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# HOSIEAY, KNIT GOODS AND FABRIC GENVE IMDUSTEIES IN CAHADA <br> 1926 

Ottara, February, 1928.- A report is heromith presented on the Hosiery, Knit Goods and Fabric Glove Industries in Canada durine the calendar year 1926. This report has been divided into 2 sections viz: (1) Fosiery and Knit Goods and (2) Fabric Gloves. In the former there mere 158 establishments located as follovis:-
Ontario 105; Guebec 35; Manitoba 6; Alberta 3; British Columbia 4; Nova Scotia 3; Nem Bruns:ick 2. The establishment reportine from Saskatchewan in 1925 mas not operatine durine 1926. Statistics for the last two provinces have been combined and are shorn as "Other Provinces." In the latter section reports mere received from 9 establishments, 5 of which were in Ontario; 2 in quebec and 2 in British Columbia. It has been nocessary to combine statistics for the last two provinces also, in order to prevent disclosure of information concurning individual establishments.

## SIZE OF ESTABIISHENTS

In vier of the tondoncy towards concentration in industrial entorprise, a scries of tibles has been prepared presentins in a threefold way the size of establishments in the Hosiery and Knit Goods industry, measured by (a) capital investment, (b) ross value of production and (c) the number of porsons employed, all within cortain specified roups or limitations, for the calendar years 1925 and 1926. The tables further indicate the movement of capital, production and emplojment within the industry.

In 1925 the number of establishments reportine was 154 7ith a totol capital investment of $\$ 48,230,450$, ecrose value of production of $\$ 47,512,154$ and a total eraployment of 14,211. Fifty-two-establishments had a capital investment of $\$ 42,280,435$ or 87.7 per cent of the total capital investment and an averaso investment per establishment of $\$ 813,239$. In Eross value of production, fifty-six establishments had a tot-1 production of $\$ 41,719,528$, or 87.8 per cent of the total value of production, and an average output per establishment of $\$ 744,991$. In employment, 39 establishments had 11,064 persons on the pay-roll, or 77.8 pcr cent of the tot employment. with in avorace employment of 284 per estabiishment.
I. 1926 the number of establishments reporting was 156 7ith a total cepital investment of $\$ 50,195,226$, a gross value of production of $\$ 52,373,441$ and a totil cmployment of 15,835 . Fifty-two establishments had a capital investment of $\$ 44,075,471$ or 87.5 per cent of the total capital investment and an average investment per establishment of $\$ 847,663$.

Fifty-five establishments had a gross value of production of $\$ 45,665,411$ or 87.2 per cent of the total velue of production, and an averase output per establishment of $\$ 830,335$. In employment 42 establishments had 12,636 persons on the pay-roll or 79.8 per cent of the totol employment and an average of 301 per establishment.

## THE HOSIERY, KNIT GCOIS AND, HADAZE GIOTE INDUSTAIES IN CANADA, 1926 <br> ROIUCTION

The quantity and selling value at the factory of the various products of the industry during 1926 are Eiven in tablo 2 for the Dominion and the provinces. Hosiery, silk or silk mixed, ranks first in value of production with $\$ 6,841,485$, folloved in order zy eweaters, cardieans, etc. with a value of $\$ 6,332,930$, underwoar, separate, all cotton, with a value of $\$ 5,4(5,882$, kosiery, wocllen and morsted, with a value of $\$ 4,415,069$, and undervear in combinaticn, all ccton 71 th. $\$ 3,626,253$. The total valuo of all products in 1926 was $\$ 2,313,441$ whick. was an increase over 1925 of $\$ 4,861,207$ or over 10 per cent. The province of Cntario leads with 72.47 per cent of the total value of production, Quebec beine next with 20.7 per cent wilst the remainine provinces account for the romainine $6 . E$ per cont. The statistice reiatine to Ner Brunspick and Nova Scctia rave been combined thrcuphcut tre tables of this repert in order that information regarding individual establishments may ret be iirulgod.

## GAPITAL INVESTMENT

The total capital investment in the Hosiery and Knit Goods section of the industry is shown by classes and provinces in Table 3 for the



 Quebec being next with $\$ 9,355,933$ or 19.6 per cent. whilst the remaining provinces contributed $4,478,196$ or 8.9 per cent.

The number of wagemarners increased during 192t ky 1,619 and the amount paid for wague by el, 44l, 225 . Fiece-workers outside the establishments increased by 301 in number and by 18,602 in payment for work done.

Employment by Months.- The number of wage earners employed during each month of the year is shown in Table 5 by sex. The months of highest employment in 1926 nere November and December each rith a total emplojment of 15,453 and 15,481 respectively, whilst those of lowest employment were January and February with rospective totals of 13,836 and 14,184 . The percentage rates of employment by sex wore approximately 70 per cent for females and 30 per cent for males. The average employment by months in the tables of this report is the sum of the averages of individual plants based on the months in actual operation and not the average for the calendar year.

Working Time of Plants and Employees. - The operating time of plants in the Dominion is shomn in table 6 according to (a) full time, (b) part time and (c) idle, Whilst, the hours of labour of employees are shown by the number of hours worked per day or shift and per weck. The operating time of plants mhether on full or part time increased from an average of 281.12 days in 1925 to 285.66 days in 1926, a net gain per plant of 4.54 days. Hours rorked by employecs show little variation when compared with 1925 men the hours per meck totalled 48.94 . Those conditions indicate an improvernent in labour conditions in the industry durine 1926.

## MATERIALS USED

The quantity and cost value of the principals materials used during 1926 are shown in Table 8, for the Dominion as a whole. The total cost of all materials used in 1926 thas $\$ 28,731,533$, an increase over 1925 of $\$ 1,990,380$. Yarns of various kinds formed the principal items of materials used, the cost being $\$ 19.632 .499$ or 68.3 per cent of the total cast of all materials.

## Fuel Statistics

The quantity and cost value of the various kinds of fucl used in this section of the industry is given in Table 9 for the calendar y.ear 1926. Out of a total expenditure for all fuel of $\$ 507,959$ - coal of all kinds accounted for $\$ 460,973$ or 90.75 per cont, coke takes second place with $\$ 20,228$ whilst gas accupies third position ith $\$ 15,199$. The quantity and value of rav or partly manufactured materials and wolly marufactured articles of hosiery undervear and other knitted goods imported into Canada for consumption durine the calendar year 1926 is given in Table 11 . The value of knitted articles, the produce of Canada, exported from Canada durins the same period is shom in Table 12. The total value of tar, partly manufactured and fully manufactured goods imported for consumption during the calendar ycar mas $\$ 16,228,331$ of which the United Kinedom sumiled $\$ 8,204,208$, the United States $\$ 5,530,341$ and all other countries $\$ 2,493,782$. Of the total imports; materials in the rat state were valued at $\{3,850,285$, in the partly mamactured state at $\$ 5,702,323$, whilst soods in the full: mamufactured condition were valued at $\$ 6,675,723$.

## SECTION 11. - FABRIC GLOVES

## SI2E OF EST.ABLISHMENTS

The $\boldsymbol{H}^{2}$ e of establishments in the Fabric Glove industry, orin to the limited number of plants reporting, and havine resard for the divulsinf of individual statistics, is for these reasons necessarily not so complete as in the hosiery and knit oods industry.

Of the nine establishments reportine in 1926, five concerns had a capital investment of $\$ 50,000$ or less whilst the remaining four had a capital exceedine $\$ 100,000$ and upwards. The average capital investment in the 9 establishments beink $\$ 157,099$ as compared $\nabla i$ th an average for 8 establishments in 1925 of $\$ 140,003$. In gross value of production in 1926 five plants had a total outpat under $\$ 100,000$ whilst the remainine four had an output rancing from $\$ 200,000$ to under $\$ 1,000,000$, the averase outrut per plant being \$144,702 as compared with \$130,410 in 1925

In the number of persons employed in 1926 five plants had less than 50 employees each whilst the other four had from 200 to under 500 employees per plant, the averace for the nine plants bein 71 in 1926 as compared with 61 in 1925 for eicht plants.

## PRODUCTION

The quantity and value of fabric gloves mamufactured durine the calendar year 1926 is siven by provinces in Table 1. There mas a marked advance in the value of production over the amount reported for the previous year - the total value in 1925 being $\$ 1,043,280$, whilst for the period covered by this report the amount mas $\$ 1,302,318$, an increase of \$259,038.
