#### THE CORSET INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1934.

Reports were received in 1934 from twenty-three establishments engaged in the production of corsets and kindred articles. This represents an increase of three over the previous year. These establishments represent a capital investment of \$3,550,473 in fixed and current assets. They furnished employment to 1,598 persons who received \$1,274,845 in salaries and wages. They also produced goods with a selling value at the factory of \$4,461,409 from materials costing \$2,062,352, leaving the value added by manufacture at \$2,399,057.

This industry is confined to the provinces of Ontario and Quebec with the latter having the greater share of the output. In 1934, 60 per cent of the employees, 62 per cent of the capital and 53 per cent of the value of production were reported by firms located in the province of Quebec.

Conditions in 1934 were materially better than in the previous year. The number of employees was increased by 100 with an increase of \$119,866 in the amount paid out in salaries and wages. The value of production was \$292,824 higher which is in part due to an increase of \$180,990 for the cost of materials used. The increase in the value added by manufacture was, therefore, only \$111,834. In spite of increased production, the capital invested was \$189,703 lower. This is partly accounted for by current charges for depreciation in fixed assets.

The principal item of production in this industry is, of course, corsets, and in 1934 production totalled 140,999 dozen valued at \$2,373,727. an average price of \$16.83 per dozen. This represents 53.2 per cent of the total production in 1934. Figures for 1933 were: 136,472 dozen valued at \$2,256,651 or \$16.61 per dozen, representing 54.1 per cent of the total production. The output of combination garments in 1934 was 55,941 dozen worth \$1,106,653, while the corresponding figures for 1933 were: 64,117 dozen valued at \$1,125,073. Bandeaux and brassieres accounted for \$560,292 in 1934 and \$503,695 in 1933. These various items are shown in detail in table 3.

By referring to table 6 it will be observed that in 1934 ten establishments had a production valued at \$3,650,162 or 81.8 per cent of the total, that seven establishments supplied \$2,583,666 or 72.8 per cent of the total capital investment, and also that four establishments furnished employment to 771 persons or 48.2 per cent of the total number employed.

Employment in this industry is steady throughout the year, there being but moderate monthly variations. Employment is at its height in the fall of the year with December and January being the months of lowest employment. The great majority of wage-earners in this industry are females who represent 88.7 per cent of the total. In view of the large number of women employed, the average wage is, therefore, considerably lower than the average for all manufacturing industries; the average in 1934 was \$572 as compared with an average of \$545 the previous year.

Imports of corsets are very small compared with the Canadian production. In 1934 only \$14,292 worth were imported. Exports are, however, much higher. Exports of corsets and brassieres were valued at \$44,936 in 1934 as against \$28,404 in 1933. Newfoundland, Sweden, British South Africa and New Zealand were the principal importers.

The tables that follow give detailed statistics on production, materials used, employment, imports, exports, etc.
