THE MISCELLANEOUS CLOTHING INDUSTRIES 1956

The miscellaneous clothing group of industries as delineated by the Standard Industrial Classification includes corsets, fur dressing and dyeing, fur goods, fabric gloves and mittens, hats and caps, oiled and waterproofed clothing, and miscellaneous clothing, n.e.s. The publications in which these industries are reported upon are listed on the opposite page under D, E, F and G.

Fur dressing and dyeing and fur goods appear together in one report. Separate reports are prepared for corsets and for hats and caps. This report deals with the remaining three, namely, fabric gloves and mittens, oiled and waterproofed clothing, and miscellaneous clothing, n.e.s., a residual grouping impossible to classify elsewhere.

Prior to 1952, fabric gloves and mittens was included with the report on hosiery and knitted goods in order to bring together fabric and knitted gloves. The discontinuance of this practice was prompted by a change in the Standard Industrial Classification whereby the knitting mills were removed from the clothing industrial group.

Beginning with 1954, information on the value of year end inventory holdings at plant and plant warehouses is being collected as part of the annual Census of Industry. This data was formerly collected by a separate survey. The summarized results for the three industries covered by this report for the year under review will be found in their respective sections.

SECTION 1. THE FABRIC GLOVE AND MITTEN INDUSTRY, 1956

In 1956 the fabric glove and mitten industry consisted of 11 establishments, the same as in 1955. Factory shipments had a value f.o.b. plant of \$4,651,618, which amount compares with the preceding year's \$4,231,153. The number of employees rose from 681 in 1955 to 724 in 1956 while salary and wage payments increased from \$1,077,349 to \$1,164,585. Material costs advanced from \$2,046,517 in the earlier year to \$2,423,958 in the later.

Cotton work gloves, the industry's main product, were shipped to the extent of 814,146 dozen pairs

valued at \$2,434,704 compared with 651,353 dozen pairs worth \$1,813,251 in 1955. Shipments of other work gloves were valued at \$436,106 compared with \$367,468. Deliveries of fine gloves totalled 120,289 dozen pairs worth \$1,646,575 in 1956. This was considerably below the 266,776 dozen pairs worth \$1,969,046 shipped a year earlier.

The most important material consumed by the fabric glove and mitten industry is canton fabric. In 1956 the consumption of this item amounted to 1,388,698 yards costing \$610,005 compared with 1,870,701 yards costing \$684,222 in 1955.

SECTION 2. THE OILED AND WATERPROOFED CLOTHING INDUSTRY, 1956

A total of \$4,357,077 worth of goods was shipped in 1956 by the 13 establishments comprising the industry. This represents an 11.3 per cent increase over the \$3,915,807 worth of goods shipped in 1955. Employment was up slightly to 447 from 435 with the payroll of \$1,082,446 little changed from \$1,095,261 in the earlier year. Material costs increased a substantial 26.6 per cent to \$2,496,193 from \$1,972,179 in 1955.

The industry was confined to Quebec and Ontario with 7 and 6 establishments respectively in the two provinces. Quebec with 66 per cent of employment and 75 per cent of factory shipments dominated the industry.

The leading product of this industry is waterproofed and showerproofed coats which in 1956 were shipped to the extent of 21,134 dozen valued f.o.b. factory at \$2,753,633. Shipments of oiled and rubberized coats amounted to 4,297 dozen worth \$206,504. Coats other than these two types were shipped to the extent of 1,120 dozen valued at \$180,090. Windbreakers are another important product of the industry and in the year under review factory shipments of this commodity were reported at 4,678 dozen worth \$476,110.

Imports of oiled and waterproofed clothing increased in value from \$501,102 in 1955 to \$613,162 in 1956. Exports rose slightly from \$174,059 to \$186,628 over the two years.

SECTION 3. THE MISCELLANEOUS CLOTHING INDUSTRY, N.E.S., 1956

The factory shipments made by the miscellaneous clothing industry, n.e.s. in 1956 had a value f.o.b. plant of \$12,960,695, an increase of \$1,508,006 or 13.2 per cent over the \$11,452,689 worth of goods shipped by it in the previous year. Further evidence of higher activity in the industry was the rise in employment from 1,412 in 1955 to 1,552 in 1956 accompanied by an increase in payroll from \$3,003,084 in the earlier year to \$3,426,434 in the later. Higher also was the cost of materials consumed which rose from \$6,076,461 in 1955 to \$7,258,812 in 1956, an increase of 19.4 per cent.

In 1956 the industry was comprised of 74 establishments, two more than the year before. Forty-seven of these were located in Quebec, 21 in Ontario, 4 in Manitoba and 2 in British Columbia. As indicated by the number of establishments, Quebec was the most prominent province accounting for 64 per cent of the industry's employment and 67 per cent of its shipments.

The industry is comprised for the most part of small and medium sized establishments. Reference

to Table 27 will show that 30 of the total of 74 reported factory shipments with a value of less than \$50,000. Only 4 reported shipments with a value in excess of \$500,000.

The principal commodity of the miscellaneous clothing industry, n.e.s. is tailors' canvas fronts of which 223,794 dozen worth \$3,096,470 were shipped in 1956. Shipments of other main commodities in order of importance were as follows: belts, 422,133 dozen valued at \$1,594,008; shoulder pads, 1,557,198 dozen at \$1,423,201 and suspenders, 234,145 dozen at \$847,814. Further detail of commodities is to be found in Table 24. Unfortunately, many of the items shipped by the industry cannot be shown separately as they are produced by only one or two firms. It is this reason which prevents the breakdown of the safety clothing item into its various components of aprons, gloves, mitts, leggings, sleeves, etc. Other items of production include academic gowns, burial garments, dress shields, shoulder straps, and vestments.


