## THE GOKSE INDUSTAX IN CANADA. 1937.

In $193 \%$ reports were received from twenty-three establishments engaged in the production of corsets and kindred articles, nine of which were located in fuebec and fourteen in Ontario. Quebec, however, occupied the leading position in the industry with 70 per cent of the capital invested, 57 per cent of the gross value of production and 63 per cent of the number of persons given employment.

Goods with a selling value at the factory of $\$ 4,567,707$ were produced in 1937, this amount representing an increase of $\$ 170,566$ or 3.9 per cent over the previous year. Employment was given to 1,684 persons, 129 persons or 8.3 per cent more than in 1936 and the payroll, $\$ 1,328,019$, was enlarged by $\$ 39,004$ or 3.0 per cent. Materials used cost $\$ 2,100,321$, an increase of $\$ 144,250$ or 7.4 per cent. Gapital invested in fixed and current assets totalled $\$ 3,437,503$, the increase of $\$ 118,550$ or 3.6 per cent being accounted for largely by a greater inventory value of materials on hand, stocks in process, finished products, etc.

The 136,073 doz. corsets produced rere valued at $\$ 2,348,808$ and this amount represented 51 ner cent of the total value of production in the corset industry. The average price per doz of \$17, 2.6 diffored only very slightly from the average of the previous year. The output of combination garments amounted to $55,924 \mathrm{doz}$. valued at $\$ 1,221,975$ while bandeaux and brassieres accounted for $\$ 648,256$.

As may be observed in table 5 , of the 25 establishments reporting, 10 were responsible for a production of $\$ 3,844,821$ or 84 per cent of the total value, 4 supplied $\$ 2,089,348$ or 61 per cent of the entire capital investment, and 6 furnished employment to 1,066 persong or 63 per cent of all persons employed.

The month of highest employment of wage-earners was September, when 1, z41 persons were so reported and January with 1,206 was the month of minimum employment. Since females represent 88 per cent of the wage-earners in this industry the average wage paid, $\$ 565$, was considerably lower than the average in all manufacturing industries.

Imports of corsets are very small compared with the Canadian production and in $19: 7$ only $\$ 1,1.68$ were imported. Exports of corsets and brassieres totalled \$62,070.
