THE MISCELLANEOUS CLOTHING INDUSTRIES

1951

The miscellaneous clothing group of industries as delineated by the Standard Industrial Classification includes Corsets, Fur dressing and dyeing, Fur goods, Fabric gloves and mittens, Hats and caps, Oiled and waterproofed clothing and Miscellaneous clothing, n.e.s. The publications in which these industries are reported upon are listed on the opposite page under O, P, Q, R and S.

Fabric gloves and mittens is included with the report on Hosiery and Knitted goods in order_ to bring fabric and knitted gloves together. Fur dressing and dyeing and Fur goods appear together in one report. There are separate reports for Corsets as well as Hats and Caps.

The present report includes both Oiled and waterproofed clothing and Miscellaneous clothing, n.e.s., a residual grouping impossible to classify elsewhere.

Section 1. The Oiled and Waterproofed Clothing Industry, 1951

Production of the oiled and waterproofed clothing industry increased from \$4,204,902 in 1950 to \$4,564,182 in 1951, a rise of \$359,280 or 8.5 per cent. The production of waterproofed and shower-proofed coats was somewhat in advance of the previous year but there was a decline in the number of rubberized and oiled coats. Imports showed an increase from \$212,933 in 1950 to \$304,976 in 1951 while exports were up from \$87,806 to \$168,025 in the same period.

Employment in the industry remained at approximately the same level, 479 in 1951 compared with 475 in 1950 while salaries and wages showed an increase from \$919,973 to \$996,320. There was a rise in the cost of materials of \$273,786 from \$2,149,227 in 1950 to \$2,423,013 in 1951.

Of the 14 establishments in the industry, 10 were located in Quebec and 4 in Ontario. Quebec

accounted for \$3,523,191 or 77 per cent of total production of the industry and 72 per cent of employment. On the basis of size the industry was dominated by 8 firms each with a value of production in excess of \$100,000 and this group accounted for 93 per cent of the total value of production. The industry's employment of wage-earners varied from a high of 457 in March to a low of 384 in December.

The chief specified type of production in the industry in 1951 consisted of waterproofed and shower-proofed coats which were produced to the extent of 12,512 dozen valued at \$2,977,387 in 1951. Rubberized and oiled coats were produced to the extent of 4,762 dozen worth \$486,613 in 1951 compared with 4,903 dozen valued at \$328,360 in 1950. The production of windbreakers in 1951 was 2,114 dozen worth \$242,194 compared with 2,139 dozen valued at \$270,915 in 1950.

Section 2. The Miscellaneous Clothing Industry, N.E.S., 1951

The value of production of the miscellaneous clothing industry, n.e.s., rose from \$8,187,133 in 1950 to \$8,808,248 in 1951, an increase of \$621,115 or 8 per cent. The value of tailors' canvas fronts increased from \$2,359,023 in 1950 to \$2,561,879 in 1951. Shoulder pads increased from \$1,502,462 to \$1,876,493 over the same period. On the other hand there was a decline in the value of suspenders from \$1,078,680 in 1950 to \$971,484 in 1951.

In 1951 there were 61 establishments in the industry, the same number as in the previous year. Employees decreased from 1,392 in 1950 to 1,359 in 1951 and salaries and wages were down by \$15,443, from \$2,371,932 in 1950 to \$2,356,489 in 1951. The cost of materials increased from \$4,269,989 to \$4,924,485 over the two years, a rise of \$654,496 or 15 per cent.

The miscellaneous clothing industry, n.e.s., in 1951 was dominated by 36 establishments in Quebec, which produced goods to the value of \$6,015,405 and accounted for 68 per cent of the industry's total production and 67 per cent of total employment, From

the point of view of size, 4 establishments each with an output between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 accounted for 35 per cent of production and 9 establishments whose output varied between \$200,000 and \$500,000 accounted for 31 per cent of production. The industry's employment of wage-earners varied from a high of 1,218 in March to a low of 972 in December.

Most of the items of production in the miscellaneous clothing industry, n.e.s. cannot be separately specified as they are produced by only one or two firms. In addition to the items already noted the industry produces significant quantities of safety clothing, including aprons, coats, gloves, mitts, leggings, sleeves, miner's hat linings, face shields and asbestos pads. Belts were produced to a value of \$886,872 in 1951 compared with \$622,741 in 1951. The value of production of armlets and sleeve supporters was down from \$78,175 in 1950 to \$28,985 in 1951. Other items of production included academic caps, ties, scarves and mufflers, dress shields, utility cloths, plastic baby supplies, shoulder straps and girdles.
