Ottawa, June, 1926.-. The anmal rewort on the Women's Factory Ciothing Industry in anadafor the calendar year lg2lt is heremits presented. Included in the inaustry are romen's clothing, ladies' and chijriren's wear, momen's neckwear and fancy goois, embroidery ard urimminjs, and laces, tapes, and bindings. The total number of establishments reporting in 2924 was 359 as compared with 333 in 1923, an increase or 26 establishments. The following comparative table shows the mumber and location of the factories by provinces for the calendar yeas's 1922, 1923 and 1924. To prevent disclosure of individual statistics Nova Scotia and New Biunsitick are given under "Maritime Provinces" Whilst Alberta and Manitoba appen" under "Prairie Pror"aces" throughout this"こeport.

## PRINCIPAL STATISTICS

A sumary of the principal statistics of the industry is presented in Table for Canada and the provinces during the calendar year 1924. Compared with 1923 increases appear in cupital investment umounting to $v^{2}, 525,953$, in the numbor of wage aarners of 59 , in the
 numbor of salariod omployoas of 111 and in paymonts for salariss of wi52,308, in tho numbor of outsido piocoworkors of 66 and in the amount paid of 251,835 and in the cost of fuol of $33,963$.

Tho factory sclling voluo of tho principal itoms of production in tho industry is shom in tablo 2 for Cenada and the provinces. Tho total value of production incroascd from $42,982,646$ in 1923 to $46,100,215$ in 1924 or a not improvoliont of $3,117,569$ or 7.25 por cont. Tho principal ittons of production woro, drosses of all kinds valucd nt $14,761,341$, cocts and clociks $10,383,403$, suits, tailorod $2,790,546$,
 nockwoar for ledies $575,169$.

## CAPITAL ITVESTMENT

The amount of capital employed in the industry during 1924 is shown by kinds and provinces in table 3. Fixed capital mhich includes, land, buildings, machinery and tools rosc from $\$ 5,052.036$ in 1923 to $\$ 5,751,606$ in 1924, an increase of $\$ 699.570$ or 13.8 per cent. Working capital which includes materials, supplics and stocks on hand together with cash, tradine and operating accounts, etc,als6 increased during that period from $\$ 13,896,881$ to $\$ 15,723,264$, an increase of $\$ 1,826,383$ or 13.1 per cent. Percentages of the total capital inveatment by provinces according to rank were as follows:- Ontario 62.25; Quebec 34.88; Prairie Provinces 1.58; British Columbia .90; and the Maritime Provinces. 39.

## BMPLOMMTM STATISTICS

Statistice relating to emoloyment will be found in tables 4,5 and 6. Table 4 shows the mumber $\cap$ persons employed by classes, sex and remneration as well as by provinces. Compared with 1923 therc whe a decrease in employment of 111 in the salaricd class, an increase of 59 in the wage carning class, and a decrease of 166 in the number of outside piece morkers, but on the other hand salaries increased by $\$ 152,308$, wages paid by $\$ 649,398$, whil st the amount paid to outside ploce workers decreased by $\$ 51,835$. The average salary per employee irrespective of sex was approximately $\$ 1970$ in 1923 whilst in 1924 it had risen to $\$ 2011$ or an increase of a little over 2 per cent. Similarly the average wage of all employecs advanced from about $\$ 832$ in 1923 to $\$ 884$ in 1924 or a percentage increase of 6.25 .

Table 5 presents statistics of the operating time of plants and of employees. The operating time of plants is shown according to (a) full time, (b) part time, and (c) idle, whilst for employees the total and ave ase hours normally worked per day and per woek are shown.

In table 6 the number of employees on the payroll for each month of the year are shown according to sex. Bmployment reached the maximum in April and Septomber with totals of 12,133 and 12,128 respectively. It was dowest in the months of December and Jamary when the total employment stood at 10,407 and 10,913 . The average enrolment for the year was 2,861 males and 8,540 females, or a total of 11,501 .

## FUFL CONSUMPTION

The quantity and cost value of the fuel consumed in the industry during 1924 is shown in table 7. Coal of all kinds represented more than 80 per, cent of the total cost, gas being next with 9.1 per cent, with fi il oil in third place with approximately 6 per cent. The cost of olectricity purchased during the year was $\$ 72,166$.
