GENERAL REVIEW OF THE CLOTHING INDUSTRIES

1953

In 1953 the clothing group of industries, as reconstituted,¹ reported slight advances over the previous year. A total of \$697,188,671 worth of goods was shipped from the factories of Canadian clothing manufacturers, this amount representing a one per cent increase over 1952. Employment was up 1.3 per cent with the payroll listing an average of 95,658 persons in 1953 compared with an average of 94,434 persons the year before. Salary and wage payments in the respective years amounted to \$202,005,279 and \$191,576,863. Materials consumed in manufacturing cost \$333,238,797 in 1953 as against \$324,472,097 in 1952, an increase of 2.7 per cent.

The high level at which the clothing industries operated during the latter part of 1952 carried through well into 1953. In the second quarter, however, a gradual decline which persisted to the year's end set in and by December activity was considerably below that of December of the previous year. The slackening activity was due to inventory accumulation at wholesale, retail and factory levels and ultimately to somewhat less buoyant sales in the second and third quarters.

Despite the decline in the latter part of the year, activity for 1953 as a whole was, as has been noted, ahead of 1952. The level of operations was, moreover, the highest on record. This peak activity was sustained by the second highest level of expenditure on textile clothing in history. Retail sales volume was 2 per cent higher than in 1952. Lying behind this were a virtually unchanged clothing price index and the heaviest recorded use of credit for the purchase of clothing.

In 1953 the clothing industries consisted of 2,788 establishments with the following provincial distribution: Newfoundland 2, Nova Scotia 10, New Brunswick 6, Quebec 1,659, Ontario 836, Manitoba 160, Saskatchewan 14, Alberta 28 and British Columbia 73. Of the total value of factory shipments of \$697,188,671, Quebec was responsible for 62.8 per cent or \$437,942,172 and Ontario for 27.3 per cent or \$190,619,048. These two provinces account for 62.3 per cent and 27.9 per cent respectively of the total employment provided by the group.

(1) As an interim arrangement, pending thorough revision of the Standard Industrial Classification in the near future, a new industrial group termed "Knitting Mills" has been established. This new group is comprised of the hosiery industry and the other knitted goods industry, both former components of the clothing group. Where mention is made in this report of the clothing group or the clothing industries, the reference is to a group from which the two knitting industries have been removed. The data for 1953 have been compiled on this basis and the data for previous years have been revised to give effect to the change.

Principal statistics by economic area, by industry, are given in Table 4. The men's factory clothing industry proved to be the leading clothing industry in 1953 in all areas with the exception of British Columbia where it was shaded by women's factory clothing.

Factory shipments by the men's factory clothing industries in the Atlantic Provinces, Quebec, Ontario and the Prairie Provinces were valued at \$3,113,639, \$155,362,378, \$82,244,104 and \$28,899,289, respectively. Next in importance in Quebec was women's factory clothing with shipments worth \$151,398,926, followed by fur goods, \$35,101,026, and children's factory clothing, \$35,082,741. Women's factory clothing occupied the second position in Ontario with shipments of \$50,832,823 worth of products followed by fur goods, \$20,948,723, hats and caps, \$12,542,006, and children's factory clothing, \$8,340,297. Women's factory clothing ranked second in the Prairie Provinces with shipments valued at \$13,563,270 while fur goods with shipments worth \$7,130,661 occupied third place.

The main clothing industry in British Columbia in 1953 was women's factory clothing with men's factory clothing a close second. These two industries shipped goods having values f.o.b. plant of \$4,526,718 and \$4,326,615.

A report on the clothing industry would be incomplete without a review of the various component industries comprising the group. All have been dealt with fully in separate reports and the following is intended as a resume only of the more important aspects of their activity in 1953.

The men's factory clothing industry with factory shipments totalling \$273,946,025 continued to be the largest single component of the clothing group. This value for shipments represents a slight reduction from the \$277,426,014 reported a year previous. Employment fell from 35,583 in 1952 to 35,119 in 1953 and the cost of materials consumed from \$151,357,963 in the earlier year to \$147,283,980 in the later. The curtailment of activity indicated by these data came after an 8-year period of successive annual advances. The reversed trend, however, should not be allowed to obscure the fact that the level of operations in 1953 was the second highest on record. The market situation at the beginning of the year gave promise of another record year. Higher personal incomes, expanding credit, slightly lower prices and the need to replenish retail, wholesale and factory inventories pushed the level of activity in the industry for the first half somewhat higher than that for the same period in 1952, the year of peak activity. However, a slackening rate of produc-

tion occurred in the last half as supplies grew sufficiently plentiful and inventory accumulated at all levels. By December, the industry's operations were considerably below those of December, 1952.

Men's clothing contractors numbered 160 in 1953, 19 more than the year before. The gross value of work performed by the industry amounted to \$10,877,993. Employment was provided for 4,484 persons who received \$7,862,881 in salaries and wages. As indicated by its 140 establishments, the Province of Quebec dominated the industry accounting for 92 per cent of the gross value of work performed and 95 per cent of employment.

The **women's factory clothing industry** ranks second in importance in the clothing group. In the year under review the factory selling value of the products shipped by this industry was \$220,410,178, up 1.4 per cent compared with the \$217,441,071 worth of products reported a year earlier. Four of the five sections into which the industry is divided showed modest gains. The shipments made by these four sections showing comparable 1952 figures in brackets were as follows: coats and suits, \$56,091,890 (\$55,572,391); skirts, blouses, slacks and jackets, \$37,331,177 (\$34,866,299); lingerie, \$31,418,255 (\$30,468,703); other outerwear, \$17,894,652 (\$17,580,549). The fifth and largest section, "dresses", reported shipments valued at \$77,614,204 in 1953 compared with \$78,953,129 in 1952. Montreal, the centre of the dress industry, reported \$62,786,954 or 81 per cent of the 1953 figure.

Since 1937 when the Bureau began compiling separate statistics on it, the **children's factory clothing industry** has enjoyed uninterrupted expansion. No exception was this latest year during which the industry's activity was the highest on record. Good gains were made over the previous year. Factory shipments in 1953 had a total value of \$45,347,640, an increase of \$3,275,787 or 8 per cent over the \$42,071,853 worth of products shipped in 1952. Employment rose by 9 per cent, from 6,326 to 6,893, and the cost of materials used in manufacture by 5 per cent, from \$23,528,486 to \$24,782,163. There were 5 more establishments. The industry is largely concentrated in three cities. Montreal with 103 establishments shipped goods with a value of \$29,791,154 or 66 per cent of the total for the industry. Toronto accounted for \$6,006,948 or 13 per cent and Winnipeg for \$1,784,602 or almost 4 per cent.

In the **women's and children's contractors industry** reports were received from 107 establishments and the gross value of work performed reached \$5,399,344, an amount substantially above the \$4,332,887 reported in 1952. There is naturally a concentration of contractors in Montreal where the greatest number of women's and children's clothing manufacturers are to be found. The work performed by the contractors of this city amounted to \$2,763,761 or 51 per cent of total.

For the **corset industry** 1953 was a banner year. The value of the industry's output was the highest on record as was, also, the number of establishments, number of employees, salaries and wages paid, and cost of materials consumed. A total of \$22,028,653 worth of products was shipped by the members of the industry, this being an 11 per cent advance over the 1952 figure of \$19,888,593. Corsets and girdles were shipped to the extent of 187,611 dozen valued at \$7,246,611. Shipments of bandeaux and brassieres amounted to 835,000 dozen valued at \$10,954,222 and combination garments to 27,796 dozen worth \$1,368,008.

The **fur goods industry** reported reductions in both value of factory shipments and employment in 1953. Shipments totalled \$63,991,716, down 3.4 per cent from the 1952 figure of \$66,245,562 and employment at 5,945 was slightly below the 5,969 of the earlier year. Ladies' fur coats valued at \$50,337,915 represented 79 per cent of the total value of shipments. The number shipped was narrowly lower than in the previous year and the average value likewise showed a small decrease from \$229 to \$228.

The Canadian **fur dressing industry** is established on a custom basis, that is, the customer sends the furs to be dressed or dyed and is charged a certain amount per skin. The number of skins treated in 1953 was 11,001,366, a decrease of 9 per cent from 1952. The amount received for the treatment of furs was \$5,920,014, a decrease of 2.3 per cent.

The level of activity of the **hat and cap industry** in 1953 was little different from that of the previous year. Factory shipments had a value f.o.b. plant of \$29,631,952, practically unchanged from the \$29,606,155 worth of products shipped in 1952. Employment was down a little, 5,005 in 1952 against 4,928 in 1953. The only appreciable change was a 7 per cent drop in cost of materials used from \$12,610,052 in the earlier year to \$11,741,210 in the later. Men's fur felt hats with shipments amounting to 103,377 dozen valued at \$5,298,591 was the industry's most important single commodity. Shipments of other main products in order of importance were: women's straw hats, 137,547 dozen valued at \$5,180,098; cloth caps, 259,896 dozen at \$2,724,059; women's velour hats, 51,576 dozen at \$2,400,968; women's wool felt hats, 75,236 dozen at \$2,066,185; and women's fur felt hats, 31,399 dozen at \$1,653,342.

Activity in the **fabric glove and mitten industry** was somewhat higher than in 1952. Establishments numbered one more, 15 in place of 14. The value of goods shipped from these establishments was \$4,164,925, up 8 per cent from the preceding year's \$3,849,293. Employment increased by 18 per cent, from 716 in 1952 to 847 in 1953, and the cost of materials consumed in manufacture was slightly higher, \$2,112,018 in the earlier year versus \$2,057,724 in the later. The leading commodity in this industry is cotton work gloves of which 634,484

dozen pair valued at \$1,939,265 were shipped in 1953. This amount was a little above the 610,407 dozen pair worth \$1,920,742 reported as shipped in the previous year. Most of the gain reported by the industry came from fine gloves with shipments of this commodity amounting to 142,748 dozen pair worth \$1,389,734 in 1952.

The 1953 level of operations for the oiled and waterproofed clothing industry was virtually unchanged from the year before. Factory shipments had a value f.o.b. plant of \$4,322,935 compared with the preceding year's \$4,309,337. The payroll listed 497 persons in 1953 and 510 in 1952. Materials cost \$2,568,127, little changed from the \$2,507,554 cost of a year earlier. The leading product was waterproofed and showerproofed coats which were shipped to the extent of 41,078 dozen valued f.o.b. factory at \$3,077,318.

The factory shipments made by **miscellaneous clothing, n.e.s.**, in 1953 had a value f.o.b. plant

of \$11,147,296, an 8 per cent increase over the \$10,314,669 worth of products shipped by the industry in the previous year. Employment rose from 1,394 in 1952 to 1,508 in 1953. Materials cost advanced from \$6,033,610 to \$6,271,748 over the two years. The principal product of the industry is tailors' canvas fronts of which 273,271 dozen worth \$3,421,260 were shipped in 1953. Shipments of other main commodities in order of importance were as follows: shoulder pads, 1,406,689 dozen valued at \$1,514,821; belts, 370,695 dozen at \$1,248,864 and suspehders, 171,368 dozen at \$842,576.

A principal feature of this report is a detailed list of the clothing products shipped by Canadian manufacturers in 1952 and 1953. Table 17 shows total factory shipments and hence includes commodities reported by all firms no matter what their industrial classification.
