Ottawa, February, 1927.- A report is herewith presented on the Hosiery, Knit Goods and Fabric Glove Industries in Canada during the calendar year 1925. This report has been divided into 2 sectins viz: (1) Hosiery and Knit Goods and (2) Fabric Gloves. In the former there were 154 establishnents located as follows:- Ontario 105; Quebec 33; Manitoba 4; Alberta 3; British Columbia 3; Nova Scotia 3; New Brunswick 2; Sasikatchewan 1. Statistics for the last two provinces have been combined and are show as "Other Provinces." In the latter sectien reports were received from 8 establishments, 4 of which were in Ontario; 2 in Quebec and 2 in British Columbia. It has betn nocessary to combine statistics for the last two provinces also, in order to prevent disclosure of information concerning individual establishments.

A sumary of the principal statistics for each section of tre industry is presented ty provinces in Tables (a) and (b) for the calendar year 1925.

## SECTION 1. - HOSIERY AND KNIT GOODS

## PRODUCTION

The quantity and selling value at the factory of the various products of the industry during 1925 are given in table 2 for the Dominion and the provinces. Sweaters, cardigans, etc. rank first in value of production with $\$ 5,905,918$, followed in order by hosicry, silk or silk mixed, with a value of $\$ 6,878,935$, underwear, separate, all cotton, with a value of $\$ 5,412,790$, hosiery, woollen and morsted, with a value of $\$ 4,255,857$, and underwear in combination, all cotton 7 ith $\$ 3,382,111$. Tre total value of all roducts in 1925 was $\$ 47,512,154$ which was an increase over 1924 of $\$ 3,866,412$ or nearly 9 per cent. The province of Ontario leads with 74.8 per cent of the iotal value of production, Quebec being next with 18.5 per cent whilst the remaining provinces account for the remaining 6.6 per cent. The statistics relatizg to New Brunswick and Saskatchewan have been combined throughout the tables of this report under the heading "Other Provinces" in order that information regarding individual establishraents may not be divulged.

## CAPITALi INVESTWENT

The total capital investment in the Hosiery and Knit Goods section of the industry is shown by classes and provinces in Table for the calendar year 1925. Fixed capital, which comprises the value of land, buildings, machinery and tools amounted te p23, 916,699 in 1925 as compared with $£ 23,644,913$ in 1924. This amount is practically one half of the total capitalization. Working capital which included materials and stocks on hand, cash, trading and operating accounts, etc. totalled $\$ 24,313,751$ of which materials and stocks represented $\$ 14,572,406$ and cash, trading and cperating accounts, etc. $\$ 9,741,345$. The province of Ontario provided 73.4 per cent of the tots investment amcunting to $\$ 35,429,281$, Quebec being next with $\$ 8,721,390$ or 18.8 per cent, whilst the remaining provinces contributed $34,079,779$ or 7.8 per cent.


Statistics of employment in the Hosiery and Knit Goods industry are presented in a series of tables as follows:- Table 4 - Employees classified by number, sex and remuneration, 1925. Table 5-Employment of wage-earners by months, l925 and Table 6 - Working time of plants and employees, 1925.

Table 4.-Employoes, salaries and wages:- The number of salaried employees decreased in 1925 by 17 and the amount of salaries puia by 468.325 . On the other hend, the number of wage-oarners increased by 720 and the amount paid for wages by w 751,856 . Piece-workers outeido the establishmonts decreased by 288 in number and by 919,665 in payment for work done.

The months of highest employment in 1925 were November and Docember each \#ith a total omploymont of 14,098 and 13,883 respectively, winilst the se of lowest employment wore January and July with rospoctive tetals of 12,673 and $12,8 C 7$. Working Time of Plants and Employees.- The operating time of plants in the Dominicn is shom in table 6 according to (a) full time, (b) part time and (c) idle, Whilst tho hours of labcur of umployecs aro sho:m by the number of hours porked per day or shift and per reex. The opcrating time of plants whether on full or oort time increased from an average of 270.7 days in 1924 to 281.12 days in 1925, a net gain per plant of 10.72 days. Hours worked by employoes show a gain of 1.44 hours por wok as comparod with 1924 thon the hours por woek totallod 48.1. Those conditions indicate on improvoment in labour conditions in the industry during 1925.

MATERIAJS USED

The quantity and cost value of the principal materials used during 2925 are shown in Table 8, for the Dominion as a whole. The total cost of all materials used in 1925 was $\$ 26,741,153$, an increase over 1924 of $\$ 2,394,405$. Yarns of various kinds formed the principal items of materials used, the cost being $\$ 18,780,983$ or 70 per cent of the total cost of all materials.

The quantity and value of fabric gloves manufactured during the calendar year 1925 is given by provinces in Table 1. There was a marked advance in the value of production over the amount reportod for the previous year - the total value in 1924 boing $\$ 859,781$, whilst for the poriod cororod by this roport the amount was $\$ 1,043,280$, an increase of $\$ 183,499$

## MATYRIALS USED

Table 6 eives the total cost of all materials used in the industryduring the calendar year 1925 as $\$ 378,443$. Of this amount the Province of Quebec was accountable for $\$ 175,593$, the balance being contributed by the province of Ontario and British Columbia.
