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## THE CORSET INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1932.

In 1932 reports were received from nineteen establishments engaged in the manufacture of corsets and kindred articles which was a decrease of one from the number reporting the preceding year. The industry is confined solely to Ontario and Quebec with thirteen establishments located in the former province and six in the latter.

Despite depressed conditions and lower values prevailing in 1932 this industry showed an increase in value of production of $\$ 80,024$ or 1.9 per cent, the values being $\$ 4,267,671$ in 1932 and $\$ 4,187,647$ in 1931. The amount of capital invested in the industry in 1932, $\$ 3,961,935$, showed a decrease of $\$ 850,529$ or 17.7 per cent. The cost of materizls used, $\$ 7,812,233$, also declined by $\$ 242,228$ or 11.8 per cent in comparison with 1931. There were 1,517 salaried and wage-earning employees in 1932, an increase of nine in number over 1931, and their salaries and wages, $\$ 1,202,228$, also showed an increase of $\$ 77,238$ or 6.9 per cent. The value added by manufacture increased by $\$ 322,252$ or 15.1 per cent.. These variations are shown by provinces in the following table。

Notwithstanding our efforts in 1931 and 1932 to have specified the fabrics used in the manufacture of corsets and combination garments, the greater proportion have been simply reported as "corsets" and "combination garments" irrespective of their component materials. Therefore, table 3 does not give a true account of production for under the various items "not specified" must be included garments of cotton, silk, satin, artificial silk, etc, and it is not possible therefore to make any comparison of production of these different garments for the years 1931 and 1932.

By referring to table 3 it will be observed that in both 1931 and 1932 corsets of all fabrics was the principal item of production. The figures for 1932 were 156,615 dozen valued at $\$ 2,398,861$ or $\$ 15,31$ per dozen and for $1931,143,991$ dozen valued at $\$ 2,220,646$ or $\$ 15,42$ per dozen. Of combination garments, 56,881 dozen valued at $\$ 1,161,049$ were produced in 1932 in comparison with 72,763 dozen with a value of $\$ 1,208,086$ in 1931. There were 86,175 dozen bandeaux and brassieres manufactured in 1932 with a value of $\$ 452,330$, while the 1931 production was 98,930 dozen valued at $\$ 497,097$. The quantity and value of underwear produced were practically the same in both years, 3,292 dozen garments worth $\$ 44,101$ in 1932 and 3,135 dozen valued at $\$ 44,818$ in 1931 .

THE CORSET INDUSTRY IN GANADA, 1932.

Fabrics of cotton, coutil, silk, satin, artificial silk, sateen, brocade, etc., are the principal materials used in this industry, and in 1932 there were used 2,254,738 yards costing \$771,434. The similar consumption in 1931 was 2,357,889 yards costing $\$ 895,796$. Lace, ribbon and embroidery accounted for $\$ 37,228$ in 1931 and $\$ 59,693$ in 1932. Tapes and bindings, another important item, cost \$94,008 in 1931 and $\$ 100,679$ in 1932, and steels and boning wire cost $\$ 103,901$ and $\$ 114,862$ respectively in the same years. The cost of eyelets, clasps, loops, buckles, etc., was \$69,276 in 1931 against a cost of $\$ 57,090$ in 1932 and garter parts cost $\$ 61,092$ and $\$ 58,905$ in 1931 and 1932 respectively.

The decrease of $\$ 80,529$ in the amount of capital invested in this industry is almost all accounted for in the cash, bills and accounts receivable, etco account, which shows a drop of $\$ 576,127$ in comparison with 1931. Fixed capital shows an actual decrease of $\$ 137,463$ in comparison with 1931, while the decrease in working or liquid capital is \$713,066.

The value of imports of corsets and materials was practically the same for the two years, being $\$ 133,058$ in 1931 and $\$ 133,247$ in 1932 . Exports, however, were valued at $\$ 62,261$ in 1931 and only $\$ 28,532$ in 1932 。
