# EXPLANATORY NOTES

This report is one in a series of about 130 publications which present the results of the 1959 Census of Manufactures. Most reports in this series refer to specific industries, but there are summary reports for Canada and the provinces and for major industry groups. An annual Census of Manufactures has been carried out by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics since 1916.

Industry statistics given in these reports refer to number of establishments, employees, salaries and wages, cost of materials, supplies, fuel and electricity, gross value of shipments, inventories and value added by manufacturing. Details of materials used and products shipped are also given. Descriptions of the principal industry statistics, with special reference to 1959 are as follows:

#### Period Covered

Firms are asked to submit figures for the calendar year, if at all possible, and most reports are on this basis. Financial year reports for periods differing from the calendar year are accepted in instances where the firms find it impossible to supply calendar year data from accounting records. However the data on employees, salaries and wages are requested on a calendar year basis in all cases.

#### Establishment

Data for the annual census is collected on an establishment basis. A firm with more than one plant is required to file a report for each plant. In most cases an establishment is a complete factory. Sometimes, however, a plant is divided into two or more establishments when it carries out operations classifiable to different industries and when separate accounting records are available. Usually the statistics for an establishment relate only to the manufacturing activities. Other activities such as construction at the plant by its own employees, wholesale or retail activities carried on at the plant location, etc., are not included. Plants engaged solely in repair work (except in the case of furniture, shipbuilding, boat building, aircraft and railway rolling stock industries) are not included but plants occupied in assembling parts into complete units are included.

#### **Employees**

Administrative and office employees include all executives and supervisory officials such as presidents, vice-presidents, secretaries, treasurers, etc., together with managers, professional and technical employees, superintendents and factory supervisors above the working foremen level and clerical employees. Working owners and partners are also included in this category.

Production and related workers include all other factory workmen whether paid on a monthly, weekly, hourly or piece-work basis. Working foremen doing work similar to that of the employees they supervise are included, as are maintenance, warehousing and delivery staffs. Employees on new construction work, in retail or wholesale operations, on outside piece work etc., are not included.

Production workers are reported by months, an average for the year being obtained by summing the monthly figures and dividing by twelve. This procedure is followed even though the plant did not operate in all months. Figures on employment refer to calendar years whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

#### Salaries and Wages

Salaries and wages refer to gross earnings of the employees described above, including salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, the value of room and board where provided, deductions for income tax and social services such as sickness and unemployment insurance, pensions, etc., as well as any other allowances forming part of the employees' wages. Payments for overtime are included.

Salaries refer to amounts paid to administrative and office employees. Withdrawals by working owners or partners for normal living expenses for self and family are included but not their withdrawals for income tax. Wages refer to the amounts paid to production and related workers as defined above. Data on earnings refer to the calendar year whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

#### Cost of Fuel and Electricity

Figures for fuel refer to amounts actually used, (including fuel used in cars and trucks), not to purchases unless the quantities are the same. Values refer to the laid-down cost at the works, including freight, duty, etc.

### Materials and Supplies Used

Figures represent quantities and laid-down cost values, at the works, of materials and supplies actually used during the year whether purchased from others or received as transfers from other plants of the reporting company. Amounts paid to other manufacturers for work done on materials owned by the reporting company are included. Returnable containers or any other items charged to capital account are not included. Fuels are not included. Goods bought from others or received as transfers from other plants of reporting companies for resale without further processing are not included. Maintenance and repair supplies not chargeable to capital account are included.

#### **Factory Shipments**

Factory shipments refer to shipments of goods made from own materials either in the reporting plant or by other manufacturers on the basis of a charge to the reporting plant for work done. All products and by-products shipped from the establishment are included whether for domestic use, export, or for government departments. Transfer shipments to sales outlets, distributing warehouses or to other manufacturing units of the reporting firm are included. Goods bought or received as transfers and resold without further processing are not included. Values are computed on f.o.b. plant or

plant warehouse basis, and do not include sales tax or excise duties. Values of containers not returnable are included. Amounts received in payment for work done on materials owned by others are included.

In a few industries such as shipbuilding, aircraft, etc., where work on principal products extend over a relatively long period, the value of production is recorded rather than the value of shipments. For those industries production is computed from the value of deliveries of complete units during the year plus the value of work done during the year on unfinished units less the value of work done in previous years on finished units delivered in the year under review.

#### Inventories

Values represent the book values of manufacturing inventories owned and held at the reporting plant. Figures include inventories held in warehouses or selling outlets which have been included with plant operations for purposes of reporting shipments.

#### Value Added by Manufacturing

Figures are computed from value of shipments plus or minus changes in inventories of finished goods and goods in process less cost of materials, fuel and electricity. This figure is sometimes referred to as net production.

#### Standard Industrial Classification

The Standard Industrial Classification Manual, prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, provides for 135 three-digit industries in the manufacturing sector, arranged in 17 major groups. Reporting establishments are classified or allotted to specific industries on the basis of the value of principal products made or shipped.

## Short Forms

Between 1949 and 1957, in an effort to ease the reporting burden for smaller firms, a short form was used asking for the total value of shipments only or, in a few cases where losses of detail were significant, for quantities and values of principal products. For purposes of publication, missing data were estimated on the basis of appropriate ratios. In general the cut-off point for these short forms was set at \$50,000 value of shipments. About 40% of the total number of establishments reported on the short form and accounted for less than 3 per cent of the total value of shipments.

In 1958, in order to establish a new base year, the small firms were asked to report all items of principal statistics together with some detail on materials and products.

For the 1959 Census, the short form was used again, but further steps were taken to ease the respondents' burden. First, the general limit for short forms was raised to \$100,000 value of shipments. In addition, a new intermediate form was developed. This form is a shortened version of the long form in that most of the general questions were pared down and the detailed lists of materials and products were limited to the more important items. The general limits for firms in this category were set at between \$100,000 - \$500,000 value of shipments, but in the case of both the short and intermediate forms there were lower cut-offs for a number of industries in which the smaller firms accounted for a larger share of total shipments. On the other hand, limits were raised where this could be done without a significant loss of coverage, On most of the short forms for 1959, in addition to total value of shipments, data on principal products were requested. In a few industries, where loss of employment and earnings data were considered too large because of higher cut-offs, a question on total payroll was placed on the short form.

The intermediate and long forms provide complete data for the compilation of all elements of principal industry statistics and the details of materials and products. The one-page short form, although containing data on principal products and total value of shipments, does not request information on other elements of principal statistics such as value of inventories, materials, fuel and electricity and, in most cases, employment and salaries and wages, nor does it contain detailed data on volume and value of materials used. For purposes of compiling aggregates of principal statistics by industry and by geographic location, the missing data for each establishment were estimated for 1959 by using, in general, ratios based on the change in the value of shipments between 1958 and 1959. The proportion of the estimated data was generally less than 5 per cent of the total in each category of principal statistics.

The general request for the principal items of products on the short form for 1959 permitted a fairly complete compilation of the detailed quantities and values of commodity shipments. In the case of the detailed quantities and values of materials, fuel and electricity, however, and the monthly distribution of production workers, only the totals of data actually reported on the intermediate and long forms are contained in published reports and no attempt was made as in past years to estimate the generally small proportion of individual totals represented by detailed items omitted from the short forms.

The new approach has relieved an additional 12,000 establishments from filling out the regular long form. Establishments now receiving the short form number in excess of 20,000 and account for more than 54 per cent of the total number of establishments and a little more than 3 per cent of the total value of shipments.

¹ To arrive at the National Accounts concept of "gross domestic product at factor cost", it would be necessary to subtract also the cost of office supplies used, advertising, insurance and other goods and services obtained from other businesses. Data on these inputs are not collected on the annual Census of Manufactures. Value added figures for "The primary industries and construction" are published in D.B.S. publication 61—202, Survey of Production.

# THE WOOL TEXTILE INDUSTRIES.

# 1959

Beginning with 1956, the statistics of the carpet, mat and rug industry were no longer compiled and published with the statistics of the wool group of industries. This decision was in line with the Standard Industrial Classification scheme adopted in 1949 which classified the carpet, mat and rug industry separately from the wool group under miscellaneous textile products. Therefore, when mention is made in this report of the wool group or of the wool textile industries, the reference is to a group comprised of the wool cloth industry, the wool yarn industry and the miscellaneous wool goods industry. The data for previous years have been revised to give effect to the change. The statistics of the carpet, mat and rug industry will henceforth appear in the report entitled "The Miscellaneous Textile Industries".

The wool group as now constituted is dealt with as a whole in the first section of this report. The other three sections that follow deal separately with the three industries that comprise the group. The developments within these industries are noted in their respective sections and a list of firms reporting to each industry will be found at the end of the report.

Factory shipments by the Wool Textile Industries in 1959 were valued at \$114,721,127 f.o.b. plant, \$12,569,457 or 12.3 per cent higher than the \$102,151,670 worth of goods shipped in 1958. The number of employees increased by 10.5 per cent from 9,386 to 9,842 in the current year, as did salary and wage payments by 10.9 per cent from \$27,468,799 to \$29,880,820. Materials and supplies, costing \$60,553,496 were used by the industry in 1959 compared to \$54,605,149 in 1958, an increase of 10.9 per cent.

Shipments of apparel fabrics, the wool industry's most important line of products, were higher both in volume and value in 1959 than in 1958, the figures for the two years being, respectively, 28,952,790 square yards valued at \$42,711,360, and 24,527,287 square yards valued at \$38,467,738. Shipments in 1959 of woolen and worsted sales yarns were, with the comparable 1958 figures in brackets, 13,931,252 pounds (10,847,095 pounds) with a value of \$26,367,163 (\$20,710,988). The total value of deliveries of felts (all kinds) increased by a substantial 9.8 per cent from \$16,784,054 in 1958 to \$18,424,968 in 1959. Further products detail is to be found in Table 5. Shipments of certain selected textile products by all industries are given in this report in Tables 5A and 5B.

Price movements of wool yarns and fabrics were varied. Monthly price indexes for worsted yarns in 1959 averaged 210.8 compared to 203.6 in 1958, whereas those for worsted and woolen cloth averaged 232.1 compared to 238.4 the previous year. The index of raw wool prices, which averaged 200.2 for domestic and 176.0 for imported in 1958, fell to 187.5 for domestic, but rose to 193.7 for imported in 1959. The wool blankets index declined abruptly from 293.1 to 276.8 in the year under review.

In 1959 the wool group used more imported raw wool, but less domestic wool. The consumption of imported wool (clean basis) used by the industries rose noticeably from 10,935,778 pounds in 1958 to 14,358,358 pounds in 1959. On the other hand, the amount of domestic wool (clean basis) used decreased from 3,723,597 pounds in 1958 to 3,413,696 pounds in 1959. The use of tops increased, being 8,973,706 pounds in 1959 and 8,304,537 in 1958. The consumption of purchased worsted yarn increased substantially, 2,967,566 pounds being used in 1959 as against 1,958,425 pounds in 1958. Further information on materials used may be obtained from Table 8.

Imports of raw wool, fabrics, etc., not including wearing apparel, increased appreciably from \$63,021,189 in 1958 to \$67,189,414 in the current year. Piece goods imports increased in weight from 13,083,850 pounds in 1958 to 13,423,216 pounds in 1959, but decreased in value from \$35,847,765 to \$35,667,753.

Exports of raw wool, fabrics etc., excluding wearing apparel, climbed from \$2,923,240 in 1958 to \$3,760,707 in 1959, a total about midway between the value of comparable exports for 1957 and 1958. Further particulars of imports and exports may be obtained from Tables 10 and 11 of this report.

Capital expenditures within the industries amounted to \$4,020,000. of this total \$1,927,000 was spent on construction and new machinery; and the remaining \$2,093,000 went into repairs and maintenance. Table 14 gives separate details for the three industries comprising the group.

Attention is drawn to the fact that Table 7 is now on an all-industry basis to correspond with Table 5B.

#### SECTION II

#### The Wool Cloth Industry, 1959

Factory shipments amounting to \$47,684,919 f.o.b. plant were reported by the wool cloth industry in 1959. This total was 7.8 per cent above the \$44,230,042 worth of shipments reported the previous year. The value of production, estimated from the value of shipments by adjusting for changes during the year in plant inventories of goods in process and finished goods, rose from \$44,125,912 in 1958 to \$48,943,085 in 1959, an increase of 10.9 per cent. The number of employees increased slightly from 4,658 in 1958 to 4,843 in 1959. Salaries and wages also were somewhat higher, \$14,151,409 in 1959 as against \$13,146,470 in 1958, Materials used in manufacture cost \$26,087,518, 11,9 percent above the 1958 total of \$23,316,201.

There were 55 establishments in the industry in 1959, the same number as in the previous year. Quebec, with 24 establishments, accounted for 51 per cent of the value of factory shipments and for 49 per cent of employment; while Ontario, with 19 establishments, accounted for approximately 43 per cent of each of these two items. The remaining enterprises were located as follows: Newfoundland 1, Nova Scotia 1, New Brunswick 6, and British Columbia 4.

The higher level of activity in the wool cloth industry for 1959, as opposed to 1958, was reflected

in increased shipments of the main commodities. Deliveries of all wool, woollen apparel fabrics amounted to 10,311,402 square yards valued at \$12,706,767 compared to 7,723,618 square yards valued at \$11,380,255 in 1958. All wool worsted apparel fabrics were shipped in the amount of 6,599,490 square yards worth \$12,724,882 as against shipments in 1958 of 4,525,912 square yards worth \$10,112,870. Total shipments of woven and worsted apparel fabrics, wool or containing wool, amounted to 23,710,082 square yards valued at \$33,937,590 in 1959 compared to 20,033,333 square yards valued at \$31,437,183 in 1958. In the new Table 5B are given the shipments of woven wool fabrics by all industries.

The industry's consumption of raw wool (clean basis) amounted to 8,144,921 pounds costing \$6,046,366 compared to 7,158,069 pounds costing \$5,595,227 in 1958. Tops of wool used totalled 2,896,040 pounds worth \$3,470,633 in 1959, and worsted yarn usage amounted to 2,120,821 pounds valued at \$3,805,655.

For details of products shipped and materials used as a whole in the wool textiles industry, reference should be made to Tables 5 and 8 of this report.

#### SECTION III

## The Wool Yarn Industry, 1959

Products having a value f.o.b. plant of \$37,690,083 were shipped from the factories of the wool yarn industry in 1959. This, compared to the 1958 figure of \$31,420,547 represents an increase of \$6,269,536 or 20.0 per cent. A decrease of \$326,196 during the year in the inventories of goods in process and of finished goods places the value of production at \$37,363,887, an amount of \$6,391,573 or 20.6 per cent above the \$30,972,314 production figure reported the year before.

This greater activity, shown by both production and shipments, was reflected in increased employment and payroll outlays. The industry employed 2,753 people in 1958 and 2,949 in 1959. Salaries and wages paid amounted to \$8,246,090 in 1959, \$753,398 or 10.1 per cent above the total 1958 payments of \$7,492,692. The cost of materials used in the year under review was \$21,815,755, compared

to \$19,113,603, an increase of \$2,702,152 or 14.1 per cent.

Establishments numbered 37, one less than the year before. Ontario, with 15 plants, accounted for approximately 70 per cent of both shipments and employment. The remaining mills were located in the following provinces: 15 in Quebec, 2 in Prince Edward Island, 1 in Nova Scotia and 4 in New Brunswick.

The leading material used was wool in its various forms, but considerable quantities of other fibres—cotton, rayon, nylon, etc., were also consumed. Tables showing factory shipments and materials used are not issued separately for this industry. Details of these for the wool textile industries as a whole are to be found in Tables 5 and 8 of this report.

#### SECTION IV

#### The Miscellaneous Wool Goods Industry, 1959

This industry consists of establishments whose principal products have wool as their chief component material, but which cannot properly be classified under other sections of the wool textile industry. The main items in this group of products are papermakers' felts, pressed felts, punched felts, re-worked or processed wool, wool tops and pulled wool.

The total value of factory shipments in the miscellaneous wool goods industry in 1959 was \$29,346,125, up sharply by 10.7 per cent from the previous year's \$26,501,081. The industry's employees numbered 2,050, 3.8 per cent higher than the 1.975 employed in 1958. Salaries and wages at \$7,483,321 were 9.6 per cent greater than the \$6,829,637 paid in 1958. The cost of materials used showed an increase, \$474,878 or 3.9 per cent, rising from \$12,175,345 in 1958, to \$12,650,223 in 1959.

Shipments of papermakers' felts all types (wool, cotton, asbestos, etc.) by the industry totalled 3,255,254 pounds valued at \$11,229,541 compared to 3,081,539 pounds valued at \$10,344,066 in 1958. Other felts had a selling value of \$6,061,561 in 1959, \$5,262,345 in 1958. The premier material consumed was raw wool of which 4,912,553 pounds (clean basis) costing \$3,147,573 were used compared to 4,116,915 pounds (clean basis) costing \$3,558,612 in 1958. Rags, clippings, etc., used amounted to 17,010,003 pounds worth \$2,046,163 in 1959 as against 14,642,398 pounds worth \$1,352,089 in 1958. For details of products shipped and materials used in the wool textile industries, see Tables 5 and 8 of this report.


