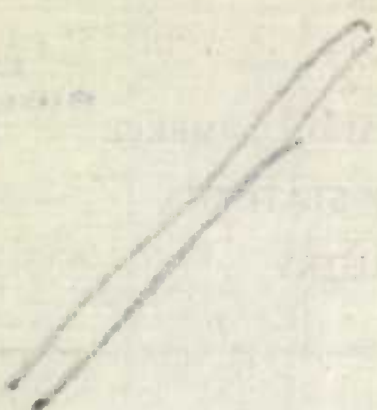

MEN'S FURNISHING GOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1926.

Ottawa, January, 1928.- A report is herewith presented on the Men's Furnishing Goods Industry in Canada during the calendar year 1926. There was a slight increase over the previous year in the number of establishments in operation. The number reported for 1926 being 139 located by provinces as follows:- Ontario 51, Quebec 64, Manitoba 12, British Columbia 8, Alberta 2, Nova Scotia 2. In order not to disclose information concerning the operations of individual establishments, statistics for the last two provinces have been combined and are shown throughout this report as "Other provinces".

THE MEN'S FURNISHING GOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA

Size of Establishments

In view of the present day tendency towards concentration in industrial enterprises, a table is herewith presented showing in a threefold way the size of establishments measured by (a) capital investment, (b) gross value of production and (c) the number of persons employed, within certain groups or limitations for the calendar years 1925 and 1926.

In 1925 the number of establishments reporting was 135 of which seventeen had a capital investment of \$10,476,100 or 62.9 per cent of the total; thirty had a gross value of production amounting to \$16,362,382 or 71 per cent of the total, and eighteen had 3,980 employees or 56 per cent of the total.

In 1926 the number of establishments reporting was 139 of which eighteen had a capital investment of \$11,037,597 or 62.7 per cent of the total; thirty-five had a gross value of production amounting to \$19,107,728 or 72.4 per cent of the total and twenty had 4,746 or nearly 55 per cent of the total employment.

THE MEN'S FURNISHING GOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1926.

Production

The quantity and value of the various products of the industry is given by provinces in Table II for the calendar year 1926. The total value of production rose from \$23,040,262 in 1925 to \$26,394,517 in 1926, an increase of \$3,354,255 over the two year period. Certain items of production showed an increase, viz., shirts, fine and working; cuffs; overalls; smocks; all kinds children's wash suits; neckties; suspenders armlets and sleeve supporters; bathrobes and dressing gowns.

THE MEN'S FURNISHING GOOD INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1926

Capital Investment

The total capital employed in the industry during the calendar year 1926 is given by provinces in Table III. The total capitalization rose from \$16,650,582 in 1925 to \$17,616,262 in 1926, an increase of \$965,680. The province of Quebec provided the largest contribution to the total capital investment with \$8,349,045, or 47.4 per cent, whilst Ontario supplied \$6,586,505 or 37.4 per cent.

Employees, Salaries and Wages

The total number of persons employed in the industry during the calendar year 1926 will be found by provinces in Table IV by (a) classes of employment, (b) sex and (c) salary and wage payments. The total number of employees in all classes rose from 7,294 in 1925 to 8,352 in 1926, an increase of 1,058. In 1925 the salary and wage payments totalled \$5,222,924 whilst for 1926 the amount reported was \$6,046,851, an increase of \$823,927 during the two year period, and equivalent to nearly 16 per cent.

Other Employment Statistics

The number of days the factories were in operation during the calendar year 1926 together with the number of hours per day and per week normally worked by wage earners is given in Table V(a). The number of wage earners employed during the same period is given by sex and by months in Table V(b). Employment reached its maximum in October with a total enrollment of 7,819, of whom 1,003 were males and 6,816 were females, whilst the minimum number reported was 6,935 in the month of January of whom 944 were males and 5,991 females.

Materials Used

The total cost of all materials used in the industry rose from \$13,126,738 in 1925 to \$16,244,847 in 1926, an increase of \$3,118,109. With a view to modifying the industrial questionnaire manufacturers of men's furnishing goods were not required to furnish information relating to either the kind or quantity of the various materials used in the industry during the year 1926. By provinces Quebec leads with a total expenditure of \$7,076,030, followed by Ontario with \$6,359,186. Manitoba occupies third place with \$1,796,499 whilst British Columbia, in fourth position, accounted for \$417,474, the balance \$595,658 being accounted for by the remaining two provinces.

Fuel Statistics

The quantity and value of the various kinds of fuel used in the industry during the calendar year 1926 is shown in Table VI. The total cost of all fuel declined from \$76,131 in 1925 to \$72,763 in 1926, a decrease of \$3,368. Coal of all kinds was again the principal item of fuel, accounting for \$62,340 or 85.7 per cent of the total expenditure for fuel, whilst wood and gas follow next in importance in the order named.

Power Installation

The power installation of the industry for the calendar year 1926 will be found in Table VII by (a) classes of power, (b) number of units in each class and (c) the horse power capacity according to manufacturers' rating. There was a small increase in the number of units, viz., 477 in 1926 as against 429 in 1925. Similarly the horse power utilized was slightly more than in the previous year being 2,650 in 1925 and 2,742 in 1926.

Imports and Exports

The quantity and value of the various articles included in this industry imported into Canada for consumption during the calendar year 1926 is given in Table VIII by principal countries of origin. The total value of such imports amounted to \$2,420,269, of which goods to the value of \$1,495,973 came from the United Kingdom, \$174,046 from the United States and \$750,250 from Other Countries. Only one item classified under the head of men's furnishing goods was exported from Canada during the same period, viz., "Suspenders", the values being to United Kingdom \$2,351, to British dependencies \$34,335 and to other countries \$1,722, or a total export of \$38,408.
