

THE CORSET INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1942

In 1942 reports were received from twenty-six establishments engaged in the production of corset and kindred articles, 12 of which were located in Quebec and fourteen in Ontario. Quebec, however, occupied the leading position in the industry with 70 per cent of the capital invested, 64 per cent of the gross value of production and 68 per cent of the number of persons given employment.

Goods with a selling value at the factory of \$6,945,472 were produced in 1942 this amount representing an increase of \$773,789 or 12 per cent over the previous year. Employment was given to 2,314 persons, 51 persons or 2.3 per cent more than in 1941 and the payroll \$2,035,355 was greater by \$109,187 or 5 per cent. Materials used cost \$3,129,641 an increase of \$180,828 or 6 per cent. Capital invested in fixed and current assets totalled \$4,769,208 an increase of \$199,214 being accounted for by an increase of \$341,694 in the working capital but a decrease of \$142,480 in the value of the fixed assets.

The 159,362 doz. corsets and girdles produced were valued at \$3,064,321 and this amount represented 44 per cent of the total value of production in the corset industry. The average price per doz. of \$19.23 was 18 cents higher than the average of the previous year. The output of combination garments amounted to 63,657 dozen valued at \$1,539,546 while bandeaux and brassieres accounted for \$1,708,181.

As may be observed in Table 5, of the 26 establishments reporting, the 17 largest were responsible for a production of \$6,650,106 or over 95 per cent of the total and also supplied \$4,613,481 or over 96 per cent of the entire capital investment and furnished employment to 2,192 persons or over 94 per cent of all persons employed.

The month of highest employment of wage-earners was August when 1,897 persons were reported and December with 1,731 was the month of minimum employment. Females represent 91 per cent of the wage-earners in the industry and the average wage paid was \$21.94 per week for males and \$11.83 for females. (See Tables 7 & 8)
