

EXPLANATORY NOTES

This report is one in a series of about 140 publications which present the results of the 1960 Census of Manufactures. Most reports in this series refer to specific industries, but there are summary reports for Canada and the provinces and for major industry groups. Adoption of the revised Standard Industrial Classification for 1960 compilations has necessitated changes in titles of many reports in this annual series. The content of many industries has also been affected (see following note on Industrial Classification).

Industry statistics given in these reports refer to number of establishments, employees, salaries and wages, cost of materials, supplies, fuel and electricity, gross value of shipments, inventories and value added by manufacturing. Details of materials used and products shipped are also given. Descriptions of the principal industry statistics, with special reference to 1960 are as follows:

Period Covered

Firms are asked to submit figures for the calendar year, if at all possible, and most reports are on this basis, Financial year reports for periods differing from the calendar year are accepted in instances where the firms find it impossible to supply calendar year data from accounting records. However the data on employees, salaries and wages are requested on a calendar year basis in all cases.

Establishment

Data for the annual census is collected on an establishment basis. A firm with more than one plant is required to file a report for each plant. In most cases an establishment is a complete factory; sometimes, however, a plant is divided into two or more establishments when it carries out operations classifiable to different industries and when separate accounting records are available. Usually the statistics for an establishment relate only to the manufacturing activities. Other activities such as construction at the plant by its own employees, wholesale or retail activities carried on at the plant location, etc., are not included. Plants engaged solely in repair work (except in the case of furniture, shipbuilding, boat building, aircraft and railway rolling stock industries) are not included but plants occupied in assembling parts into complete units are included.

Employees

Administrative and office employees include all executives and supervisory officials such as presidents, vice-presidents, secretaries, treasurers, etc., together with managers, professional and technical employees, superintendents and factory supervisors above the working foremen level, and clerical employees. Working owners and partners are also included in this category.

Production and related workers include all other factory workmen whether paid on a monthly, weekly, hourly or piece-work basis. Working foremen doing work similar to that of the employees they supervise are included, as are maintenance, ware-

housing and delivery staffs. Employees on new construction work, in retail or wholesale operations, on outside piece work etc. are not included.

Production workers are reported by months, an average for the year being obtained by summing the monthly figures and dividing by twelve. This procedure is followed even though the plant did not operate in all months. Figures on employment refer to calendar years whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

Salaries and Wages

Salaries and wages refer to gross earnings of the employees described above, including salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, the value of room and board where provided, deductions for income tax and social services such as sickness and unemployment insurance, pensions, etc., as well as any other allowances forming part of the employees' wages. Payments for overtime are included.

Salaries refer to amounts paid to administrative and office employees. Withdrawals by working owners or partners for normal living expenses for self and family are included but not their withdrawals for income tax. Wages refer to the amounts paid to production and related workers as defined above. Data on earnings refer to the calendar year whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

Cost of Fuel and Electricity

Figures for fuel refer to amounts actually used, (including fuel used in cars and trucks), not to purchases unless the quantities are the same, Values refer to the laid-down cost at the works, including freight, duty, etc.

Materials and Supplies Used

Figures represent quantities and laid-down cost values, at the works, of materials and supplies actually used during the year whether purchased from others or received as transfers from other plants of the reporting company. Amounts paid to other manufacturers for work done on materials owned by the reporting company are included. Returnable containers or any other items charged to capital account are not included. Fuels are not included. Goods bought from others or received as transfers from other plants or reporting companies for resale without further processing are not included. Maintenance and repair supplies not chargeable to capital account are included.

Factory Shipments

Factory shipments refer to shipments of goods made from own materials either in the reporting plant or by other manufacturers on the basis of a charge to the reporting plant for work done. All products and by-products shipped from the establishment are included whether for domestic use, export, or for government departments. Transfer shipments to sales outlets, distributing warehouses or to other manufacturing units of the reporting firm are included. Goods bought or received as transfers

and resold without further processing are not included. Values are computed on f.o.b. plant or plant warehouse basis, and do not include sales tax or excise duties. Values of containers not returnable are included. Amounts received in payment for work done on materials owned by others are included.

In a few industries such as shipbuilding, aircraft, etc., where work on principal products extend over a relatively long period, the value of production is recorded rather than the value of shipments. For those industries production is computed from the value of deliveries of complete units during the year plus the value of work done during the year on unfinished units less the value of work done in previous years on finished units delivered in the year under review.

Inventories

Values represent the book values of manufacturing inventories owned and held at the reporting plant. Figures include inventories held in warehouses or selling outlets which have been included with plant operations for purposes of reporting shipments.

Value added by Manufacturing

Figures are computed from value of shipments plus or minus changes in inventories of finished goods and goods in process less cost of materials, fuel and electricity. This figure is sometimes referred to as net production.

Standard Industrial Classification

The revised Standard Industrial Classification which has been introduced with the 1960 Census of Manufactures provides for a breakdown of the universe into 140 industries arranged in 20 major groups compared with 135 industries in 17 major groups in the old classification which was used in the compilations for the years 1949 to 1959 inclusive. It incorporates changes considered desirable on the basis of experience in using the earlier classification as well as those which take account of changes in the structure of Canadian industries associated with the rapid developments of the past decade. Full details are contained in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, Catalogue No. 12-501, which is available from either the Queen's Printer or the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Reporting establishments are classified or allotted to specific industries on the basis of the value of principal products made or shipped.

Many industries remain unchanged in the new classification but in many instances there have been substantial changes in content because of the shifting of establishments from one industry to another or in re-grouping of establishments. Where

changes have occurred the principal statistics for 1957, 1958 and 1959 have been re-compiled to provide data on a basis comparable with those for 1960.

Short Forms

Between 1949 and 1957, in an effort to ease the reporting burden for smaller firms, a short form was used asking for the total value of shipments only or, in a few cases where losses of detail were significant, for quantities and values of principal products. For purposes of publication, missing data were estimated on the basis of appropriate ratios. In general the cut-off point for these short forms was set at \$50,000 value of shipments. About 40% of the total number of establishments reported on the short form and accounted for less than 3 per cent of the total value of shipments.

In 1958, in order to establish a new base year, the small firms were asked to report all items of principal statistics together with some detail on materials and products.

For the 1959 Census, the short form was used again, but further steps were taken to ease the respondents' burden. First, the general limit for short forms was raised to \$100,000 value of shipments. In addition, a new intermediate form was developed. This form is a shortened version of the long form in that most of the general questions were pared down and the detailed lists of materials and products were limited to the more important items. The general limits for firms in this category were set at between \$100,000-\$500,000 value of shipments, but in the case of both the short and intermediate forms there were lower cut-offs for a number of industries in which the smaller firms accounted for a larger share of total shipments. On the other hand, limits were raised where this could be done without a significant loss of coverage. On most of the short forms for 1959, in addition to total value of shipments, data on principal products were requested. In a few industries, where loss of employment and earnings data were considered too large because of higher cut-offs, a question on total payroll was placed on the short form. This practice was followed again in 1960.

The intermediate and long forms provide complete data for the compilation of all elements of principal industry statistics and the details of materials and products. The one-page short form, although containing data on principal products and total value of shipments, does not request information on other elements of principal statistics such as value of inventories, materials, fuel and electricity and, in most cases, employment and salaries and wages, nor does it contain detailed data on volume and value of materials used. For purposes of compiling aggregates of principal statistics by industry and by geographic location, the missing data for each establishment were estimated for 1959 by using, in general, ratios based on the change in the value of shipments between 1958 and 1959. The proportion of the estimated data was generally less than 5 per cent of the total in each category of principal statistics.

¹ To arrive at the National Accounts concept of ''gross domestic product at factor cost'', it would be necessary to subtract also the cost of office supplies used, advertising, insurance and other goods and services obtained from other businesses. Data on these inputs are not collected on the annual Census of Manufactures. Value added figures for ''The primary industries and construction'' are published in D.B.S. publication 61-202, Survey of Production.

MISCELLANEOUS TEXTILE INDUSTRIES

1960

For the Census of Industry survey year 1960, the Bureau implemented a revised Standard Industrial Classification. This had certain broad effects on the Primary Textiles Industry Group as a whole. In addition to many changes, two industries were disbanded, namely the Miscellaneous Cotton Goods industry and the Miscellaneous Wool Goods industry; and two new industries were created, namely Fibre Preparing Mills and Pressed and Punched Felt Mills.

As a result of these changes and reflecting the growing importance of certain primary textile industries, corresponding changes were made in this group of reports for 1960 as follows:

- (a) The Carpet, Mat and Rug Industry will no longer appear in this report and is being published as a separate one (Catalogue No. 34-221).
- (b) The report on the new industry, Fibre Preparing Mills, is also being published separately (Catalogue No. 34-219).

(c) The report on the other new industry, Pressed and Punched Felt Mills, is being included as Section I of this report, replacing the Carpet, Mat and Rug Industry.

After taking these changes into consideration, this 1960 report consists of three sections as in the past. The first covers Pressed and Punched Felt Mills; the second, the Linoleum and Coated Fabrics Industry (formerly the Oilcloth, Linoleum and Coated Fabrics Industry); and the third, the group of three industries, which together comprise the Miscellaneous Textile Industries of the Standard Industrial Classification. In the last instances. there has been no change from the previous classification in that the three components of this group are the Embroidery, Pleating, Hemstitching Manufacturers; the Automobile Fabric Accessories Manufacturers; and the Miscellaneous Textiles (n.e.s.) Industry. These three industries will be found in Sections 3A, 3B and 3C, respectively,

SECTION 1. PRESSED AND PUNCHED FELT MILLS, 1960

This new industry is defined as comprising those "Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing pressed felt of any fibre by means of heating, moisture and pressure; and those making punched felt for rugs, cushions and other products from hair, jute, wool or other fibres by the needle loom process." Table 1, of this report shows the Principal Statistics of this industry for the years 1957 to 1960, inclusive: these have been arrived at by recompiling the statistics of the firms, classified to this new industry for the 1960 survey, back to the year 1957. The comparisons made between the 1959 and the 1960 data which follow are, therefore, based on the recompiled 1959 figures.

Shipments by the firms in this new industry in 1960 reached a total value f.o.b. of \$6,806,557, a decrease of 5.7 per cent from the 1959 total of \$7,214,061. Employees in the industry numbered 460, compared to 479 the previous year; and their earnings in 1960, at \$1,761,880, were 4.7 per cent less than the payroll of \$1,848,780 reported the year

before. The total cost of materials used for manufacturing, \$3.338,911, was 3.2 per cent higher than the \$3,234,914 spent by the firms in 1959.

Since this is a new industry, there is no change in the number of establishments from 1959 to 1960 nor in their provincial breakdown.

The products of this industry, as specified in the name, are mainly pressed and punched felts. However, although the shipments of both of these commodities were collected in considerable detail, it is not possible to publish any individual commodity data since this would be contrary to the secrecy provisions of the Statistics Act. Instead the combined shipments of these two types of felt by all manufacturing industries have been given in Table 3.

It is, however, possible to give considerable detail concerning the materials used by the firms in this industry and this has been shown in Table 4.

For establishments reporting value of shipments of less than \$200,000 no data on the number of workers were collected. The average was estimated by using the change in value of shipments to arrive at the value of the payroll which was then used in conjunction with estimated average earnings to arrive at the number of workers. This estimated number of workers was then included in each month's total.

SECTION 2. LINOLEUM AND COATED FABRICS INDUSTRY, 1960

Despite the implementation of the revised Standard Industrial Classification for the 1960 survey, there has been no change in the composition of this industry, as a scrunity of Table 10 will show. There has, however, been a slight change in the title of this industry. It continues to be defined as comprising those "Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing oilcloth, linoleum, other hard surface floor coverings, leatherette and other coated fabrics including water repellent fabrics except rubberized."

In 1960 the firms belonging to this industry shipped goods valued at \$39.061,308 f.o.b., a decrease of 10.8 per cent from the comparable 1959 amount of \$43.789,538. The number of plants remained the same, 19; but the number of employees decreased sharply by 17.4 per cent, from 3,102 in 1959 to 2,563 in 1960. Over the same period, salary and wage payments also decreased by 15.0 per cent from \$12,902,383 to \$10,966,165. The cost of materials used by this industry, \$20,333,257 in 1960, was 16.7 per cent below the 1959 figure of \$24,407,858. When account is taken of the decrease in inventories of finished goods and of goods in process, the 1960 value of production was estimated to be \$38,454,823, a decrease of 15.4 per cent from the corresponding 1959 figure of \$45,469,251.

The provincial distribution of the 19 plants in the industry also remained unchanged, with 11 in Quebec, 6 in Ontario, and 2 in British Columbia. Again the Quebec firms were predominant, being responsible for 70.8 per cent of total shipments and for 67.1 per cent of all production workers.

The main products of this industry are linoleum and felt base floor coverings, pyroxylin and synthetic resin coated fabrics, window blinds, table oilcloth and saturated felt. However, no details of the products of the industry may be published, because to do so would be to reveal individual company information. The volume of linoleum and of printed surface felt base floor coverings shipments was lower than in the previous year.

Of the materials used by this industry, the main one, fabrics, was valued in total at \$4,275,731 in 1960, 7.8 per cent lower than the \$4,636,932 reported in 1959. Felt utilized in the current year, at \$2,255,032, was 41.7 per cent lower in value than the \$3,866,389 amount reported the year before. The total value of linseed oil used dropped by 29.6 per cent from \$2,517,012 in 1959 to \$1,771,655 in the year under review.

Imports of oilcloth, floor line and cork matting or carpets in 1960 amounted to 43.303.233 pounds valued at \$7,052,702 compared to 50,985,527 pounds valued at \$7,793,346 in 1959. Imports of oilcloth, enamelled, carriage, shelf and table decreased from 141,824 pounds worth \$74,335 in 1959 to 98,474 pounds worth \$59,236 in the current year. In 1960 exports of oilcloth or lineleum used for covering floors amounted to 8,695 square yards valued at \$4,643, and of oilcloth n.o.p. to 785,950 square yards with a value of \$251.039.

SECTION 3A. EMBROIDERY, PLEATING, HEMSTITCHING MANUFACTURERS, 1960

The implementation of revised Standard Industrial Classification has lead to a slight change in the composition of this industry as a scrutiny of the revised Principal Statistics for the years 1957 to 1959, inclusive (Table 19), will show. Wherever possible in this report, revised data have been given in the tables and all references to 1959 data in this preface are to such revised figures.

In 1960, this industry reported a total of \$8.454.407 received for factory shipments of goods and for work performed. This amount was 8.0 per cent smaller than the corresponding 1959 total of \$9,190,676. Employment was provided for 1.441 persons, 40 fewer than the 1.481 employed in the preceding year. Total salary and wage payments, \$3.884.400 in 1960, were 3.9 per cent greater than the \$3.738,904 disbursed in 1959. On the other hand, the cost of materials used in manufacturing in the

year under review, \$2,233,181, was 21.7 per cent below the total outlay of \$2,852,222 reported the year before. Details of the materials used will be found in Table 22.

The industry in 1960 consisted of 135 establishments, two more than in the preceding year. Of this number, 80 were in Quebec, 41 in Ontario, 4 in Manitoba, 4 in Saskatchewan, 4 in Alberta and 2 in British Columbia. Quebec firms accounted for 71.5 per cent of the total factory shipments and for 69.1 per cent of the employment.

The most important product shipped by this industry was embroidery, valued at \$3,734.843. The work performed, namely pleating, hemstitching, button covering, and buttonholes amounted to \$1,171,433. Comparable 1959 data are not available because of the slight revisions made to this industry.

SECTION 3B. AUTOMOBILE FABRIC ACCESSORY MANUFACTURERS, 1960

The implementation of the revised Standard Industrial Classification for the 1960 survey also brought about some changes to this industry as the scrutiny of the revised Principal Statistics (Table 27) will reveal. Wherever possible in this report, revised data have been given in the tables and all references to 1959 data in this preface are to such revised figures.

Shipments by firms in this industry in 1960 reached a total value f.o.b. plant of \$12.531.039, an increase of 4.9 per cent over the \$11,940.435 worth of shipments in 1959. Employees in the industry numbered 827, compared to 812 in the previous year; and their aggregate earnings in 1960, at \$2.741.550, were 3.6 per cent higher than the payroll of \$2.645.685 of the previous year. The total cost of materials used in manufacturing \$8,081.894, was 5.3 per cent higher than the \$7.675.851 spent by the plant in 1959.

There were 28 establishments reporting in this industry in 1960, five more than the year previous. Six were in Quebec; 17 in Ontario; 3 in Manitoba;

and 2 in British Columbia. Ontario continued to dominate this revised industry, in the year under review, when the 17 plants located in that province accounted for 74.5 per cent of the total factory shipments and for 68.1 per cent of all employment.

Products of this revised industry continue to include such items as trim sets. glass run channel, seat and radiator covers, fender welts, etc.; but, since they are largely the production of less than three firms, they cannot be fully specified. In 1960 shipments of seat covers were valued at \$3.015.136 f.o.b. plant. These covers are also made in other industries, principally in the Miscellaneous Leather Products and the Miscellaneous Textiles Industries: therefore, reference should be made to the General Review of the Manufacturing industries report to ascertain the shipments of these covers by all domestic industries.

Materials used consisted of such items as fabrics, artificial leather, metals, etc., and again most of these cannot be shown separately. Upholstering materials, rubberized fabrics and other fabrics were used to the total value of \$4.167,309 in 1960.

SECTION 3C. MISCELLANEOUS TEXTILES (n.e.s.) INDUSTRY, 1960

The implementation of the revised Standard Industrial Classification for the 1960 survey has effected a considerable revision to this industry as a scrutiny of the revised Principal Statistics, given in Table 35, will show. This is largely due to the transfer of certain firms into this industry from the two disbanded industries, namely Miscellaneous Cotton Goods. and Miscellaneous Wool Goods. Wherever possible in this report, revised data have been given in the tables and all references to 1959 data in this preface are to such revised figures.

In 1960, this industry reported factory shipments valued at \$59,252,932, a sizeable increase of 10.7 per cent over the previous year's figure of \$53,516,500. Employment also increased from 4.155 in 1959 to 4,426 in 1960: there was a corresponding increase in salary and wage payments from \$12.128,944 in 1959 to \$13,767,311 in 1960, a gain of 13.5 per cent. Materials and supplies used in manufacturing cost \$33,589,167 in 1960, an increase of 11.3 per cent over the comparable 1959 expendiditures of \$30,183,963.

The industry consisted of 203 establishments, twenty-four less than in the preceding year. Two were located in Nova Scotia; 79 in Quebec; 93 in Ontario; 14 in Manitoba; 1 in Saskatchewan; 4 in Alberta; and 10 in British Columbia.

Factory shipments in 1960 of medical and sanitary products, the chief items of production, amounted to \$14.100.957. Included in the aforementioned category are such commodities as adhesive tapes and medicated plasters, bandages, surgical gauze and dressings, sanitary napkins, etc., details of which cannot be shown separately without divulging particulars of individual firms. Shipments of rags and wipers in 1960 were valued at \$4.191.867. Other important products were comforters, bedspreads, curtains, covers, bags, handkerchiefs, etc., details of which may be found in Table 37.

Cotton fabrics, still the main material used by the industry, cost \$8,768,330 in 1960. References should be made to Table 38 for a detailed breakdown of the materials used.




