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
MEN'S FURNISHING GOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1927.

•Ottawa, February, 1929.- A report is herewith presented on the Men's Furnishing Goods Industry in Canada during the calendar year 1927. There was a slight increase over the previous year in the number of establishments in operation. The number reported for 1927 being 146 located by provinces as follows:- Ontario 51, Quebec 68, Manitoba 14, British Columbia 8, Alberta 1, Nova Scotia 2 and New Brunswick 2. In order not to disclose information concerning the operations of individual establishments, statistics for the last three provinces have been combined and are shown throughout this report as "Other provinces".

Size of Establishments

In view of the present day tendency towards concentration in industrial enterprises, a table is herewith presented showing in a threefold way the size of establishments measured by (a) capital investment, (b) gross value of production and (c) the number of persons employed, within certain groups or limitations for the calendar years 1926 and 1927.

In 1926 the number of establishments reporting was 139 of which eighteen had a capital investment of \$11,037,597 or 62.7 per cent of the total thirty-five had a gross value of production amounting to \$19,107,728 or 72.4 per cent of the total and twenty had 4,746 or nearly 55 per cent of the total employment.

In 1927 the number of establishments reporting was 146 of which twenty had a capital investment of \$12,353,608 or 63.4 per cent of the total; forty-two had a gross value of production amounting to \$20,997,371 or 74.7 per cent of the total and twenty-three had 5,102 or 56.8 per cent of the total employment.





Production

The quantity and value of the various products of the industry is given by provinces in Table 2 for the calendar year 1927. The total value of production rose from \$26,394,517 in 1926 to \$28,095,715 in 1927, an increase of \$1,701,198 over the two year period. Certain items of production showed an increase, viz., shirts, fine; overalls; smocks; pants outing of duck, etc.; all kinds children's wash suits; neckties; mackinaw and other coats; bathrobes and dressing gowns; pyjamas and nightshirts; belts and fancy vests.



Capital Investment

The total capital employed in the industry during the calendar year 1927 is given by provinces in table 3. The total capitalization rose from \$17,616,262 in 1926 to \$19,493,876 in 1927, an increase of \$1,877,614. The province of Ontario provided the largest contribution to the total capital investment with \$8,643,315, or 44.3 per cent, whilst Quebec supplied \$7,855,525 or 40.3 per cent,


Employees, Salaries and Wages

The total number of persons employed in the industry during the calendar year 1927 will be found by provinces in table 4 by (a) classes of employment, (b) sex and (c) salary and wage payments. The total number of employees in all classes rose from 8,352 in 1926 to 8,980 in 1927, an increase of 628. In 1926 the salary and wage payments totalled \$6,046,851 whilst for 1927 the amount reported was \$6,579,223, an increase of \$532,372 during the two year period, and equivalent to nearly 9 per cent.

Other Employment Statistics


The number of days the factories were in operation during the calendar year 1927 together with the number of hours per day and per week normally worked by wage earners is given in table 5(a). The number of wage earners employed during the same period is given by sex and by months in table 5(b). Employment reached its maximum in April with a total enrollment of 8,319, of whom 1,090 were males and 7,229 were females, whilst the minimum number reported was 7,700 in the month of January of whom 1,057 were males and 6,643 females.

Other Employment Statistics - Cont'd.

The number and percentage of wage-earners in months of highest employment working specified hours per day is shown in Table 5(c) for Canada and the provinces. For the Dominion, the number working specified hours was distributed between the classes, the percentage working 8 hours being highest. In Ontario over 58 per cent of the employees worked 8 hours per day, in Quebec 52.35 per cent worked 9 hours whilst in Manitoba 92.87 per cent worked 8 hours. Less than one per cent of the wage-earners in the Dominion worked over 10 hours per day.



The number of hours worked per day in the month of highest employment and the standard working hours per week are shown by provinces in table 5(d). It should be noted that whilst the statistics relating to hours of labour in columns 2 and 3 are based on figures compiled for the month of highest employment, those in columns 4 and 5 represent the total and average of standard weekly hours of labour for the number of establishments reporting to the Bureau. For this reason the relation between daily and weekly hours of labour is to some extent impaired. The average daily hours of labour on the above basis was for the Dominion 8.5, whilst the average standard weekly hours worked out at 46.22 per plant.

Materials Used

The principal materials used in the industry are shown for Canada and the Provinces in table 6. The total cost of all materials declined from \$16,244,847 in 1926 to \$15,673,819 in 1927, a decrease of \$571,028 during the two year period.

Fuel Statistics

The quantity and value of the various kinds of fuel used in the industry during the calendar year 1927 is shown in table 7. The total cost of all fuel declined from \$72,763 in 1926 to \$69,285 in 1927, a decrease of \$3,478. Coal of all kinds was again the principal item of fuel, accounting for \$58,378 or 84.3 per cent of the total expenditure for fuel, whilst wood and gas follow next in importance in the order named. The cost of electricity purchased rose from \$46,966 in 1926 to \$65,136 being an increase of \$18,170 during the two year period.



Power Installation

The power installation of the industry for the calendar year 1927 will be found in table 8 by (a) classes of power, (b) number of units in each class and (c) the horse power capacity according to manufacturers' rating. There was an increase in the number of units, viz., 565 in 1927 as against 477 in 1926. On the other hand the horse power utilized was less than in the previous year being 2,742 in 1926 and 2,549 in 1927.

Imports and Exports

The quantity and value of the various articles included in this industry imported into Canada for consumption during the calendar year 1927 is given in Table 9 by principal countries of origin. The total value of such imports amounted to \$2,433,167, of which goods to the value of \$1,562,818 came from the United Kingdom, \$104,792 from the United States and \$765,557 from Other Countries. Only one item classified under the head of men's furnishing goods was exported from Canada during the same period, viz., "suspenders", the value being to the United Kingdom \$2,154, to British dependencies \$35,620 and to Other Countries \$300, or a total export of \$42,739.


