per cent.

The greater part of the output during 1939 was accounted for by woven suitings, dress goods, overcoatings and cloaking (wool or containing wool). Of these "all wool, woollen" accounted for 7,614,748 yards valued at \$8,412,121 and "all. wool, worsted" for $3,524,284$ yards with a value of $\$ 5,292,413$. For further dotails of products, see Table 13.

Wool was the leading material used, the consumption of all greasy, pulled or sliped and scoured wool in 1933 amounting to $12,719,078$ pounds worth $\$ 3,594,144$. Worsted yarns were used to the extent of $2,529,728$ pounds valued at $\$ 2,180,019$. Tops of wool consumed totalled $2,820,521$ pounds with a value of $\$ 1,469,169$. SECTION 3.- THE WOOLLEN YARM INDUSTRY IN CAIIADA, 1939.

In this section of the woollen textile industry reports were received from thirty-three establishments in 1939, or two nore than in the previous yenr. Of these establishments, three were located in Nova Scotia, six in New Brunswick, four in Quebec and twenty in Ontario.

The gross value of production in the woollon yarn industry rose from $\$ 8,433,481$ in 1938 to $\$ 3,576,174$ in 1939, an increase of $\$ 1,142,693$ or 14 per cent. The total capital investment showed an increase anounting to $\$ 251,369$ or 3 per cent. Employment incrensed by 34 persons or 1 per cent and $\$ 194,607$ or 10 per cent more was paid out in salaries and wages. The outlay for materials was greater by $\$ 332,612$ or 7 per cent.

Yarns represented the major items of production, and the largest single item under the herding "Materials used" was tops of wool. Tables for products and materials used are not set up for this industry, and reference must be had to Tables 4 and 6 for such information as may be published.

## SECTION 4. - THE CAPPET, MAT AND RUG INDUSTRY IN CAHADA, 1939.

Eighteen establishments reported operations in the carpet, mat and rug industry during 1939, and these were located as follows: Ontario, fifteen; New Brunswick, one; Nova Scotia, one; and Manitoba, one.

Although considerably below the 1937 level, the carpet, mat and rug industry showed an upward movement during 1939. As compared with 1938, the gross value of production, $\$ 4,349,460$, represented an increrse of $\$ 615,433$ or 16.4 per cent. mployment was given to 43 more persons, an increase of 3,4 per cont, and salaries and wages paid were increased by $\$ 140,241$, or 11.8 per cent. Capital invested was greater by $\$ 130,984$ or 1,9 per cent, the increase being reported under the heading "Cash, trading and operating accounts, etc.".

Carpets, mats and rugs comprise almost the entire value of production of the industry. Details may be found in Table 4.

Under materials, yarns of worsted, wool, coir, cotton, jute, hemp, linen and artificial silk, etc, were reported to a value of $\$ 1,130,083$. Raw wool, fabrics and other materials and charges tntalled $\$ 463,999$, whilst the amount expended for dyestuffs, chemicals, etc. was \$122,272.

SBCTION 5. - THE MISCELLAVEOUS WOOLLEN GOODS INDUSTIRY IN CANADA, 1939.

The miscellaneous woollen goods industry includes all manufactured articles, the chief component material of which is wool, and which cannot properly be classified under other sections of the woollen textile industry. The principal articles manufactured in 1939 were blankets, slumber throws, felt goods, shoddy, mungo and wool extract, pulled wool, pickled skins and rags and wipers.

Thirty establishments reported operations during the year 1939, and the distribution of these by provinces was as followa: Ontario, twenty-four; Quebec, four; Nova Scotia, one; and British Columbia, one.

In common with other sections of the woollen textile industries, the riscellancous woollen goods industry showed advances in 1939. However, it should be noted that the collection of more complete statistics on wool pulling is to an appreciable degree responsible for the fact that the industry shows a peculiarly higberate of increase during 1939. When this is taken into account the actual incrense in the gross value of production is found to be in the neighbourhood of thirty per cent.

The principal item of production was felt, all kinds, which had a selling value of $\$ 3,758,862$ in 1939 as against $\$ 2,887,676$ in 1938. Blankets and other woven goods and fabrics amounted to $\$ 1,522,790$ in 1339 and $\$ 1,246,368$ in 1938. For details of production in the woollen textile industries as a whole, see Table 4.

The leading material used was raw wool, of which $4,357,529$ pounde valued at $\$ 1,148,989$ were consumed in 1939 and $3,784,494$ pounds worth $\$ 1,206,616$ in 1938 . Rags, clippings, etc. used totalled 11,195,289 pounds valued at \$712,824 in 1939 and $10,532,371$ pounds with a value of $\$ 670,372$ in 1938 . All materials used in the woollen textile industries are given in Table 6 of this report.
