NOTE - The statistics published in the present staiement include only the statistics of such manufacturing establishments as make Hosiery, Knitted goods and Fabric gloves as their principal products. Statistics relaling to epecific products are therefore not to be regarded as comprehensive, as producis like, Hosiery and Knitted goods and Fabric gloves are also found as sacondary projucts of other industries euch as Woollen industry

FOSIERT, KNII GOODS AND FABRIC GLOVE INDUSTRIES IN CANADA, 1928.

Ottama, February, 1930.- A report is hevewith presented on the Hosiery, Knit Goods and Fabric Glove Industries in Canada during the calendar year 1928. This report has been divided into 2 sections viz: (I) Hosiery and Knit Goods and (2) Fabric Gloves. In the former there mere 158 establishments located as follows:- Ontario 104, Quebec 36, iianitoba 5, Saskatchewan 1, Alberta 3. British Coiumbia 3, Nova Scotia 4 and New Brunswick 1. Statistics for the last tro provinces have been combined and are shorm as "Other Provinces", rhilst those for Saskatcheran have been combined with Alberta. In the latier section reports mere received from 7 establishments, 3 of which mere in Ontario; 2 in quebec and 2 in British Columbia. It has been ne essary to combine statistics for the last tro provinces also, in order to prevent disclosure of information concerning individual establishments.

## Association of Industries

The Hosiery, Knit Goods, Fabric Glove and the Dyoirg and Finishing of Textiles industries are so closely associated with the Woollen industries that a condensed sumary of the principal statistics of each may be of interest in this connection.

## Sase of Establishments

In viem of the tendency towards concentration in industrial enterprise, a series of tables has been prepared presenting in a threefold way the size of establishments in the सosiery and Knit Goods industry, raeasured by (a) capital investment, (b) gross value of production and (c) the number of persons employed, all within certain specified groups or limitations, for the calendar years 1927 and 1928. The tables further indicate the movement of capital, production and employment mithin the industry.

In 1927 the number of establishments reporting mas 159 rith a total capital investment of $\$ 55,511,978$, a gross vaiue of production of $\$ 53,928,107$ and a total employment of 16,732 . Fifty-three establishments had a capital investment of $\$ 48,855,546$ or 88 per cent of the total capital investment and an average investment per establishment of $\$ 921,803$.

Fifty-nine establishments had a gross value of production of $\$ 47,567,101$ or 88.2 per cent of the total value of production, and an average output per establishment of $\$ 806,222$. In employment 42 establishments had 13.396 persons on the pay-roll or 80 per cent of the total employment, and an average of 319 per establishment.

In 1928 the number of establishments reporting was 158 with a total capital investment of $\$ 59,385,994$, a gross value of production of $\$ 57,502,779$ and a total employment of 18,420. Twenty-tmo estab:1shments had a capital investment of \$37,367,041 or 62.9 per cent of the total capital investnent and an average investment per establishment of $\$ 1,698,502$. Seventeen establishments had a gross value of production of $\$ 57,502.779$ or 50.32 per cent of the tatal value of production, and an average output per establi shment of $\$ 1,702,192$. In employment 31 establishments had 12,18 persons on the pay-roll or 69.27 per cent of the total employment and an average of 393 per establishment.

A comparative statement of the products of both sections of the industry, by groups of commodies, is given in the following table for the calendar years 1927 and 1928.


## Production

The quantity and selling value at the factory of the various products of the industry during 1928 are given in table 2 for the Dominion and the provinces. Eosiery, silk or silk mixed and silk full fashioned ranks first in value of production tith $\$ 10,148,528$, followed in order by underwear, separate, all cotton, with a value of $\$ 5,693,825$, sweaters, caraigans, etc. Tith a value of $\$ 5,328,454$, hosiery, woollen and worsted, ith a value of $\$ 3,385,826$, and underwear in combination, all cotton rith $\$ 3,848,648$. The total value of all products in 1928 vas $\$ 57,502,729$, thich mas an increase over 1927 of $\$ 3,574,672$ or nearly 5.22 per cent. The province of Ontario leads with 70.3 per cent of the total value of production, Quebec being next with 22.6 per cent milst the other provinces account for the remaining 7.1 per cent. The statistics relating to Nerv Brunsmick and Nova Scotia, and Saskatchewan and Alberta have been combined throughout the tables of this report in order that information regarding individual establishments may not be divolged.

## Capital Investment

The total capital investment in the Hosiery and Knit goods section of the industry is show by classes and provinces in Table 3 for the calendar year 1928. Fixed capital, which comprises the value of land, buildings and machinery and tools amounted to $\$ 32,509,770$ in 1927 as compared with $\$ 30,255,740$ in 1928. This amount is practically one half of the total capitalization. Working capital which included materials and stocks on hand, cash, trading and operating accounts, etc. in 1928 totalled $\$ 29,130,254$ of which materials and stocks represented $\$ 16,843,920$ and cash, trading and operating accounts, etc. $\$ 12,286,334$. The province of ontario provided 70.06 per cent of the total investment amounting to $\$ 41,607,366$, quebec being next with $\$ 12,380,493$ or 20.85 per cent, whilst the remaining provinces contributed $\$ 5,398,135$ or 9.09 per cent.

## Employment Statistics

Statistics of employment in the Hosiery and Knit Goods industry are presented in a series of tables as follow:- Table 4 Employees classified by number, sex and remuneration, 1928. Table 5-Employment of wage-earners by monihs, l928 and Table 6 - Working time of plants and employees, 1928.

Table 4 - Employees, salaries and wages:- The number of salaried employees increased in 1928 by 167 whilst the amount of salaries paid increased by 264,571 . The number of wage-earners increased during 1928 by 692 and the amount paid for wa, 0 by 7706,299 . Fiece-workers outside the establishments increased by 23 in number and by 99,176 in payment for work done.

Employment Statistics - Contid.
Imployment by months.- The number of nage earners employed during each month of the year is shom in Table 5 by sex. The months of highest employment in 1928 were October, November and December, each $\pi$ th a total empioyment of $16.917,17,265$ and 17,243 respectively, whilst those of lowest employment were August, January and February with respective totals of $15,965,15,857$ and 15,377 . The percentage of employment by sex tas approximately 69 per cent for femalos and 31 per cent for males. The average employment by months in the tables of this refort is the sum of the averages of individual plants based on the months in actual operation and not the average for the calendar year.

Working time of plants and employees.- The operating time of plants in the Dominion is shom in table 6 according to (a) full time, (b) part time and (c) idle, Thilst the hours of labour of employees are shown by the number of hours worked per day or shift and per week. The operating time of plants whether on full or part time fell from an average of 283.78 days in 1927 to 283.20 days in 1928 , a net decrease per plant of .58 days. Hours worked by mployees show little variation when compared with $1927^{\circ}$ hen the hours per week totalled 7,701 as compared with 7,679 in 1928. These differences indicate little change in labour conditions in the industry during 1928.

From a study of the table it will be seen that in the hosiery and knit goods industry the hours of labour predominating were 9 hour day in Nova Scotia and Nen Brunsmick, Ontario and British Columbia, the 10 hour day in quebec and the 8 hour day in Altuerta, Saskatchewan and anitoba. The number of hours worked per day in the month of highest employment and the standard working hours per iveek are shown by provinces in Table 10. It should be noted that hilst the statistics relating to hours of labour in colums 1,2 and 3 are based on figures compiled for the month of highest employment, those in columns 4 and 5 represent the total and average of standard weekly hours of labour for the number of establishments reporting to the Bureau. For this reason the relation betreen daily and weekly hours of labour is to some extent impaired. The average dally hours of labour on the above basis was for the Dominion 9.08 , whilst the average standard Teekly hours worked out at 48.60 per plant.

## Materials Used

The quantity and cost value of the principal materials used during 1928 are shom in Table 8, for the Dominion as a whole. The total cost of all materials used in 1928 was $\$ 30,801,854$, an increase from 1927 of $\$ 3,092,109$ or an increase of more than 11 per cent. Yarns of various kinds formed the principal item of materials used, the cost being $\$ 22,027,569$ or 71.5 per cent of the total cost of all materials.

## Fuel Statistics

The quantity and cost value of the various kinds of fuel used in this section of the industry is given in Table 9 for the calendar year 1928. Out of a total expenditure for all fuel of $\$ 514,055$, coal of all kinds accounted for $\$ 488,697$ or 95 per cent, gas takes second place mith 2 per cent, whilst fuel oils occupy third position $\pi i$ th 1.37 per cent. The number of boilers installed for all purposes during 1928 mas 146 ith a boiler horsepower capacity of 14,024 .

## Power Installation

The power installed in the industry is given in table 10 for the calendar year 1928, by (a) classes of power, (b) number of units in each class and (c) horse power capacity according to manufacturers' rating. Electricity is again the principal motive porer employed mith a total installation of 1,884 motors generating 9,210 horse power. The total cost of electricity purchased for power and other purposes in 1928 amounted to $\$ 158,007$ as compared with an expenditure of $\$ 172,068$ in 1927 .

## Imports and Exports

The quantity ad value of raw or partly manufactured materials and wholly manuf actured articles of hosiery underwear and other znitted goods imported into Canada for consumption during the calendar year 1928 is iven in Table 11. The value of knitted articles, the produce of Canada, exported from Canada during the same period is shom in Tabie 12. The total value of raw, partly manuf actured and fully manufactured goods imported for consumption during the calendar year was $\$ 18,577,442$, of wich the United Kingiom supplied $\$ 8,507,364$, the United States $\$ 6,101,967$ and all Other Countries $\$ 3,868,111$. Of the total imports, materials in the raw state were valued at $\$ 5,870,448$, in the partly manuf actured state at $\$ 7,683,242$, whilst goods in the fully manufactured condition vere valued at $\$ 5,023,752$.

## Size of Establishments

The size of establishments in the Fabric glove industry, oring to the limited number of plants reporting, and having regard for the divolging of individual statistics, is for than reasons necessarily not so cormlete as in the hosiery and knit goods industry.

Of the seven establishments reporting in 1928 , four concerns had a capita? investment of $\$ 50,000$ or less whilst the remaining three had a capital exceeding $\$ 100,000$ and uprards. The average capital investment in the 7 establishments being $\$ 144,847$, as compared with an average for 9 establishments in 1927 of $\$ 149,000$. In gross value of production in 1928, four plants had a total output under $\$ 100,000$ whilst the remaining three had an output ranging fram $\$ 100,000$ to under $\$ 500,000$ the average output per plant being $\$ 149,854$ as compared with $\$ 143,810$ in 1927.

In the number of persons employed in 1928 four plants had less than 50 employees each whilst the other three had from 50 to under 200 employees per plant, the average for the seven plants being 55 in 1928 as compared with 54 in 1927 for 9 plants.

## Production

The quantity and value of fabric gloves manufactured during the calendar year 1928 is given by provinces in table 1. There was a considerable decline in the value of production over the amount reported for the previous jear - the total value in 1927 being $\$ 1,294,288$, hilst for the period covered by this report the amount was $\$ 1,048,979$ or a decrease of $\$ 245,300$.


## Capital Investment

The capital invested in this section of the industry is shom by provinces for the calendar year 1928 in Table 2. Out of a total capitalization of \$1,013,932, the province of Ontario contributed $\$ 612,083$ or a little more than 60 per cent.
