# HOSIERY, KNIT GOODS AND FABRIC GLOVE INDUSTRIES IN CANADA

# 1 9 2 6

Ottawa, February, 1928.— A report is herewith presented on the Hosiery, Knit Goods and Fabric Glove Industries in Canada during the calendar year 1926. This report has been divided into 2 sections viz: (1) Hosiery and Knit Goods and (2) Fabric Gloves. In the former there were 158 establishments located as follows:—Ontario 105; Quebec 35; Manitoba 6; Alberta 3; British Columbia 4; Nova Scotia 3; New Brunsrick 2. The establishment reporting from Saskatchewan in 1925 was not operating during 1926. Statistics for the last two provinces have been combined and are shown as "Other Provinces." In the latter section reports were received from 9 establishments, 5 of which were in Ontario; 2 in suebec and 2 in British Columbia. It has been necessary to combine statistics for the last two provinces also, in order to prevent disclosure of information concerning individual establishments.

# SIZE OF ESTABLISHMENTS

In view of the tendency towards concentration in industrial enterprise, a series of tables has been prepared presenting in a threefold way the size of establishments in the Hosiery and Knit Goods industry, measured by (a) capital investment, (b) gross value of production and (c) the number of persons employed, all within certain specified groups or limitations, for the calendar years 1925 and 1926. The tables further indicate the movement of capital, production and employment within the industry.

In 1925 the number of establishments reporting was 154 with a total capital investment of \$48,230,450, a gross value of production of \$47,512,154 and a total employment of 14,211. Fifty-two establishments had a capital investment of \$42,283,435 or 37.7 per cent of the total capital investment and an average investment per establishment of \$813,239. In gross value of production, fifty-six establishments had a total production of \$41,719,528, or 87.8 per cent of the total value of production, and an average output per establishment of \$744,991. In employment, 39 establishments had 11,064 persons on the pay-roll, or 77.8 per cent of the total employment, with an average employment of 284 per establishment.

In 1926 the number of establishments reporting was 158 with a total capital investment of \$50,195,226, a gross value of production of \$52,373,441 and a total employment of 15,335. Fifty-two establishments had a capital investment of \$44,078,471 or 87.8 per cent of the total capital investment and an average investment per establishment of \$847,663.

Fifty-five establishments had a gross value of production of \$45,665,411 or 87.2 per cent of the total value of production, and an average output per establishment of \$830,335. In employment 42 establishments had 12,636 persons on the pay-roll or 79.8 per cent of the total employment and an average of 301 per establishment.






# POLUCTION

The quantity and selling value at the factory of the various products of the industry during 1926 are given in table 2 for the Dominion and the provinces. Hosiery, silk or silk mixed, ranks first in value of production with \$6,841,488, followed in order by sweaters, cardigans, etc. with a value of \$6,332,930, underwear, separate, all cotton, with a value of \$5,405,882, hosiery, weellen and worsted, with a value of \$4,415,069, and underwear in combination, all cotton with \$3,686,283. The total value of all products in 1926 was \$52,373,441 which was an increase over 1925 of \$4,861,287 or over 10 per cent. The province of Ontario leads with 72.47 per cent of the total value of production, Quebec being next with 20.7 per cent whilst the remaining provinces account for the remaining 6.8 per cent. The statistics relating to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia have been combined throughout the tables of this report in order that information regarding individual establishments may not be livulged.





#### CAPITAL INVESTMENT

The total capital investment in the Hosiery and Knit Goods section of the industry is shown by classes and provinces in Table 3 for the calendar year 1926. Fixed capital, which comprises the value of land, buildings and machinery and tools amounted to \$23,916,699 in 1925 as compared with \$25,306,746 in 1926. This amount is practically one half of the total capitalization. Working capital which included materials and stocks on hand, cash, trading and operating accounts, etc. totalled \$24,888,480 of which materials and stocks represented \$14,708,571 and cash, trading and operating accounts, etc. \$10,179,909. The province of Ontario provided 72.5 per cent of the total investment amounting to \$36,361,097, Quebec being next with \$9,355,933 or 19.6 per cent. whilst the remaining provinces contributed \$4,478,196 or 8.9 per cent.



Table 4.- Employees, salaries and wages:- The number of salaried employees increased in 1926 by 5 whilst the amount of salaries paid decreased by 246,509. The number of wage-earners increased during 1926 by 1,619 and the amount paid for wages by 21,441,225. Piece-workers outside the establishments increased by 301 in number and by 218,602 in payment for work done.

# EMPLOYMENT STATISTICS - Cont'd.

Employment by Months.— The number of wage earners employed during each month of the year is shown in Table 5 by sex. The months of highest employment in 1926 were November and December each with a total employment of 15,453 and 15,481 respectively, whilst those of lowest employment were January and February with respective totals of 13,836 and 14,184. The percentage rates of employment by sex were approximately 70 per cent for females and 30 per cent for males. The average employment by months in the tables of this report is the sum of the averages of individual plants based on the months in actual operation and not the average for the chlendar year.

Working Time of Plants and Employees.— The operating time of plants in the Dominion is shown in table 6 according to (a) full time, (b) part time and (c) idle, whilst the hours of labour of employees are shown by the number of hours worked per day or shift and per week. The operating time of plants whether on full or part time increased from an average of 281.12 days in 1925 to 285.66 days in 1926, a net gain per plant of 4.54 days. Hours worked by employees show little variation when compared with 1925 when the hours per week totalled 48.94. Those conditions indicate an improvement in labour conditions in the industry during 1926.

## MATERIALS USED

The quantity and cost value of the principals materials used during 1926 are shown in Table 8, for the Dominion as a whole. The total cost of all materials used in 1926 was \$28,731,533, an increase over 1925 of \$1,990,380. Yarns of various kinds formed the principal items of materials used, the cost being \$19,632,499 or 68.3 per cent of the total cost of all materials.

# SECTION 1. - HOSIERY AND KNIT GOODS

## Fuel Statistics

The quantity and cost value of the various kinds of fuel used in this section of the industry is given in Table 9 for the calendar year 1926. Out of a total expenditure for all fuel of \$507.959 - coal of all kinds accounted for \$460,973 or 90.75 per cent, coke takes second place with \$20,228 whilst gas occupies third position with \$15,199. The number of boilers installed for all purposes during 1926 was 110 with a boiler horsepower capacity of 11,204.



## POWER INSTALLATION

The power installed in the industry is given in Table 10 for the calendar year 1926, by (a) classes of power, (b) number of units in each class and (c) horse power capacity according to manufacturers' rating. Electricity is again the principal motive power employed with a total installation of 1,678 motors generating 10,673 horse power. The total cost of electricity purchased for power and other purposes in 1926 amounted to \$170,503 as compared with an expenditure of \$172,870 in 1925.

# SECTION 1. - HOSIERY AND KNIT GOODS

## IMPORTS AND EXPORTS

The quantity and value of raw or partly manufactured materials and wholly manufactured articles of hosiery underwear and other knitted goods imported into Canada for consumption during the talendar year 1926 is given in Table 11. The value of knitted articles, the produce of Canada, exported from Canada during the same period is shown in Table 12. The total value of taw, partly manufactured and fully manufactured goods imported for consumption during the calendar year was \$16,228,331 of which the United Kingdom supplied \$8,204,208, the United States \$5,530,341 and all other countries \$2,493,782. Of the total imports; materials in the raw state were valued at \$3,850,285, in the partly manufactured state at \$5,702,323, whilst goods in the fully manufactured condition were valued at \$6,675,723.



## SECTION 11. - FABRIC GLOVES

#### SIZE OF ESTABLISHMENTS

The **eige** of establishments in the Fabric Glove industry, owing to the limited number of plants reporting, and having regard for the divulging of individual statistics, is for these reasons necessarily not so complete as in the hosiery and knit goods industry.

Of the nine establishments reporting in 1926, five concerns had a capital investment of \$50,000 or less whilst the remaining four had a capital exceeding \$100,000 and upwards. The average capital investment in the 9 establishments being \$157,099 as compared with an average for 8 establishments in 1925 of \$140,003. In gross value of production in 1926 five plants had a total output under \$100,000 whilst the remaining four had an output ranging from \$200,000 to under \$1,000,000, the average output per plant being \$144,702 as compared with \$130,410 in 1925.

In the number of persons employed in 1926 five plants had less than 50 employees each whilst the other four had from 100 to under 500 employees per plant, the average for the nine plants being 71 in 1926 as compared with 61 in 1925 for eight plants.

## PRODUCTION

The quantity and value of fabric gloves manufactured during the calendar year 1926 is given by provinces in Table 1. There was a marked advance in the value of production over the amount reported for the previous year - the total value in 1925 being \$1,043,280, whilst for the period covered by this report the amount was \$1,302,318, an increase of \$259,038.





#### FUEL STATISTICS

The quantity and cost value of the various kinds of fuel used in the industry during the colendar year 1926 is given in table 6. Coal of all kinds is the principal item of fuel consumed with a total expenditure of \$11,218 which is equivalent to 98.2 per cent of the total fuel costs. The cost of electricity purchased in 1925 was \$3,244 as compared with an outlay of \$3,892 in 1925.

#### IMPORTS AND EXPORTS

The value of fabric gloves imported into and exported from Canada during the calendar year 1926 is given in table 8. Of the imports accredited to other countries Germany alone contributed \$489,509 and France \$139,677. The total value of imports in 1926 amounted to \$1,314,665. The total value of Canadian produce exported during the calendar year was \$234,835 of which \$204,316 was destined for Australia and \$26,822 to New Zealand. The increase in the value of exports over 1925 was \$134,864 or nearly 135 per cent.


