

EXPLANATORY NOTES

This report is one in a series of about 130 publications which present the results of the 1959 Census of Manufactures. Most reports in this series refer to specific industries, but there are summary reports for Canada and the provinces and for major industry groups. An annual Census of Manufactures has been carried out by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics since 1916.

Industry statistics given in these reports refer to number of establishments, employees, salaries and wages, cost of materials, supplies, fuel and electricity, gross value of shipments, inventories and value added by manufacturing. Details of materials used and products shipped are also given. Descriptions of the principal industry statistics, with special reference to 1959 are as follows:

Period Covered

Firms are asked to submit figures for the calendar year, if at all possible, and most reports are on this basis. Financial year reports for periods differing from the calendar year are accepted in instances where the firms find it impossible to supply calendar year data from accounting records. However the data on employees, salaries and wages are requested on a calendar year basis in all cases.

Establishment

Data for the annual census is collected on an establishment basis. A firm with more than one plant is required to file a report for each plant. In most cases an establishment is a complete factory. Sometimes, however, a plant is divided into two or more establishments when it carries out operations classifiable to different industries and when separate accounting records are available. Usually the statistics for an establishment relate only to the manufacturing activities. Other activities such as construction at the plant by its own employees. wholesale or retail activities carried on at the plant location, etc., are not included. Plants engaged solely in repair work (except in the case of furniture. shipbuilding, boat building, aircraft and railway rolling stock industries) are not included but plants occupied in assembling parts into complete units are included.

Employees

Administrative and office employees include all executives and supervisory officials such as presidents, vice-presidents, secretaries, treasurers, etc., together with managers, professional and technical employees, superintendents and factory supervisors above the working foremen level and clerical employees. Working owners and partners are also included in this category.

Production and related workers include all other factory workmen whether paid on a monthly, weekly, hourly or piece-work basis. Working foremen doing work similar to that of the employees they supervise are included, as are maintenance, warehousing and delivery staffs. Employees on new construction work, in retail or wholesale operations, on outside piece work etc., are not included.

Production workers are reported by months, an average for the year being obtained by summing the monthly figures and dividing by twelve. This procedure is followed even though the plant did not operate in all months. Figures on employment refer to calendar years whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

Salaries and Wages

Salaries and wages refer to gross earnings of the employees described above, including salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, the value of room and board where provided, deductions for income tax and social services such as sickness and unemployment insurance, pensions, etc., as well as any other allowances forming part of the employees' wages. Payments for overtime are included.

Salaries refer to amounts paid to administrative and office employees. Withdrawals by working owners or partners for normal living expenses for self and family are included but not their withdrawals for income tax. Wages refer to the amounts paid to production and related workers as defined above. Data on earnings refer to the calendar year whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

Cost of Fuel and Electricity

Figures for fuel refer to amounts actually used, (including fuel used in cars and trucks), not to purchases unless the quantities are the same. Values refer to the laid-down cost at the works, including freight, duty, etc.

Materials and Supplies Used

Figures represent quantities and laid-down cost values, at the works, of materials and supplies actually used during the year whether purchased from others or received as transfers from other plants of the reporting company. Amounts paid to other manufacturers for work done on materials owned by the reporting company are included. Returnable containers or any other items charged to capital account are not included. Fuels are not included. Goods bought from others or received as transfers from other plants of reporting companies for resale without further processing are not included. Maintenance and repair supplies not chargeable to capital account are included.

Factory Shipments

Factory shipments refer to shipments of goods made from own materials either in the reporting plant or by other manufacturers on the basis of a charge to the reporting plant for work done. All products and by-products shipped from the establishment are included whether for domestic use, export, or for government departments. Transfer shipments to sales outlets, distributing warehouses or to other manufacturing units of the reporting firm are included. Goods bought or received as transfers and resold without further processing are not included. Values are computed on f.o.b. plant or

plant warehouse basis, and do not include sales tax or excise duties. Values of containers not returnable are included. Amounts received in payment for work done on materials owned by others are included.

In a few industries such as shipbuilding, aircraft, etc., where work on principal products extend over a relatively long period, the value of production is recorded rather than the value of shipments. For those industries production is computed from the value of deliveries of complete units during the year plus the value of work done during the year on unfinished units less the value of work done in previous years on finished units delivered in the year under review.

Inventories

Values represent the book values of manufacturing inventories owned and held at the reporting plant. Figures include inventories held in warehouses or selling outlets which have been included with plant operations for purposes of reporting shipments.

Value Added by Manufacturing

Figures are computed from value of shipments plus or minus changes in inventories of finished goods and goods in process less cost of materials, fuel and electricity. This figure is sometimes referred to as net production.

Standard Industrial Classification

The Standard Industrial Classification Manual, prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, provides for 135 three-digit industries in the manufacturing sector, arranged in 17 major groups. Reporting establishments are classified or allotted to specific industries on the basis of the value of principal products made or shipped.

Short Forms

Between 1949 and 1957, in an effort to ease the reporting burden for smaller firms, a short form was used asking for the total value of shipments only or, in a few cases where losses of detail were significant, for quantities and values of principal products. For purposes of publication, missing data were estimated on the basis of appropriate ratios. In general the cut-off point for these short forms was set at \$50,000 value of shipments. About 40% of the total number of establishments reported on the short form and accounted for less than 3 per cent of the total value of shipments.

In 1958, in order to establish a new base year, the small firms were asked to report all items of principal statistics together with some detail on materials and products.

For the 1959 Census, the short form was used again, but further steps were taken to ease the respondents' burden. First, the general limit for short forms was raised to \$100,000 value of shipments. In addition, a new intermediate form was developed. This form is a shortened version of the long form in that most of the general questions were pared down and the detailed lists of materials and products were limited to the more important items. The general limits for firms in this category were set at between \$100,000 - \$500,000 value of shipments, but in the case of both the short and intermediate forms there were lower cut-offs for a number of industries in which the smaller firms accounted for a larger share of total shipments. On the other hand, limits were raised where this could be done without a significant loss of coverage. On most of the short forms for 1959, in addition to total value of shipments, data on principal products were requested. In a few industries, where loss of employment and earnings data were considered too large because of higher cut-offs, a question on total payroll was placed on the short form.

The intermediate and long forms provide complete data for the compilation of all elements of principal industry statistics and the details of materials and products. The one-page short form, although containing data on principal products and total value of shipments, does not request information on other elements of principal statistics such as value of inventories, materials, fuel and electricity and, in most cases, employment and salaries and wages, nor does it contain detailed data on volume and value of materials used. For purposes of compiling aggregates of principal statistics by industry and by geographic location, the missing data for each establishment were estimated for 1959 by using, in general, ratios based on the change in the value of shipments between 1958 and 1959. The proportion of the estimated data was generally less than 5 per cent of the total in each category of principal statistics.

The general request for the principal items of products on the short form for 1959 permitted a fairly complete compilation of the detailed quantities and values of commodity shipments. In the case of the detailed quantities and values of materials, fuel and electricity, however, and the monthly distribution of production workers, only the totals of data actually reported on the intermediate and long forms are contained in published reports and no attempt was made as in past years to estimate the generally small proportion of individual totals represented by detailed items omitted from the short forms.

The new approach has relieved an additional 12,000 establishments from filling out the regular long form. Establishments now receiving the short form number in excess of 20,000 and account for more than 54 per cent of the total number of establishments and a little more than 3 per cent of the total value of shipments.

¹ To arrive at the National Accounts concept of ''gross domestic product at factor cost'', it would be necessary to subtract also the cost of office supplies used, advertising, insurance and other goods and services obtained from other businesses. Data on these inputs are not collected on the annual Census of Manufactures. Value added figures for ''The primary industries and construction'' are published in D.B.S. publication 61—202, Survey of Production.

THE MISCELLANEOUS TEXTILES INDUSTRIES 1959

This report consists of three sections, the first covering the carpet, mat and rug industry; the second the oilcloth, linoleum and coated fabrics industry; and the third a group of three industries, which together comprise the miscellaneous textiles goods industry of the Standard Industrial Classification adopted in 1949. The three components of the miscellaneous textile goods industry are embroidery, pleating, hemstitching etc.; fabric auto accessories;

and miscellaneous textiles n.e.s. They will be found in Sections 3A, 3B and 3C, respectively. Prior to 1956 the annual survey of the carpet, mat and rug industry had been compiled and published as part of the woollen industries in the report entitled The Wool Textile Industries. Commencing with 1956, however, the industry has been surveyed and compiled on a separate basis, appearing in this publication.

SECTION 1. THE CARPET, MAT AND RUG INDUSTRY, 1959

In 1959 factory shipments by the Carpet, Mat and Rug Industry were valued at \$25,543,465 f.o.b. plant, 8.1 per cent higher than the comparable 1958 figure of \$23,627,619. When changes in inventories of goods in process and of finished goods are taken into account, the total estimated production value for 1959 was \$26,466,178, a substantial increase of 16.4 per cent over the \$22,737,411 reported in 1958.

Employment within the industry fell by 1.9 per cent from 1,728 in 1958 to 1,695 in 1959, but salary and wage payments rose by 8.0 per cent from \$5,139,830 to \$5,551,922 in the year under review. The cost of materials and supplies used in manufacture, \$13,992,806 in 1959 compared to \$12,102.766 in 1958, was 15.6 per cent higher in the current year.

In former years a detailed breakdown of factory shipments by the firms in the Carpet, Mat and Rug Industry was shown in Table 4A. This particular table cannot now be included in this publication, because of the secrecy requirements of the Statistics Act. However, carpets, mats and rugs are also manufactured by firms in the Miscellaneous Tex-

tiles, the Synthetic Textiles and the Woollen Yarn Industries. All-industry shipments in this instance can be published, and are, therefore, shown in Table 4, wherein it may be seen that factory sales of the leading product, tufted carpets, reached a total of 2,997,498 square yards with a value of \$10,550,559 f.o.b. plant. This represents an increase of 55.2 per cent in quantity and of 56.5 per cent in value over the corresponding 1958 figures of 1,931,684 square yards and \$6,742,698.

Yarns of wool, cotton, rayon, jute, etc., represent the main material used in this industry. The consumption of this commodity in 1959 was reported as costing \$9,610,449. For further details of materials used by the industry, reference should be made to Table 5.

Imports of carpets, mats and rugs rose by 5.2 per cent in quantity and by 3.0 per cent in value, from 18,765,982 square feet valued at \$9,996,564 in 1958 to 19,738,353 square feet worth \$10,292,798 in 1959. Exports of carpets and mats in 1959 were valued at only \$24,296. Further details of imports and exports may be found in Tables 6 and 7 of this report.

SECTION 2. THE OILCLOTH, LINOLEUM AND COATED FABRICS INDUSTRY, 1959

In 1959 the factories of the Oilcloth, Linoleum and Coated Fabrics Industry shipped goods with a total value of \$43,789,538 f.o.b. plant, an increase of 7.0 per cent over the comparable 1958 amount of \$40,930,445. The number of plants remained the same, 19; but the number of employees increased by 6.9 per cent, from 2,902 in 1958 to 3,102 in 1959. Over the same period salary and wage payments increased by 8.4 per cent from \$11,906,807 to \$12,902,383. The cost of materials used by this industry, \$24,407,858 in 1959, was 15.6 per cent above the 1958 figure of \$21,119,350. When account is taken of a substantial increase in inventories of finished goods and goods in process the 1959 value of production was estimated to be \$45,469,251, an increase of 10.1 per cent over the like 1958 figure of \$41,292,960.

The provincial distribution of the 19 plants in the industry also remained unchanged, with 11 in Quebec, 6 in Ontario, and 2 in British Columbia. Again the Quebec firms were predominant, being responsible for 61.8 per cent of total shipments and for 72.0 per cent of all production workers.

The main products of this industry were linoleum and felt base floor coverings, pyroxylin and synthetic resin coated fabrics, window blinds, table oilcloth and saturated felt. However, no details of the products of the industry may be published, because to do so would be to reveal individual company information. The volume of linoleum and printed surface felt base floor coverings was lower than in the previous year.

Of the materials used by this industry, the main one, fabrics, was valued in total at \$4,336,932 in 1959, 3.2 per cent lower than the \$4,788,891 worth reported in 1958. Felt utilized in the current year, at \$3,866,389, was 27.9 per cent higher in value than the \$3,023,647 worth reported the year before. The total value of linseed oil used rose by 12.0 per cent from \$2,246,626 in 1958 to \$2,517,012 in the year under review.

Imports of oilcloth, floor lino and cork matting or carpets in 1959 amounted to 50,985,527 pounds valued at \$7,793,346 compared to 47,740,572 pounds valued at \$6,814,512 in 1958. Imports of oilcloth, enamelled, carriage, shelf and table decreased from 179,310 pounds worth \$122,155 to 141,824 pounds worth \$74,335 in the current year. In 1959 exports of oilcloth or linoleum used for covering floors amounted to 9,361 square yards valued at \$3,949, and of oilcloth n.o.p. to 839,339 square yards with a value of \$266,138.

SECTION 3A. EMBROIDERY, PLEATING, HEMSTITCHING, ETC., 1959

In 1959 this industry reported a total of \$8,340,725 received for factory shipments of goods and for work performed. This amount was less than one per cent lower than the corresponding 1958 total of \$8,392,601. Employment was provided for 1,457 persons, 27 fewer than the 1,484 employed in the preceding year. Total salary and wage payments, \$3,661,925 in 1959, were slightly under the \$3,679,101 disbursed in 1958. The cost of materials used in manufacture in the year under review, \$2,312,262, was 8.6 per cent below the total payment of \$2,529,579 reported the year before. A detailed breakdown of materials used is shown for the first time in this section in Table 20.

The industry in 1959 consisted of 134 establishments, three less than in the preceding year. Of this number, 84 were in Quebec, 38 in Ontario, 4 in Manitoba, 3 in Saskatchewan, 3 in Alberta and 2 in British Columbia. Quebec firms accounted for 75.3 per cent of the total factory shipments and for 72.2 per cent of the employment.

In 1959, \$3,582,932 worth of embroidery was shipped, compared to similar shipments in 1958 amounting to \$3,669,553. Pleating, hemstitching, button covering and buttonholes were valued at \$1,281,596, a very slight increase of \$1,489 over the comparable 1958 figure of \$1,280,107.

SECTION 3B. FABRIC AUTO ACCESSORIES, 1959

Shipments by the firms in the Fabric Auto Accessories Industry in 1959 reached a total value f.o.b. plant of \$15,739,518, a substantial increase of 29.0 per cent over the \$12,198,665 worth of shipments reported in 1958. Employees in the industry numbered 1,032, compared to 927 the previous year, and their aggregate earnings in 1959, at \$3,512,252, were 17.1 per cent higher than the payroll of \$2,999,096 reported the year before. The total cost of materials used in the process of manufacture, \$9,124,447, was 19.7 per cent higher than the \$7,625,579 spent by the plants in 1958.

There were 24 establishments reporting in this industry in 1959, three more than the year previous. Four were in Quebec; 15 in Ontario; 3 in Manitoba; and 2 in British Columbia. Ontario's long-standing dominance of the industry was re-affirmed in the year under review, when the fifteen plants located in that province accounted for 79.2 per cent of the total factory shipments, and for 73.2 per cent of all employment.

Products of this industry include such items as trim sets, glass run channel, seat and radiator covers, fender welts, etc., but since they are largely the production of less than three firms, they cannot be fully specified. In 1959 shipments of seat covers were valued at \$3,386,035 f.o.b. plant as against comparable factory sales worth \$2,922,740 in the preceding year. These covers are also made in other industries, principally in the Miscellaneous Leather Products and the Miscellaneous Textiles Industries: therefore, reference should be made to the General Review of the Manufacturing Industries report to ascertain the shipments of these covers by all domestic industries.

Materials used consisted of such items as fabrics, artificial leather, metals, etc., and again most of these cannot be shown separately. Upholstering materials, rubberized fabrics and other fabrics were used to the total value of \$3,678,564 in 1959 compared to the \$2,774,655 laid out for the same materials in 1958.

SECTION 3C. MISCELLANEOUS TEXTILE GOODS, N.E.S., 1959

In 1959 the Miscellaneous Textile Goods, N.E.S. Industry reported factory shipments with a total value of \$51,334,314 f.o.b. plant, up by 1.8 per cent from the previous year's figure of \$50,426,966. Employment increased slightly from 3,922 in 1958 to 3,983 in 1959, but in the same period there was a small decrease in salary and wage payments, from \$11,647,989 to \$11,626,265 in the year under review. Materials and supplies used in manufacture cost the industry \$28,879,173 in 1959, an increase of 5.4 per cent over the \$27,387,552 spent in a like manner in 1958.

The industry consisted of 166 establishments, nine less than in the preceding year. Two were located in Nova Scotia; 68 in Quebec; 78 in Ontario; 10 in Manitoba; 1 in Alberta; and 7 in British Columbia.

Factory shipments of medical and sanitary products, the chief items of production, amounted

to \$14,654,476, a jump of 5.5 per cent from the comparable 1958 total of \$13,887,104. Included in the aforementioned category are such commodities as adhesive tapes and medicated plasters, bandages, surgical gauze and dressings, sanitary napkins, etc., details of which cannot be shown separately without divulging particulars of individual firms. Shipments of rags and wipers in 1959 were valued at \$3,817,824, compared to the previous year's total value of \$3,130,732. Other important products were comforters, bedspreads, curtains, covers, bags, handkerchiefs, etc., details of which may be found in Table 31.

Cotton fabrics, the main material used by the industry, cost the firms \$8,051,983 in 1959, as against \$8,142,844 in 1958, a decline of 1.1 per cent. For an itemized account of materials used, reference should be made to Table 32.
