

#### THE OILED AND WATERPROOFED CLOTHING INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1940.

In 1940 reports were received from 11 establishments whose principal output consisted of oiled and waterproofed clothing. The location of these establishments was as follows: Quebec 7, and Ontario 4.

The oiled and waterproofed clothing industry reported a gross value of production of \$2,127,642 in 1940 and this represents an increase of \$778,459 or nearly 58 per cent from the 1939 total. Employment was given to 527 persons, 156 persons or 42 per cent more than in 1939, and they were paid in salaries and wages the sum of \$476,120 which was \$156,174 or 49 per cent more than the amount so disbursed in 1939. Materials used in 1940 costs \$1,327,049 an increase of \$519,447 or 64 per cent, while the capital invested was also higher by \$213,218 or 27 per cent.

The principal single item of production was "rubberized coats" which were made to the extent of 9,471 dozen with a value at the factory of \$516,975 "Windbreakers and leather jackets" with a production of 8,187 dozen valued at \$334,809 came next in order of importance. Other important products were: canvas covers, oiled and waterproofed coats, etc. Detailed statistics of products made are given in table 4.

Detailed statistics covering the quantities and cost of the various materials entering into the manufacture of oiled and waterproofed clothing are not collected. The total costs are shown by provinces in Table 1.

Imports of clothing and raincoats of India rubber of of waterproofed cotton fabrics were valued at only \$138,354 in 1939, whereas exports of clothing (rubber), including waterproofed, amounted to \$290,235. Imports were \$37,935 higher while exports declined by \$232,379.
