GENERAL REVIEW OF ALL TEXTILES

1950

The present report aims at presenting the broad, general role of textiles within the industrial framework of the Canadian economy. The principal feature is a detailed list of all textile products for the years 1949 and 1950. At the same time the developments of the component industrial groupings are summarized. Tables will be found covering such items as production, employment, imports, exports, investment, size distribution, geographical distribution, inventories and shipments. In addition to this report there are two other summary reports on the two principal textile classifications, the first dealing intensively with textiles except clothing and the second with the clothing industries. These reports are entitled "General Review of Textiles Except Clothing" and "General Review of the Clothing Industries."

The gross value of production of the entire textile industry rose from \$1,364,322,966 in 1949 to \$1,475,477,019 in 1950, a gain of 8 per cent or \$111,154,053. While the clothing and fur group generally operated at the same level in 1950 as in 1949, textiles except clothing as a group was up over 16 per cent. The output of firms in the cotton yarn and cloth industry increased from \$211,384,517 in 1949 to \$257,383,892 in 1950. The synthetic textile and silk industry advanced from \$124,125,414 to \$147,047,995 over the two years. A summary of the comparative record of the various sections of the textile industry for 1949 and 1950 is given in the following table.

The year 1950 was divided into two definite parts by the defence emergency. In the first half the industry in general was worried over an uncertain domestic market and increased imports but in the last part of the year the major problem was that of obtaining adequate supplies of raw materials. Scarcities which developed were particularly evident in the field of synthetics but were by no means confined here, as wool was in short supply and cotton was far from being plentiful.

Shortages of raw materials led to much higher prices for the quantities that were available. Wool provided an extreme example of this trend in the last six months of 1950. During this period the prices of merinos rose by about 60 per cent while the increase in crossbred prices was about 130 per cent. There was also concern regarding the effect of new taxes on purchasing power and new competition from Japan

and Europe. On the other hand there were certain new positive forces for Canadian textiles. There was in the first place an accelerating demand for all kinds of cloths and fabrics arising from continued prosperity, high wages and full employment. Secondly, there were increasing defence orders for materials with which to clothe and equip Canadian and foreign defence personnel. Thirdly there was a feeling that defence needs of other countries might cut down their textile exports to Canada. The influences of the Korean War on primary textiles and clothing were similar but activity in primary textiles increased at an earlier date. Fears of shortages and rising raw material prices as well as the expectation of rising demand on the part of the clothing and miscellaneous textile industries caused primary mills to step up their production and build up their inventories of both raw materials and finished goods to very high levels.

In 1950 reports were received from 3,897 textile establishments compared with 3,905 the previous year. There were 196,576 employees in 1950 compared with 195,525 in 1949 and salaries and wages rose from \$362,679,336 in 1949 to \$380,398,489 in the year under review. The cost of materials rose from \$710,773,783 to \$790,235,025 over the two years and the value added by manufacture stood at \$668,446,384 in 1950 compared with \$638,382,603 in 1949. In 1950 the gross value of production of the textile industry represented 10.7 per cent of the gross output of all manufacturing industries. The industry is particularly important for women wage-earners and in 1950, no less than 44 per cent of all women wage-earners in manufacturing were to be found in textiles. The clothing industry in 1950 had a gross value of production of \$734,214,334 and a net value of \$352,889,623. Among the leading Canadian manufacturing industries, this industry in 1950 was fourth as regards number of employees, sixth as regards total wages and salaries, and eighth as regards gross value of production. The industrial grouping known as textiles except clothing ranked fifth in regard to number of employees, seventh in regard to salaries and wages, and seventh in regard to gross value of production.

In 1950 textiles except clothing employed 80,328 persons in over 800 establishments, while 116,248 persons found employment in over 3,000 establishments of the clothing industry. In textiles except clothing, 88 per cent of the establishments and 95 per cent of the employees were located in the Central Provinces which also contained 90 per cent of the establishments and 90 per cent of the employees of the clothing industry. In both industries the most important centres are Montreal and Toronto, in that order. In the clothing industry as a whole, Winnipeg ranks third, but in the production of overalls and work-shirts it is first, Toronto second and Montreal third. Kitchener ranks second in the production of men's fine shirts.

In general the postwar period has been characterized by a high level of demand for clothing and textiles. Factors contributing to this have been wartime backlogs, military demobilization demand, high family formation rates, immigration and high levels of disposable income. By the end of 1948 backlogs of demand had largely disappeared, and during 1949 and the first half of 1950 supply and demand were in much easier adjustment. During the last half of 1950 a resurgence of demand occurred, due to a fear of shortages, inspired by the Korean war and heightened by rising costs of raw materials.

Domestic supplies of both textile products and clothing have increased in the postwar period. Early postwar problems included shortages of raw fibres, grey goods and skilled labour, rising wage-rates, absenteeism and high rates of labour turnover, some of which persisted into the later postwar years. On the other hand an extensive investment program expanded the capacity of these industries and employment rose. Postwar clothing imports were highest both in dollar volume and in relationship to domestic disappearance in 1947.

Investment has been particularly significant in the group designated textiles except clothing. During World War II this group spent an average of \$8 million annually on new construction and the purchase of machinery and equipment. The capital outlay was about the level of corresponding expenditures of the thirties and approximated those of the late twenties. It was induced mainly by military exigencies, which required greater output of textiles and textile products. Capital expenditures of the first four post-war years averaged \$32 million annually, four times as great as those of the war period. Only in 1950, with most of the immediate and urgent post-war expansion and modernization achieved, did investment outlay decline to \$27 million. The great emphasis textile firms place on the most up-to-date and efficient equipment is indicated by the fact that in the postwar period three out of every four dollars spent by the industry were for machinery and equipment. Only one dollar in four was invested in the erection of new buildings or extension and improvement of existing buildings. The maintenance outlay has been running at about \$19 million in the last few years. As a result, the industry has been spending on the expansion, replacement and maintenance of its plants in excess of \$50 million annually during most of the postwar years.

During the postwar period the clothing industry spent an average \$12 million per year on new construction and machinery and equipment and \$7 million on repair and maintenance, or a total of \$19 million. Large sums have been expended for new plant and equipment in the women's hosiery industry, the glove industry, fur goods and hat making.

Tables in this report on exports and imports give recent trends in terms of fibres and by degree of manufacture. The material in each case is divided to show the relative importance of the United States and United Kingdom. Imports of primary textiles comprise significant percentages of domestic disappearance. In 1950 imports of woollen woven fabrics totalled 34 per cent of domestic disappearance with over 90 per cent of the import yardage coming from the United Kingdom. In 1949 and 1950 worsted and serges have accounted for about 70 per cent of the woollen fabric imports from the United Kingdom. This is partly due to the fact that British weavers, producing for a world-wide market, can weave economically a far greater number of patterns than Canadian mills, and partly due to the Canadian consumers' desire for a variety of patterns. The yardage of cotton broadwoven fabric imports in 1950 comprised 39 per cent of domestic disappearance, the two chief sources of supply being the United States (74 per cent) and the United Kingdom (11 per cent). The import yardage of synthetic woven fabrics was 10 per cent of domestic disappearance in 1950, the main sources of supply being the United States (70 per cent) and the United Kingdom (26 per cent).

Exports of broadwoven fabrics form an unimportant fraction of domestic production and the yardage exported has fallen off since 1947. Cottons are by far the most important of the three, averaging 74 per cent

of the total yardage exported in the 1946-50 period. Synthetics are second in importance accounting for 25 per cent and woollens account for only 1 per cent. Synthetic exports have doubled in relative importance since the 1935-39 period.

In the clothing industry as a whole neither exports nor imports comprise a very significant fraction of domestic disappearance. Imports of textile clothing, however, have increased considerably in the last two years, the U.S.A. and the United Kingdom being the chief sources of supply.

Postwar exports of clothing reached a peak in 1946, when foreign aid programs and gifts were at a maximum, but even in dollar volume clothing exports have declined markedly since then as aid programs have tapered off. The pattern of the postwar clothing trade is different from that of the prewar period. In the period 1935 to 1939, clothing exports averaged \$5.1 million. While 75 per cent of this dollar volume went to half-a-dozen countries of the Empire and Commonwealth, only 2 per cent went to the United States. In the period 1946 to 1950, clothing exports averaged \$13.9 million, of which only 21 per cent

went to the same half-dozen Empite and Commonwealth countries. The percentage going to the United States rose to 21 while the percentage going to Central and South American countries, the Benelux countries and their dependencies, rose considerably.

One of the most interesting features of recent years in the Canadian textile industry has been the substitution of synthetic for natural fibres. Contributing to this development has been not only the novelty of synthetics and the aggressive salesmanship of their manufacturers, but also the relative price stability of synthetics, their intrinsic properties and the ability of textile chemists to design them for particular purposes. The growing importance of synthetics may be judged from the fact that whereas in 1939 per capita consumption of synthetic woven fabrics was 12 per cent of total per capita consumption of woven fabrics, in 1949 the percentage was 21 and in 1950, 18. In other words from 1939 to 1950 while the per capita consumption of wool and cotton fabrics increased by 10 and 12 percent respectively, per capita consumption of synthetic fabrics increased by over 75 per cent.

Consumption of Apparel Fibres in Canada

Several years ago the Nylon Division of Canadian Industries commenced a study of trends in the consumption of apparel fibres in Canada. The Bureau was asked to co-operate in this survey and did so willingly for it had long recognized the need for research of this nature and had intended undertaking just such a study when time and staff permitted. A table showing the total apparent consumption of apparel-type fibres in Canada from 1926-1950 was the first important product of the study. Because of its usefulness as background material for textile research, it is presented here with the kind permission of Canadian Industries Limited.

The figures shown in the table represent the volume of fibres as they enter final consumption in all textile uses. Consumption by products measured subsequent to the spinning process is calculated on an actual weight basis while consumption by products measured prior to the spinning process is calculated on a spinnable fibre content basis. The "spinnable fibre" concept denotes the volume of fibre which is actually consumed in textile uses and excludes that volume which is removed as waste or relegated to non-textile applications. Total Apparent Consumption is defined as domestic production, plus imports, less exports.


