THE CORSET INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1935.

Reports were received in 1935 from twenty—two establishments engaged in the production of corsets and kindred articles. This represents a decrease of one over the previous year. These establishments represent a capital investment of \$3,318,490 in fixed and current assets. They furnished employment to 1,607 persons who received \$1,234,468 in salaries and wages. They also produced goods with a selling value at the factory of \$4,357,362 from materials costing \$1,970,414.

This industry is confined to the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, with the latter having the greater share of the output. In 1935, 59 per cent of the employees, 65 per cent of the capital and 53 per cent of the value of production were reported by firms located in the province of Quebec.

The corset industry did not keep pace with the general improvement attained by the manufacturing industries in 1935. With the exception of a slight increase in the number of employees, all the other factors of production were somewhat lower than in the previous year. The value of production decreased by 2.3 per cent, salaries and wages paid 3.2 per cent and capital employed 5.7 per cent.

The principal item of production in this industry is corsets, and in 1935 production totalled 138,232 dozen valued at \$2,347,188, an average price of \$16.99 per dozen. This represents 53.8 per cent of the total production in 1935. Figures for 1934 were: 140,999 dozen valued at \$2,373,727, or \$16.83 per dozen, representing 53.2 per cent of the total production. The output of combination garments in 1935 was 52,613 dozen worth \$1,112,672, while the corresponding figures for 1934 were: 55,941 dozen valued at \$1,106,653. Bandeaux and brassieres accounted for \$536,352 in 1935 and \$560,292 in 1934. These various items are shown in detail in table 3.

By referring to table 6, it will be observed that in 1935 nine establishments had a production valued at \$3,354,946, or ?? per cent of the total, that four establishments supplied \$1,911,409, or 57.6 per cent of the total capital investment, and also that four establishments furnished employment to ?66 persons, or 47.? per cent of the total number employed.

Employment in this industry is steady throughout the year, there being but moderate monthly variations. Employment is at its height in the spring of the year with July and August being the months of lowest employment. The great majority of wage-earners in this industry are females who represent 88.1 per cent of the total. In view of the large number of women employed, the average wage is, therefore, considerably lower than the average for all manufacturing industries; the average in 1935 was \$573 as compared with an average of \$572 the previous year.

Imports of corsets are very small compared with the Canadian production. In 1935 only \$1,848 worth were imported. Exports are, however, much higher. Exports of corsets and brassieres were valued at \$49,399 in 1935 as against \$44,936 in 1934.

The tables that follow give detailed statistics on production, materials used, employment, imports, exports, etc.


