THE CORSET INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1943.

In 1943 reports were received from twenty-seven establishments engaged in the production of corset and kindred articles, 12 of which were located in Quebec and 15 in Ontario. Quebec, however, occupied the leading position in the industry with 71 per cent of the capital invested, 66 per cent of the gross value of production and 69 per cent of the number of persons given employment.

Goods with a selling value at the factory of \$7,132,539 were produced in 1943 this amount representing an increase of \$187,067 or 2.6 per cent over the previous year. Employment was given to 2,220 persons, 94 persons or 3.4 per cent less than in 1942 and the payroll \$2,244,814 was greater by \$209,459 or 10 per cent.

Materials used cost \$2,891,021 a decrease of \$238,620 or 7.6 per cent. Capital invested in fixed and current assets totalled \$4,776,317 an increase of \$7,109 being accounted for by an increase of \$182,245 in fixed capital but a decrease of \$175,136 in the value of working capital.

The 134,018 doz. corsets and girdles produced were valued at \$3,187,059 and this amount represented 44.7 per cent of the total value of production in the corset industry. The average price per doz. at \$23.78 was \$4.55 higher than the average of the previous year. The output of combination garments amounted to 43.714 dozen valued at \$1,245,290 while bandeaux and brassieres accounted for \$1,949.928.

As may be observed in Table 5, of the 27 establishments reporting, the ll largest were responsible for a production of \$6,058,695 or over 84 per cent of the total and also supplied \$4,162,151 or over 87 per cent of the entire capital investment and furnished employment to 1,871 persons or over 84 per cent of all persons employed.

The month of highest employment of wage-earners was November when 1,794 persons were reported and February with 1,698 was the month of minimum employment. Females represent 92 per cent of the wage-carners in the industry and the average wage paid was \$31.74 per week for males and \$13.46 for females. (See Tables 7 & 8)
