

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THE CORSET INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1945

In 1945 reports were received from thirty-three establishments engaged in the production of corsets and kindred articles, 14 of which were located in Quebec and 19 in Ontario. Quebec, however, occupied the leading position in the industry with over 64 per cent of the gross value of production and over 63 per cent of the number of persons given employment.

Goods with a selling value at the factory of \$9,214,535 were produced in 1945; this amount representing an increase of \$1,257,355 or 15.8 per cent over the previous year. Employment was given to 2,527 persons, 177 or 7.5 per cent more than in 1944, and the payroll at \$2,786,015 was greater by \$334,799 or 13.7 per cent. Materials used cost \$3,475,601, an increase of \$510,311 or 17.2 per cent.

The 137,268 doz. corsets and girdles produced were valued at \$3,680,380 and this amount represented 39.9 per cent of the total value of production in the corset industry. The average price per doz. at \$26.81 was 80 cents higher than the average of the previous year. The output of combination garments amounted to 44,171 dozens valued at \$1,229,375 while bandeaux and brassieres accounted for \$3,292,888.

As may be observed in Table 5, of the 33 establishments reporting, the 5 largest were responsible for a production of \$5,218,767 or over 56 per cent of the total and furnished employment to 1,364 persons or over 53 per cent of all persons employed.

The month of highest employment of wage-earners was November when 2,137 persons were reported and July with 1,928 was the month of minimum employment. Females represent 91.4 per cent of the wage-earners in the industry and the average wage paid was \$29.44 per week for males and \$16.00 for females. (See Tables 7 & 8)
