HOSIERY, KNITTED GOODS AND FABRIC GLOVE AND MITTEN INDUSTRIES 1950

This report is divided into four sections, (1) Combined principal statistics and products of the hosiery, knitted goods and the fabric glove and


mittens industries, (2) The hosiery industry, (3) The knitted goods industry and (4) The fabric glove and mitten industry.

SECTION 1. THE COMBINED HOSIERY, KNITTED GOODS AND FABRIC GLOVE AND MITTEN INDUSTRIES, 1950

These industries together reported a gain in value of production of \$4,136,167 in 1950 but a drop in employment of 1,016. In the knitted goods industry employment dropped from 15,089 in 1949 to 13,926 in 1950 and production dropped from \$88,209,552 to \$88,199,070 over the two years. In the hosiery industry employment dropped slightly over the two

years from 11,353 in 1949 to 11,329 in 1950 but the gross value of production rose from \$54,809,523 in 1949 to \$58,026,696 in the year under review. The fabric glove and mitten industry gained in both employment and production over the two years. Employment rose from 647 to 818 and the gross value of production increased from \$2,927,236 to \$3,856,712.

THE HOSIERY AND KNITTED GOODS INDUSTRY



There were striking changes in the pace of activity in the hosiery and knitted goods industries during 1950. Early in the year nearly all mills were operating far below capacity in reflection of poor conditions in the retail trades. Not until the third quarter was there a revival of demand. The result of the heavy buying movement was a marked expansion of production. Again normal business planning was superseded by the currents of international relations. During the latter part of 1950, the fear of general war and memories of World War II scarcities inspired a stockpiling urge which resulted in great activity at the manufacturing level. The net result was to bring these industries to a higher level of activity than at any time in the preceding two years. The broad outlines of this development are charted on the preceding page.

Prior to the inception of the defence economy in the third quarter of 1950, the two industries had experienced unsatisfactory trading conditions. The sustained rise in yarn prices in the face of restricted consumer demand for finished goods narrowed profit margins. Financial statements indicated that mills experienced great difficulty in selling their production at a profit. Even before the spectacular advance in raw wool prices in August, 1950, mills were being forced to utilize synthetic fibres to keep prices of finished goods at levels the consumer could afford to pay. This movement was accentuated after August. Manufacturers of men's and boy's hosiery, underwear and outerwear increased their consumption of fibres other than wool. Many leading producers developed extensive ranges of hosiery made from nylon staple fibre yarns and others produced nylon and wool blends. There was extensive promotion between March and June of new types of hosiery.

Similar problems were encountered in the production of men's and boy's sweaters and pullovers. Mills were producing new types of T shirts, jacket type sweaters and other new style garments from synthetic and cotton yarns. The same trend was evident in women's wear. Nylon and nylon-wool sweaters, pullovers, etc. have found wide acceptance in all parts of the country. These changes have made the knitted goods industry broader in scope and less dependent on any one fibre.

The combined production of the hosiery, knitted goods and fabric glove and mitten industries at \$150,082,478 was 3 per cent higher than the \$145,946,311 reported in 1949. The cost of materials used rose by \$4,451,753, from \$66,283,965 in 1949 to \$70,735,718 in 1950. Employment dropped from 27,089 in 1949 to 26,073 in 1950 while salaries and wages rose from \$44,667,945 in 1949 to \$45,239,045 in the year under review. There were 309 establishments in these industries in 1950 compared with 305 the previous year.

While developments in the hosiery, knitted goods and fabric glove and mitten industries are detailed in their respective sections it may be observed in Table 3 that such items as sweaters, cardigans, pullovers, hosiery and gloves showed an increased production in 1950. On the other hand there were declines in both combination and separate underwear as well as in knitted and woven underslips. The output of hosiery increased from 8,969,447 dozen pair valued at \$59,094,090 in 1949 to 9,240,549 dozen pair worth \$61,841,375 in 1950. The output of sweaters, cardigans, pullovers etc., was valued at \$24,205,125 in 1950 compared with \$22,627,159 in 1949. Knitted and fabric gloves and mittens rose from 1,010,783 dozen pair worth \$4,870,899 in 1949 to 1,186,854

dozen pair valued at \$6,091,651 in 1950. The output of underwear declined from 2,972,597 dozen valued at \$29,730,716 in 1949 to 2,659,595 dozen worth \$26,217,807 in 1950. Underslips were produced to the extent of 99,591 dozen worth \$1,996,576 in 1950 compared with 150,402 dozen valued at \$3,201,797 in the previous year.

In relation to the size of population, Canada's hosiery and knit goods industries produce more varied and specialized products than the knitting industry of any other country. Almost 300 establishments with a total capital investment around \$100 million in 122 cities, towns and villages across the Dominion strive to meet the clothing needs of a people subject to Canada's extreme climates. Since the war these industries have spent \$38 million on modernization. Some knit goods manufacturers in Canada are fully integrated, spinning their own cotton, wool, spun rayon, nylon and mixture yarns and knitting fabric and articles. Other mills buy yarn and knit. Outside the knitting industry are clothing firms which buy knitted fabrics from knitters and cut and sew garments.

The range of products of the knitting industry is vast and continually changing. There is a large variety of knitted outerwear and some designed in Canada—the jumbo-knit sweater and the turtle-neck pullover are two—have become staples, their acceptance based on their utility. Other outerwear includes sweaters, polo shirts, T shirts, knitted suits, bathing suits, gloves, mitts, ties etc. In underwear there is everything from the heavy all-wool and fleece-lined types favoured by bush workers and outdoor men

to the lightweight lingerie, including the comparatively new nylon tricot. The development of the domestic industry has taken place despite a large volume of imports. In 1950 imports of knitted outerwear totalled 1,256,000 pounds which came largely from Britain and represented a volume over three times as large as pre-war levels.

In the hosiery industry there are 121 establishments of which almost all produce nothing but hosiery. In addition a number of plants in the knitting industry also produce hosiery. Types of hosiery made vary from high-style, full-fashioned nylon goods to specialized types for outdoors such as ski socks and heavy wool hose. To meet the demands of Canadian women, domestic mills are constantly changing machinery to produce stockings of finer knit. Cobweb-like but comparatively tough, 60 and 66 gauge nylons are the latest fashion in this market.

In 1939 Canadian hosiery mills shipped nearly 6,000,000 pairs of full-fashioned hosiery to 60 foreign countries but by 1950 dollar restrictions in most of these countries had reduced exports to 480,000 pairs in 24 markets. There were sizeable imports of wool hosiery in 1950. Imports of woollen half hose totalled 4,500,000 pairs, mostly from the United Kingdom and represented an increase of 60 per cent over 1949. Meanwhile, however, Canadian per capita consumption has remained fairly steady and, with an increasing population, mills are selling more stockings on the home market. Total consumption of full-fashioned hosiery in 1950 exceeded 41 million pairs or 8.4 pairs for each woman over 15 years of age.

SECTION 2. THE HOSIERY INDUSTRY, 1950

The hosiery industry in 1950 operated at a higher level than in 1949 in terms of value of production and materials used but employment remained at approximately the same level. There was a noticeable increase, however, in the exports of hosiery which rose from 131,869 dozen pair in 1949 to 183,864 dozen pair in 1950. The industry consisted of 121 establishments in 1950 of which Quebec accounted for 65, Ontario 52, British Columbia 2, Alberta 1 and Nova Scotia 1.

The value of production of the hosiery industry at \$58,026,696 in 1950 exceeded 1949 production of \$54,809,523 by \$3,217,173 or 6 per cent. The cost of materials was up by \$1,813,897 from \$19,099,844 in 1949 to \$20,913,741 in 1950. Employment was 11,329 in 1950 compared with 11,353 the previous year and salaries and wages rose from \$20,194,998 in 1949 to \$21,150,344 in the year under review.

During the first half of 1950, retail sales were running at a level about 10 per cent below the previous year. However, after mid-summer most lines began to move more rapidly. With consumer income about 5 per cent higher than in 1949 and with employment and general business conditions improving, purchases during the remainder of 1950

ran at a somewhat higher rate. While some of this increased demand was being met by a higher level of imports, particularly from the United Kingdom, Canadian mills were expanding their operations. The employment of wage-earners in the industry, which fell from 10,100 in January to 9,277 in July, steadily increased until November when the level reached 10,419.

In 1950 the hosiery industry produced 8,148,612 dozen pairs of hosiery valued at \$56,052,228 compared with 7,885,729 dozen pairs valued at \$53,290,358 in 1949. The 1950 total was made up of 3,061,097 dozen pairs of full-fashioned and 5,087,515 dozen pairs of seamless hosiery. In terms of fibres, 3,141,620 dozen pairs were made of nylon, 2,845,320 of cotton and mixtures, 1,829,062 of wool and mixtures, 283,342 of rayon and mixtures and 49,268 of real silk and mixtures.

Yarns of various kinds, particularly nylon, cotton, worsted and rayon comprised the greater part of all materials used. In 1950 the consumption of purchased yarns was 7,981,416 pounds valued at \$17,731,066. Of this the largest single items were nylon, which totalled 1,869,122 pounds valued at \$7,890,382 and cotton, including mercerized, which totalled 3,231,014 pounds worth \$3,479,774.

SECTION 3. THE KNITTED GOODS INDUSTRY, 1950

In 1950 the value of production of the knitted goods industry was \$88,199,070, a slight drop from the \$88,209,552 reported in 1949. Domestic production of knitted goods has suffered a moderate decline since 1948. In that year a record level of domestic output, together with large stocks of imported goods, served to eliminate the backlog of demand created during the war and immediate post-war years. Imports consisting largely of knitted outerwear from the United Kingdom and certain kinds of cotton underclothing from the United States have accounted for approximately 9 per cent of the domestic disappearance of all knitted goods. During the first half of 1950, domestic sales of knitted goods were running at a rate 10 to 15 per cent below that of 1949. However, activity increased sharply in the second half of 1950 with the added incentive of defence production. The employment of wage-earners in the industry decreased from 12,705 in January to 11,689 in July but by November the number had risen to 12,834.

The knitted goods industry in 1950 consisted of 172 establishments of which 91 were in Ontario, 66 in Quebec, 6 in Manitoba, 3 in Alberta, 3 in

Nova Scotia, 2 in British Columbia and 1 in New Brunswick. Employment in the industry dropped from 15,089 in 1949 to 13,926 in 1950, a loss of 1,163. Salaries and wages declined from \$23,754,297 in 1949 to \$22,991,182 in the year under review. The cost of materials showed an increase from \$45,602,977 in 1949 to \$47,804,653 in 1950.

In 1950 the knitted goods industry produced 341,557 dozen men's and boy's combinations of cotton or chiefly cotton valued at \$6,501,354. Men's and boy's combinations of wool or chiefly wool were produced to the extent of 87,014 dozen valued at \$3,079,291. Sweaters, cardigans, pull-overs, etc., of wool, cotton, rayon and other materials and mixtures amounted to 1,256,055 dozen valued at \$23,801,866 in 1950.

Yarns of various kinds, particularly cotton, woollen, worsted and rayon comprised the greater part of all the materials used. In 1950 the consumption of purchased yarns was 25,480,495 pounds valued at \$32,060,454. Of this the largest single item was cotton, which totalled 13,787,910 pounds worth \$12,215,526.

SECTION 4. THE FABRIC GLOVE AND MITTEN INDUSTRY, 1950

In terms of both production and employment, the fabric glove and mitten industry made significant strides forward in 1950. Production was up from \$2,927,236 in 1949 to \$3,856,712 in 1950, a gain of \$929,476 or 32 per cent. The number of employees increased by 26 per cent from 647 in 1949 to 818 in 1950 and salaries and wages rose from \$718,650 in 1949 to \$1,097,519 in the year under review. The cost of materials increased by \$436,180 from \$1,581,144 in 1949 to \$2,017,324, an increase of 27.6 per cent.

The production of cotton work gloves in 1950 was 662,609 dozen pairs valued at \$2,049,611 compared with 604,157 dozen pairs valued at \$1,730,677 in 1949. The output of dress gloves showed an increase from 99,625 dozen pairs valued at \$930,165 in 1949 to 108,866 dozen pairs worth \$1,118,069 in 1950. Cotton fabrics consumed by the industry in 1950 amounted to 1,610,756 yards valued at \$826,669 compared with 1,382,837 yards worth \$624,045 in the previous year.
