Statistics relating to specific products are therefore not to be regarded as comprehensive, as products like, Shirts, overalls, pants, mackinaws, hose, etc., etc., are also found as secondary products of other industries such as Woollen goods, Men's Clothing-factory, Hosiery and Knit goods, Ladies and Childrens wear and Fancy goods etc., etc.


## MRN'S FURNISHING GOONS IIMUSTRY INT CATADA, 1929.

Ottiwa, Januart, 1931 - A report is heremith oresented on the Men's Furnishing Goods Industry in Canada durine the calendar year 1929. There mas a sligit increase over the provious vear in the number of establishments in operation. The nuber reported fon 1929 beine 162 loceted by provinces as follows:Ontario 56, Quebec 75, Lanttobe 12, British Columbia 11, Alberta 2, Nove Scotia 2, and Niem Brunswick 3. In order not to disclose infommation concerninc the operations of individual establishments, statistics for the last thrie provinces have been combined and are shown throughout this roport as "other provinces".

In 1928 the number of establishments reportine 7as 159 of rhich 22 hed a ceritel i.ivestment of $\$ 13,786,436$ or 65.4 per cent of the total; 47 had a rass value of production amounting to $\$ 23,271,977$ or 76.8 per cent of the total and 27 hed 5,049 or 51.0 per cent of the total employment.

In 1929 the number of establishments reporting tas 162 of winin 2 had a capitai investment of $\$ 12,695,549$ or 64.59 per cent of the totil $1 ; 47$ had a gross value of production anounting to $\$ 23,208,781$ or 75.89 per cent of the total and 26 hace $\$ 5,54$ or 60.51 per cent of the total exployment.

The quantity and value of the various products of the industry is given by provinces in Table 2 for the calendar year lg2g. The total value of production rose from $\$ 30,314,552$ in 1928 to $\$ 30,581,862$ in 1929 , an increase of $\$ 267$, 310 over the two year period.

## Capital Investment

The total capital employed in the industry during the calendar year 1929 is miven by provinces in Table 3. The total capitalization fell from $\$ 21,064,504$ in 1928 to $\$ 19,654,505$ in 1929 , a decrease of $\$ 1,409,999$. The province of Quebec provided the largest contribution to the total capital investment with $\$ 8,421,608$ or 42.9 per cent, whilst Ontario supplied $\$ 7,789,094$ or 39.6 per cent.

## Mmployees, Salaries and Wages

The total number of persons employed in the industry during the calendar year 1929 will be found by provinces in Table 4 by (a) classes of employment, (b) sex and (c) salary and wace payments. The total number of employees in all classes fell from 9,909 in 1928 to 9,890 in 1929, a decrease of 19. In 1928 the salary and wage payments totalled $\$ 7,270,875$ whilst for 1929 the amount reported was $\$ 7,320,145$ an increase of $\$ 49,270$ during the two year period, and equivalent to 0.6 per cent.

## Qther Mmployment Statistics.

The number of days the factories were in operation during the calendar year 1929 tocether with the number of hours ver day and per week normally norked by wafe earners is given in table 5 (a). The number of mage earners emoloyed during the same period is elven by sex and by months in table 5 (b). Employment reached its maximum in April with a total enrollment of 9,192 of whom 1,346 were males and 7:846 were females, whilst the minimurs number reported was 8,450 in the month of December of whom 1,295 were males and 7,155 females.

The number and percentage of wage-earners in months of highest emoloyment worixing specified hours per day is shom in Table 5 (c) for Canada and the provinces. For the Dominion, the number working specified hours was distributed between the classes, the percentage working 8 hours being highest. In Oniario over 51 per cent of the employees worked 8 hours per day, in Quebec 49.62 per cent morked 9 hours whilst in Manitobe 86.75 per cent rorked 8 hours. Less than one per cent of the mace-earners in the Dominion morked over 10 hours per day.

The number of hours worifed per day in the month of highest employment and the standard morking hours per week are shown by provinces in Table 5 (d). It should be noted that whilst the statistics relating to hours of labour in columns 1, 2 and 3 are based on figures compiled for the month of highest employment, those in colums 4 and 5 represent the total and average of standard meekly hours of labour for the number of establishments reporting to the sureau. -or this ar.on the reiation betmeen daily and meelly hours of labour is to some extent impaired. The average daily hours or labour on the above basis was for the Dominion 8.6 whilst the average standard reekly hours porised out at $4: 6.0$ per olant.

## THE USNI'G TURMSETMG GOODS INDUSTRY IN CATADA, 1929.

## Materials Used

The total cost of ali matorials used in the industry durine the calendar year 1929 was $\$ 17,848,021$. Quebec takes first place with a total of $\$ 7,683,187$. Ontario follows nert in order mith $\$ 5,818,936$ with Nanitobe in third position with $\$ 1,826,871$. British Columbia mas responsible for $\$ 452,205$ whilst the remaining 3 provinces together contributed the balance amountine to $\$ 1,068,762$. For the period covered by this report manufacturers in this particular industry were not required to furnish details as to the quantity and cost of each zind of material used. The increase in cost of materials over the amount expended during; 1928 amounted to $\$ 526,897$.

## Fuel Statistics

The quantity and value of the various kinds of fuel used in the industry during the celender year 1929 is shown in Table 7. The total cost of all fuel declined from $\$ 55,299$ in 1928 to $\$ 62,585$ in 1929, a decrease of $\$ 2,714$. Coal of all kinds mas again the principal item of fuel, accounting for $\$ 51,271$ or 81.9 per cent of the total expenditure for fuel, riilst mood and gas follom mext in importance in the order nemed. The cost of electricity purchased fell from $\$ 73,161$ in 1928 to $\$ 66,299$ being a decrease of \$6, 862 during the two year period.

## Power Installation

The pomer installation of the industry for the calendar year 1929 will be foun in Trible $\delta$ by (a) classes of power, (b) number of units in each class and (c) the horse porer capacity according to manufacturers' rating. There was an increase in the number of units, viz., 645 in 1929 as accinst 612 in 1928. On the other hand the horse power utilized was less than in the previous year being 2,427 in 1928 and 2,199 in 1929.

THE IEIT'S MURTISHIM COODS INDUSTRY IN CATADA, 1929.

Imports and Exvorts.
The quantity and value of the various articles included in this industry imported into Canada for consumption during the calendar year 1929 is given in Table oby principal countries of origin. The total value of such imports amounted to $\$ 2,540,265$ of which roods to the value of $\$ 1,626,716$ came from the United Ringdom, $\$ 148,302$ from the United States and $\$ 765,247$ from Other Countries. Only one item classified under the head of men's furnishing goods wes exported from Canada during the same period, viz, "suspenders", the volue being to the United Kingdom \$993, to Ner Zealand \$27,765 and to Other Countries $\$ 6,650$, or a total export of $\$ 35,408$.
