THE MISCELLANEOUS CLOTHING INDUSTRIES

1953

The miscellaneous clothing group of industries as delineated by the Standard Industrial Classification includes corsets, fur dressing and dyeing, fur goods, fabric gloves and mittens, hats and caps, oiled and waterproofed clothing, and miscellaneous clothing, n.e.s. The publications in which these industries are reported upon are listed on the opposite page under P, Q, R and S.

Fur dressing and dyeing and fur goods appear together in one report. Separate reports are prepared for corsets and for hats and caps. This report deals with the remaining three, namely, fabric gloves and mittens, oiled and waterproofed clothing, and miscellaneous clothing, n.e.s., a residual grouping impossible to classify elsewhere.

Prior to 1952, fabric gloves and mittens was included with the report on hosiery and knitted goods in order to bring together fabric and knitted gloves. The discontinuance of this practice was prompted by a proposed change in the Standard Industrial Classification whereby the knitting mills will be removed from the clothing industrial group.

SECTION 1. THE FABRIC GLOVE AND MITTEN INDUSTRY, 1953

Activity in the fabric glove and mitten industry in 1953 was somewhat higher than in 1952. To begin with there was one more establishment, 15 in place of 14. The value of the goods shipped from these establishments was \$4,164,925, up 8 per cent from the preceding year's \$3,849,293. Employment which stood at 716 in 1952 rose to 847 in 1953, an increase of 18 per cent, while salary and wage payments increased by 14 per cent from \$957,335 to \$1,086,820 over the two years. The cost of materials consumed in manufacture was slightly higher, \$2,112,018 in 1953 versus \$2,057,724 in 1952.

The leading commodity in this industry is cotton work gloves of which 634,484 dozen pair valued at \$1,939,265 were shipped in 1953. This amount was

a little above the 610,407 dozen pair worth \$1,920,742 reported as shipped in the previous year. Shipments of other work gloves totalled 89,460 dozen pair worth \$373,144 compared with 72,224 dozen pair worth \$383,086. Most of the gain in the value of factory shipments reported by the industry was due to fine gloves with shipments of this commodity amounting to 142,748 dozen pair worth \$1,630,270 in 1953 as against 125,567 dozen pair worth \$1,389,734 in 1952.

The most important material consumed by the fabric glove and mitten industry is canton fabrics. In 1953 the consumption of canton fabrics amounted to 1,788,181 yards costing \$845,355 compared with 1,164,084 yards costing \$650,013 in 1952.

SECTION 2. THE OILED AND WATERPROOFED CLOTHING INDUSTRY, 1953

In 1953 the oiled and waterproofed clothing industry consisted of 15 establishments, two more than in the previous year. It was practically confined to Ontario and Quebec with 5 and 9 establishments respectively in the two provinces. The remaining establishment was a new one located in Alberta. Quebec dominated the industry by accounting for 75 per cent of total shipments and for 71 per cent of all persons employed.

The industry's level of operations in 1953 was virtually unchanged from a year earlier. Factory shipments in the year under review had a value f.o.b. plant of \$4,322,935 compared with the preceding year's figure of \$4,309,337. The payroll listed 497 persons in 1953 and 510 persons in 1952 with salary and wage payments amounting to \$1,170,301 and \$1,123,480 respectively, in the two years. Material's

cost \$2,568,127 in the later year, little changed from the \$2,507,554 cost of the earlier year.

The leading product of this industry is waterproofed and showerproofed coats which in 1953 were shipped to the extent of 41,078 dozen valued f.o.b. factory at \$3,077,318. Shipments of oiled and rubberized coats amounted to 2,408 dozen worth \$140,395. Coats other than these two types were shipped to the extent of 522 dozen valued at \$143,861. Wind-breakers are another important product of the industry and in the year under review factory shipments of this commodity were reported at 3,860 dozen worth \$328,000.

Imports of oiled and waterproofed clothing showed a decrease from \$395,362 in 1952 to \$382,395 in 1953. Exports rose from \$93,651 to \$102,476 in the same period.

SECTION 3. THE MISCELLANEOUS CLOTHING INDUSTRY, N.E.S., 1953

The factory shipments made by the miscellaneous clothing industry, n.e.s. in 1953 had a value f.o.b. plant of \$11,147,296, an increase of \$832,627 or 8 per cent over the \$10,314,669 worth of goods shipped by it in the previous year. Further evidence of higher activity in the industry was the rise of employment from 1,394 in 1952 to 1,508 in 1953 accompanied by a corresponding increase in payroll from \$2,701,760 in the earlier year to \$2,942,318 in the latter. Higher also was the cost of materials consumed which rose from \$6,033,610 in 1952 to \$6,271,748 in 1953, an increase of about 4 per cent. Establishments numbered 62 in the first year compared with 67 in the second.

The industry was practically confined to Ontario and Quebec, these two provinces having 23 and 40 establishments respectively. Three of the remaining 4 establishments were located in Manitoba and one in British Columbia. Quebec dominated the industry with shipments valued at \$7,587,020 or 68 per cent of the total and with 1,007 or 67 per cent of all persons employed.

From point of view of size, 7 establishments each making shipments valued between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 accounted for 45 per cent of the industry's total. The employment of wage-earners by the industry was fairly constant with the variation ranging from a high of 1,379 in February to a low of 1,135 in December.

The principal commodity of the miscellaneous clothing industry, n.e.s. is tailors' canvas fronts of which 273,271 dozen worth \$3,421,260 were shipped in 1953. Shipments of other main commodities in order of importance were as follows: shoulder pads, 1,406,689 dozen valued at \$1,514,821; belts, 370,695 dozen at \$1,248,864 and suspenders, 171,368 dozen at \$842,576. Further detail of commodities is to be found in Table 2. Unfortunately, many of the items shipped by the industry cannot be shown separately as they are produced by only one or two firms. It is this reason which prevents the breakdown of the safety clothing item into its various components of aprons, gloves, mitts, leggings, sleeves, etc. Other items of production include academic gowns, burial garments, dress shields, shoulder straps, and vestments.
