## MEN'S FURNISHING GOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1924

Ottawa, April, 1926.— A report is herewith presented on the Men's Furnishing Goods
Industry in Canada during the calendar year 1924. There was a
slight decrease over the previous year in the number of establishments in operation. The number reported for 1924 being
131 located by provinces as follows:— Ontario 57, Quebec 55,
Manitoba 9, British Columbia 5, Alberta 2, Nova Scotia 2,
New Brunswick 1. In order not to disclose information concerning the operations of individual establishments, statistics
for the last three provinces have been combined and are shown
throughout this report as "Other provinces".

# THE MEN'S FURNISHING GOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1924.

## PRODUCTION

The quantity and value of the various products of the industry is given by provinces in Table II for the calendar year 1924. The total value of production fell from 25,502,111 in 1923 to 22,174,454 in 1924, a decrease of 3,327,657 over the two year period. In spite of the fact that there 4 less establishments in operation than in the previous year, certain items of production showed an increase, viz., shirts fine; smocks; mackingua; bloomers and pants, boys; children's wash suits; garters and hose supporters; armlets and sleeve supporters; bathrobes and dressing goins, and pyj mas.

## CAPITAL INVESTMENT

The total capital employed in the industry during the calendar year 1924 is given by provinces in Table III. The total capitalization fell from \$18,085,313 in 1923 to \$17.162,883 in 1924, a decrease of \$922,430. The province of Quebed provided the largest contribution to the total capital investment with \$8,350,903, or 48.6 per cent whilst Ontario supplied \$6,560,568 or 38.2 per cent.

## EMPLOYEES, SALARIES AND WAGES

The total number of persons employed in the industry during the calendar year 1924 will be found by provinces in Table IV by (a) classes of employment (b) sex and (c) salary and wage payments. The total number of employees in all classes fell from 7,833 in 1923 to 6,885 in 1924, a decrease of 948. The reduction in the number of employees also materially affected the payroll. In 1923 the salary and wage payments totalled \$6.034,631 whilst for 1924 the amount reported was \$5.031,596, a decrease of \$1.003,035 over the two year period.

#### OTHER EMPLOYMENT STATISTICS.

The number of days the factories were in operation during the calendar year 1924 together with the number of hours per day and per week normally worked by wage earners is given in Table V(a). The number of wage earners employed during the same period is given by sex and by months in Table V(b). Employment reached its maximum in May with 6,241 whilst the minimum number reported was 5,857 in the month of August.


# MATERIANS USED

The total cost of all materials used in the industry declined from \$14,279,926 in 1923 to \$12,511,336 in 1924, a decrease of \$1,768,590. With a view to modifying the industrial questionnairs manufacture of ments furnishing goods were not required to furnish information relating to either the bind or quantity of the various materials used in the industry during the year 1924. By provinces Quebec leads with a total expenditure of \$5,116,549, followed by Obtario with \$4,356,726. Manitoba occupies third place with \$1,524,575 whilst British Columbia in fourth position accounted for \$375,814, the balance \$637,672 being accounted for by the remaining three provinces.

## FUEL STATISTICS.

The quantity and value of the various kinds of fuel used in the industry during the calendar year 1924 is shown in Table VI. The total cost of all fuel declined from \$92,116 in 1923 to \$79,157 in 1924, a decrease of \$12,959. Coal of all kinds was again the principal item, accounting for \$63,981 or 87.1 per cent of the total expenditure for fuel whilst wood and gas follow next in importance in the order named.

## LOVER INSTALLATION

The power installation of the industry for the calendar year 1924 will be found in Table VIII by (a) classes of power, (b) number of units in each class and (c) the horse power capacity according to manufacturers' rating. There was a small increase in the number of units, viz., 410 in 1924 as against 406 in 1923. On the other hand the horse power utilized was slightly less than in the previous year being 2,765 in 1924 and 2,772 in 1923.

## IMPORTS AND EXPORTS

The quantity and value of the various articles comprising this industry imported into Canada for consumption during the calendar year 1924 is given in Table VIII by principal countries of origin. Only one item classified under the head of men's furnishing goods was exported from Canada during the same period, viz., "Suspenders", the values being to United Kingdom \$9,718 and to other countries \$26.868.
