

## THE CORSET INDUSTRY 1956

The corset industry reported a record level of operations in 1956. Factory selling value of products shipped by the industry reached an all-time high of \$27,682,743. This total represents an increase of 9.9 per cent over the previous high of \$25,185,878 established in 1955.

Employment and payrolls were also the highest on record. Employees numbered 3,895 in 1956 compared with 3,779 in 1955, a gain of 3.1 per cent, while salary and wage payments rose by 8.1 per cent to \$7,923,989 from \$7,332,035. The cost of materials used in manufacture increased from \$9,865,903 in 1955 to \$11,494,745 in 1956, a rise of 16.5 per cent.

In 1956 the industry shipped 321,306 dozen corsets and girdles valued at \$9,757,950 compared with 239,156 dozen worth \$8,921,715 in 1955. The average price of \$30.37 per dozen in the year under review represents a drop of \$6.94 a dozen from the year before. Shipments of bandeaux and brassieres totalled 925,925 dozen worth \$12,748,256, somewhat higher than the 887,331 dozen worth \$12,111,994 which were shipped in 1955. Bandeaux and brassieres accounted for 46 per cent of the total value of shipments and corsets and girdles for 35 per cent. Shipments of combination garments amounted to 32,545 dozen with a value of \$1,618,125.

The industry which consisted of 42 establishments was confined to the provinces of Quebec and Ontario. Quebec with 22 establishments occupied the dominant position. Factory shipments by these

establishments were valued at \$16,200,095 or 59 per cent of total. Their employees numbered 2280, also 59 per cent of the industry's total.

Five establishments each having factory shipments with a value in excess of \$1,000,000 accounted for 49 per cent of the industry's employment and 52 per cent of its shipments. A further 15 establishments with shipments valued between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 accounted for 36 per cent of both employment and shipments.

The employment of production workers was very stable throughout the year varying from a high of 3346 in April to a low of 3087 in November. The industry employs a large proportion of women and in 1956 the average monthly employment of female production workers was 2,854 or 88 per cent of total production workers.

Beginning with 1954 information on the value of year-end inventory holdings at plant and plant ware-houses has been collected as part of the annual Census of Industry. This data was formerly collected by a separate survey. The summarized results for the corset industry for the year under review will be found in Table 2.

Imports of corsets, corsellettes, girdles and brassieres were valued at \$1,123,099, an amount very little different from the \$1,175,858 worth of these commodities imported in 1955. Exports of these articles were valued at \$474,222.
